Note: Because the tuition revenue is collected on the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville campus, and not by the UAMS College of Public Health, it has been removed from this schedule. UAMS is compensated for its participation in the Walton College EMBA program through a Memo of Understanding between the two institutions. Revenue flows to UAMS through billings done by the UAMS Contracts Office and posts as contract revenue, not as tuition revenue.

Tuition rates expressed are per semester or per Credit Hour. Summer sessions are charged at the per hour rate listed times the number of hours taken.

The <u>College of Medicine</u> is requesting a 2% increase in base tuition, with no increase requested for the fees that were rolled in with tuition for FY17-18. This conservative request reflects the fact that tuition and fees for UAMS medical students now exceeds the mean for U.S. public medical schools. Data show that UAMS medical student indebtedness in 2017 ranked 19th out of 85 public medical schools across the country.

The <u>College of Nursing</u> is requesting no increase in resident tuition for the BSN program, so the tuition will remain at \$300/credit hour. A 3% increase is requested in resident tuition (\$435 to \$450) for both the MNSc and DNP programs. These recommendations will keep tuition competitive with other nursing programs in the state. When compared to 18 other nursing colleges in Arkansas and the Southern Region, the BSN program is above average in annual cost. The MNS and DNP programs are below average in annual cost when compared to 15 other programs.

The College of Pharmacy is requesting a 2% increase in tuition for FY 2018-19.

The <u>College of Health Professions</u>' position is that there is little capacity to increase overall tuition in FY19. The survey results indicated that CHP has no capacity to increase tuition for its undergraduate programs. For its graduate programs, we feel we can increase tuition by 5%. Physician Assistant Studies has not had a tuition increase since its inception. Under the current recruiting plan, Physician Assistant students are guaranteed that tuition will not increase during their enrollment at UAMS. Since the incoming class begins in May, the campus would not see the benefit until May 2019. Lastly, we reviewed the tuition for the Physical Therapy program and found that there is no capacity to increase tuition for FY19. FY19 will be a transitional year for two of the college's programs. Health Information Technology and Emergency Medical Sciences will be transferring to UA-Pulaski Tech effective January 1, 2019. Therefore, these programs will only enroll students for the fall term. Effective spring term 2019, these students will transfer to Pulaski Tech and the programs in the college will be discontinued.

The <u>College of Public Health</u> is requesting an increase of 5% in tuition for Fall 2018 in order to fund faculty promotions and cover estimated inflation of 2% in other budget categories. In comparison with 17 comparable schools of public health across the U.S., this increase would keep the COPH in the middle of the second quartile still making UAMS an affordable alternative. The COPH will continue its efforts to moderate operating expenses and increase revenues.

The <u>Graduate School</u> is requesting an increase of 3.4% in full-time student tuition for Fall 2018. Even with this increase, Graduate School tuition is still substantially below regional peer comprehensive academic health centers.

- 1 The Student Health Fee is not charged to students enrolled 100% online and is not charged for summer semester.
- 2 Students in the Master's of Communication program (College of Health Professions) at UALR will not be charged. Summer session rate is \$39. College of Nursing BSN students attending classes on the UACCH (Hope. AR campus) will be charged the Student Transportation fee. Students are required to attend clinical simulation classes on the Little Rock campus. They are assigned to carpools and UAMS is reimbursing the drivers for mileage.
- 3 The UAMS Technology Fee is charged to all students. It is not charged for the summer semester. The fee increase is to cover the rise in costs associated with the services provided.
- 4 The "University Services Fee" combines the Academic Affairs Student Fee, Student Insurance Admin Fee and the Library Fee and will fund ID Badges and the Caduceus year book. Undergraduate students taking less than 6 hours and Graduate students taking less than 5 hours will not be charged. The fee is not charged for summer semester. Fee increase is to cover the rise in costs associated with the services provided.
- 5 The Student Activity fee is not charged to students enrolled in approved, UAMS-designated 100% online programs. It is not charged for summer semester.
- 6 This fee is charged to students actively engaged in a UAMS degree program but not enrolled in credit-bearing courses activities, are preparing to fulfill graduation requirements and/or awaiting completion of final licensure tests.
- 7 The following fees were included within the COM tuition rates starting Fall of 2017: Disability Insurance (\$26/sem), Malpractice Insurance (\$188/sem), Standardized Patient Fee(increased to \$170/sem) and Curriculum Assessment Monitoring Fcc (Exam Software) (\$35/sem). Total = \$419/semester; \$838/year
- 8 In addition to non-degree seekers, a one-time application fee will be charged to all College of Medicine applicants.
- 9 The College of Nursing Graduate Program Fee is a generic fee that replaced the \$300 Advanced Health Assessment fee previously charged to the MNSc students enrolled in the Advanced Health Assessment course. The \$300 Graduate Program Fee will be spread across the program (\$50/semester * 6 semesters). Additionally, \$15 will be included in this fee to cover the cost of Typhon, a nurse practitioner student tracking software. This fee will be charged every fall and spring semester to students enrolled in the MNSc program.

- 10 The College of Nursing Progression Test fee includes the cost of ATI, ExamSoft, and an iPad app for the BSN students. The fee should be charged every fall and spring to students enrolled in the BSN program.
- Although not a fee, this deposit is due upon acceptance, as a reservation of enrollment prior to actual registration. It is non-refundable, but will be applied to the first semester tuition if the applicant enrolls within a year. The College of Pharmacy fee adheres to the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy recommendation that this be no more than \$200.
- 12 The College of Pharmacy changed the NAPLEX Prep Course fee from a one-time fee of \$120 to \$50 per semester to cover the cost of replacing the High Yield Med Review NAPLEX review course (\$120 per student) with the higher cost (\$400 per student) RxPrep course. The RxPrep course is considered to be a much better program which is expected to improve the pass rate on NAPLEX.
- 13 Immunization Training through APA of all P3 students is required in order to receive certification. This one-time fee is unique to the College of Pharmacy and is in the spring only.
- 14 This College of Pharmacy fee is used to subsidize the current Student Activity Fee funding for professional development activities specific to the COP students. The college spends about \$100 per student on student activities related to their organizations and professional events attendance.
- 15 ** NEW The NiaRx Software licenses being purchased for use by all P1 through P3 students at an annual cost of \$55/ticense for three (3) years. The cost will be spread over 4 years. NiaRx, is a cloud-based software platform that simulates an electronic medical record (EMR). With the use of NiaRx, student pharmacists would gain added skills in utilizing an EMR to engage more readily in all aspects of the JMCP pharmacists' patient care process (collecting data, assessing the overall patient, developing a patient-centered plan, implementing the care plan, and monitoring / evaluating its effectiveness). These skills, as well as familiarity with the basic components of an EMR, are critical for the pharmacy graduate's application of the pharmacists' patient care role in all areas of pharmacy.
- 16 Laboratory fees in the College of Health Professions are set on a credit hour of enrollment basis with the following exceptions: (a) Auditory-Based Intervention and Dietetic Internship do not have laboratory expenses and therefore should not be charged a fee. (b) The Diagnostic Medical Sonography program charges a \$50 lab fee one time in the fall. (c) Physical Therapy charges a \$50 lab fee during the fall and spring terms. (d) Physician Assistant Studies charges a laboratory fee of \$125 for summer, fall and spring terms. The Genetic Counseling program would like to charge a \$50 lab fee during the fall and spring terms to cover the costs associated with clinical rotation tracking software.
- 17 The Student Liability Insurance in the College of Health Professions covers students in a wide range of programs. The higher liability for students in the physical therapy program is reflected in their malpractice insurance fees. For FY19 students in Physician Assistant Studies will not be charged for malpractice coverage.
- 18 The College of Health Professions sets the Standardized Patient Fee amount based on required usage of standardized patients.
- 19 The Respiratory Therapy 'voucher' fee provides funding to the student when it is time to sit for his/her registry exams while still in school. With the voucher, the student would only need to enter a code in order to sit for their exam.
- 20 ** NEW The Credit by Examination fee would apply to College of Health Professions courses for which a student demonstrates competency or equivalency in the subject matter. This would be similar to a CLEP exam. The fee for Credit by Examination would be 1/2 the per credit hour rate of the course in which the student is seeking credit.
- 21 The cost of College of Pharmacy's student liability insurance is increasing from \$18 to \$35 per year. Therefore, a fee increase to \$18/semester is requested.

 use to satisfy the statistics requirement, update the business requirements
 to place a greater emphasis on marketing and advertising concepts,

Further, the current Master of Education in Middle Childhood, CIP 13.1203, Degree Code 5805, and the current Master of Education in Special Education,

- CIP 13.100 I, Degree Code 5870, will be discontinued when the new Master of Education program has been approved.
- Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts Mathematics –Secondary Education Replace a current required upper level math elective with an existing course, MATH 4361 History of Math 1. The MATH 4361 course contains topics that are necessary for the Math Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts programs to meet the math history standards for the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAPE) accreditation. This course will be required so the artifacts may be used for reporting purposes and for meeting accreditation standards. The program credit hours will not change and will remain at 120 hours.

1.4 Change Program Title:

- Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts Mathematics —Secondary Education — Change name to Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts Mathematics Education per Arkansas Department of Education guidelines.
- 1.5 Offer Existing Graduate Certificate Via Distance Technology:
- Graduate Certificate in Gerontology The Gerontology Graduate Certificate courses are currently offered to students using distance technology and the School of Social Work is now proposing to offer the certificate online. Students enrolled in the Master of Social Work (MSW) online program have requested an avenue to obtain the Gerontology certificate while pursuing the MSW degree. The online program will allow students greater flexibility to pursue a graduate certificate and to become leaders in the field of gerontology.

University of Arkansas at Monticello

- 2.1 Policy Revision:
 - Academic Standing and Suspension Policy –The term "academic probation" will replace "conditional academic standing" whenever referenced. The general policy appears below.

To make academic achievement and progress toward a degree, each student is expected to maintain both semester and cumulative grade point averages of 2.00 or higher. If either the cumulative or semester grade point average falls below 2.00, the student will be placed on academic probation.

2.2 Curriculum Revisions to Existing Programs:

 Bachelor of Arts in History – Modify the curriculum for the Bachelor of Arts in History by requiring at least six hours of the upper-level history electives be at the 4000 level. The proposed change makes a distinction between upper-division lecture courses and seminar courses. Seminar courses will require a greater research and writing emphasis, and requiring six credit hours of such courses will serve as the equivalent to a capstone requirement for history majors. It will also increase student preparation and progression through the major by requiring them to take HIST 3513 (Historiography and Historical Methods) earlier to prepare for seminar courses; this in turn will better prepare them for all upperdivision history coursework.

• Bachelor of Arts in History- New Option - - Modify the curriculum for the Bachelor of Arts in History by adding a second option using existing courses. The introduction of a second option provides an alternative pathway through the history major, and thus increases the probability of rapid student progression towards the degree. It also provides an alternative pathway for those students whose career plans do not involve teaching or postgraduate education.

University of Arkansas at Fort Smith 3.

Curriculum Revisions to Existing Programs:

- · Bachelor of Science in Information Technology The proposed modifications allow the inclusion of a college-wide preparation course for incoming freshmen and improvements to the Data Analytics Concentration -STEM 1001 College Preparation for STEM Majors.
- Bachelor of Arts in Rhetoric and Writing, Minor in Rhetoric and Writing and Minor in Creative Writing - Modify programs to streamline and refocus the degree, take better advantage of the growth of majors and minors in creative writing and address the evolving needs of graduates in the workplace.
- Add Minor in Computer Science Currently there is no minor option in computing for majors in other degree programs. The addition of the Minor in Computer Science was initiated at the request of the Mathematics and Engineering Departments to provide a computing option for their students. The new minor consists of existing traditional computer science courses and topics and will be available to any student with the mathematics prerequisite, MA/TH 2804 Calculus I.

University of Arkansas Community College at Hope

Reconfiguration of Existing Degree

· Associate of Arts in Business Administration; Technical Certificate in Business Technology - The AAS Business Administration Degree is being reconfigured by removing the Accounting Option; reconfiguring the Technical Certificate in Accounting into the Technical Certificate General Business degree and deleting the Technical Certificate in Business Technology. As a result of reorganizing and restructuring of the AAS in Business Administration, the accounting option is no longer necessary.

- 5. <u>Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas</u> Reconfiguration of Existing Degree
 - Technical Certificate in Health Professions –The intent is to change the total hours of the certificate from 29 credit hours to a range of 32-44 credit hours and add two existing courses as elective options. The reason for the request is to allow the Certificate of Health Professions to serve as a stackable credential for students working on pre-requisite courses for programs with special acceptance. Students taking courses toward LPN, RN, OTA, or PTA would be placed in the certificate program while they worked on pre-requisite courses and would enter the program major at acceptance. Currently all students are placed in program majors while they are working on pre-requisites whether they are accepted or not accepted, which does not paint a clear picture of program viability or enrollment.

The Fiscal Year 2019 Strategic Audit Plan was discussed and approved.

3.6 Other Business:

The Committee was provided with a signed copy of the KPMG engagement letter to perform UAMS's external audit for the June 30, 2018 year end.

3.7 Approval to Issue Bonds, UAF:

A request presented by the University of Arkansas, Fayefteville, to issue bonds in the amount of \$32 million to fund various capital projects was discussed and approved, as follows:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS VARIOUS FACILITY REVENUE BONDS (FAYETTEVILLE CAMPUS) FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING ALL OR A PORTION OF THE COSTS OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE FAYETTEVILLE CAMPUS OF THE UNIVERSITY; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT, BOND PURCHASE AGREEMENT, SERIES TRUST INDENTURE AND RELATED DOCUMENTS; AND PRESCRIBING OTHER MATTERS PERTAINING THERETO.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the University of Arkansas (the "University") is authorized under the Constitution and laws of the State of Arkansas, including particularly Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated, Title 6, Chapter 62, Subchapter 3 (the "Act"), to borrow money for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and equipping capital improvements to University facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined and hereby finds and declares that there is a need for financing all or a portion of the costs of certain capital improvements on or for the Fayetteville campus of the University ("UAF"), including the following projects: (a) the renovation and reorganization of the interior of Mullins Library (the "Mullins Library Project"); (b) the acquisition, construction, equipping, and furnishing of the Student Success Center (the "Student Success Center Project"); (c) the renovation,

equipping and furnishing of the Arkansas Union Food Court (the "Arkansas Union Food Court Project"); (d) the acquisition, construction and equipping of an offsite Library Storage Building (the "Library Storage Building Project"); (e) the renovation, expansion and equipping of Kimpel Hall (the "Kimpel Hall Project"); (f) the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Civil Engineering Research and Education Center (the "Civil Engineering Center Project"); (g) the acquisition, construction and equipping of intramural sports facilities (the "Intramural Sports Facilities Project"); (h) the acquisition, construction and equipping of improvements to the south campus steam and utility systems (the "South Campus Steam Project"); (i) the renovation, expansion and equipping of Pomfret Dining Hall (the "Pomfret Dining Hall Project"); (i) the acquisition, construction and improving of a remote parking facility to be utilized by staff and faculty (the "Beechwood Remote Parking Project"); and (k) the acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of other capital improvements and infrastructure and the acquisition of various equipment and/or real property for UAF (collectively, with the Mullins Library Project, the Student Success Center Project, the Arkansas Union Food Court Project, the Library Storage Building Project, the Kimpel Hall Project, the Civil Engineering Center Project, the Intramural Sports Facilities Project, the South Campus Steam Project, the Pomfret Dining Hall Project, and the Beechwood Remote Parking Project, the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the staff of the University and UAF have recommended, and the Board has determined and hereby finds and declares, that the best method of financing all or a portion of the costs of the Project will be through the issuance of its Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus) (the "Bonds") which Bonds will have an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$32,000,000, the proceeds of the sale thereof to be used for accomplishing the Project and paying costs of issuing the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the costs of the Library Storage Building Project, the Kimpel Hall Project, the Intramural Sports Facilities Project, and the Civil Engineering Center Project were financed with proceeds of the Board's Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Refunding and Improvement Series 2016A (the "Series 2016A Bonds") and the Board's Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2017 (the "Series 2017 Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, a portion of the costs of the Mullins Library Project, the Student Success Center Project, and the South Campus Steam Project were financed with proceeds of the Series 2017 Bonds;

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the proceeds of the Series 2016A Bonds, the proceeds of the Series 2017 Bonds, and the proceeds of the Bonds to be issued for the Kimpel Hall Project and the Student Success Center Project will be supplemented with gifts and University funds; and

WHEREAS, it is further anticipated that the proceeds of the Series 2016A Bonds, the proceeds of the Series 2017 Bonds, and the proceeds of the Bonds to be issued for the Civil Engineering Center Project will be supplemented with gifts; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the proceeds of the Series 2016A Bonds, the proceeds of the Series 2017 Bonds, and the proceeds of the Bonds to be issued for the Library Storage Building Project will be supplemented with University funds; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the proceeds of the Bonds to be issued for the Arkansas Union Food Court Project and Pomfret Dining Hall Project will be supplemented with University funds and negotiated capital funds provided by the University's food services vendor; and

WHEREAS, prior to the issuance of the Bonds, UAF will obtain, pursuant to Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated Section 6-62-306, a resolution of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board giving its advice that the Project is economically feasible; and

WHEREAS, the Board intends that prior to the issuance of the Bonds certain costs relating to the Project will be incurred and paid from certain funds and accounts established and administered by the University; and

WHEREAS, the Board herein expresses its intent to finance a portion of the costs of the Project with the Bonds and for the University to be reimbursed from proceeds of the Bonds for the preliminary costs of the Project, in compliance with the provisions of Section 1.150-2 of the Department of Treasury Regulations, promulgated pursuant to the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Regulations"); and

WHEREAS, the Bonds are to be secured pursuant to a Master Trust Indenture dated as of November 1, 1996, as supplemented by a First Supplement to Master Indenture dated as of May 1, 2011 (collectively, the "Master Indenture"), between the Board and Simmons First National Bank, Pine Bluff, Arkansas (now Simmons Bank), as trustee (the "Trustee"); and

WHEREAS, the Bonds are to be issued on the terms and in the form set forth in a Series Trust Indenture for the Bonds (the "Series Indenture") between the Board and the Trustee, which Series Indenture shall contain an indication of the year in which the Bonds issued under such Series Indenture are issued, and shall contain a letter designation for each series of the Bonds issued under such Series Indenture which shall be in sequential order after taking into account other bonds previously issued under the Master Indenture in such year; and

WHEREAS, in order to proceed with the Project and its financing, it is necessary for the Board (i) to authorize the issuance and marketing of the Bonds; (ii) to authorize the President of the University to deem final a Preliminary Official Statement and to authorize its use; (iii) to authorize the pricing of the Bonds and the execution of a Bond Purchase Agreement with the Underwriters (as hereinafter defined) in connection therewith; and (iv) to authorize the execution of the Series Indenture and related documents, all relating to the security and issuance of the Bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS:

Section 1. In order to finance all or a portion of the costs of the Project and to pay the costs of issuing the Bonds, including the payment of fees to Bond Counsel, the Underwriters, the financial advisor and other professionals engaged by or on behalf of the Board to accomplish the issuance of the Bonds and the Project, the Board hereby approves, authorizes and directs the issuance, execution and delivery of the Bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$32,000,000. The Bonds shall mature not later than December 1, 2048 and have an aggregate true interest cost (after taking into account original issue discount and premium and Underwriters' discount but excluding costs of issuing such Bonds) not greater than 5.50%.

The Bonds may be issued in one or more series to differentiate the tax treatment of interest on the Bonds for federal income tax purposes or for other reasons deemed necessary or appropriate by the Board. The series descriptions in the name of each series of Bonds shall indicate the year in which such series of Bonds is issued and shall contain a letter designation per series of Bonds which shall be in sequential order after taking into account other bonds previously issued under the Master Indenture in such year.

The Bonds shall be general obligations only of the Board, and in no event shall the Bonds be considered a debt for which the faith and credit of the State of Arkansas or any of its revenues are pledged. The Bonds shall be secured by a pledge of (i) all tuition and fee revenues collected by UAF, (ii) all sales and services revenues and all auxiliary enterprises revenues (as such terms are used in the context of generally accepted accounting principles) derived from projects funded or refunded with the bonds issued under the Master Indenture, and (iii) all surplus sales and services and auxiliary enterprises revenues (as such terms are used in the context of generally accepted accounting principles) derived from residence halls, married student apartments, fraternity and sorority houses, residence dining services, the Arkansas Union, and transit and parking services to the extent such revenues are derived from facilities funded with obligations issued pursuant to the Act (the "Pledged Revenues"); provided, however, that such Pledged Revenues are subject to previous pledges to Existing Obligations as described in Section 6.03 of the Master Indenture and shall not include (A) athletic gate receipts and other revenues derived from intercollegiate athletics at UAF, or (B) any fees authorized or imposed by UAF and dedicated to a specific purpose unrelated to obligations issued pursuant to the Act or to facilities funded with such obligations.

The Bonds will be on a parity of security with the Board's Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2009A; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2011A and Refunding Series 2011B; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Refunding Series 2012A; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2012B; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2013A; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2014A and Series 2014B; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Refunding Series 2015A; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2015B and Refunding Series 2015C; Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Refunding and Improvement Series 2016A and Refunding Series 2016B; and Various Facility Revenue Bonds (Fayetteville Campus), Series 2017.

- <u>Section 3</u>. In order to provide for the issuance of the Bonds and to prescribe the terms under which the Bonds will be secured, executed, authenticated, accepted and held, the Chairman, Secretary, and Assistant Secretary of the Board and the President of the University are hereby authorized to execute all documents necessary for the issuance of the Bonds, including, without limitation:
- (a) the Series Indenture, to be dated as of the date of the Bonds, between the Board and the Trustee, setting forth the terms and conditions of the Bonds and providing for the issuance of the Bonds;
- (b) a Bond Purchase Agreement between the Board and the Underwriters setting forth the purchase price and the other terms and conditions upon which the Bonds will be sold to the Underwriters; and
- (c) a Continuing Disclosure Agreement, between the Board and the Trustee, setting forth certain obligations of the Board to make continuing disclosure of financial information and material events to the secondary municipal marketplace, as set forth in Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The Series Indenture, the Bond Purchase Agreement and the Continuing Disclosure Agreement are hereby authorized and shall be in substantially the form presented to the Board, with such changes therein as shall be approved by the Chairman or the President. The Board recognizes that certain revisions may be made to the Series Indenture, the Bond Purchase Agreement and the Continuing Disclosure Agreement prior to the issuance of the Bonds, and hereby authorizes the Chairman or President to approve and accept such revisions, the signature of either on each of such documents to constitute proof of their acceptance of such revisions. Specifically, the President or the Chairman is hereby authorized to (i) accept the final maturity schedule, interest rates and reoffering yields for the Bonds if he deems such rates, yields and maturity schedule to be appropriate and within the authority granted by this Resolution and execute the final Bond Purchase Agreement with the Underwriters, and (ii) execute the Continuing Disclosure Agreement. Prior to the sale of the Bonds, the President or the Chairman is

hereby authorized to confer with Mitchell, Williams, Selig, Gates & Woodyard, P.L.L.C., as bond counsel, in allocating the principal amount of the Bonds between tax-exempt bonds and taxable bonds if advantageous for planning purposes or necessitated for federal income tax purposes.

The President is hereby authorized to negotiate an Underwriters' discount with the Underwriters that is not in excess of 0.5% of the par amount of the Bonds. The purchase price may include original issue premiums and discounts in such amounts as may be approved by the President.

Section 4. The Board hereby authorizes the use of a Preliminary Official Statement in the marketing of the Bonds and authorizes the production of an Official Statement for the Bonds. The Preliminary Official Statement is hereby approved in substantially the form presented to the Board. The Board recognizes that certain revisions may be made to the Preliminary Official Statement prior to its delivery to prospective purchasers, and hereby authorizes the Chairman or the President to approve and accept such revisions, the signature of either on such Preliminary Official Statement to constitute proof of acceptance of such revisions. The Board hereby authorizes the President to "deem final" for purposes of Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission the Preliminary Official Statement with such revisions as may be accepted by the President. The Board hereby further authorizes and approves the production of a final Official Statement, and authorizes and directs the President to execute and deliver the Official Statement, in such form as he deems acceptable, in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 5. The Chairman, Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the Board, and the President of the University, acting individually or collectively, as may be appropriate, are hereby authorized and directed to do any and all lawful things to effect the execution and delivery of the Bonds, the performance of all obligations of the Board and of UAF, and the execution and delivery of all papers, documents, certificates and other instruments of whatever nature that may be necessary or desirable for carrying out the authority conferred by this Resolution or evidencing the authority and its exercise. The Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized to acknowledge and attest the signatures of the Chairman or the President and to execute such other documents as may be required in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 6. The President, the Chief Financial Officer, and/or the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of UAF and other appropriate officials are hereby authorized to submit to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board information pertaining to the Project and such other information deemed pertinent to the Project and the Bonds and requested by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to enable it to determine the feasibility of the Project and provide its advice to the Board.

- Section 7. (a) With respect to that portion of the Bonds that are issued on a taxable basis, if any, in compliance with Arkansas Code Annotated Section 6-62-304, the Board may reimburse UAF from the proceeds of the Bonds for all or a portion of the costs of the Project that were paid for with funds available for such purpose.
- (b) With respect to that portion of the Bonds that are issued on a tax exempt basis, this Resolution is intended to be the declaration of the official intent of the Board in accordance with the Regulations, wherein the Board and UAF intend to be reimbursed, in compliance with the Regulations, from the proceeds of the Bonds for all or a portion of the costs of the Project, which expenditures have been paid by UAF from UAF's general or other funds.
- The Board hereby expresses its intent to select Crews & Associates, Inc. Section 8. and Stephens Inc., as underwriters for the sale of the Bonds (the "Underwriters"). The Board hereby expresses its intent to retain Mitchell, Williams, Selig, Gates & Woodyard, P.L.L.C., as bond counsel ("Bond Counsel"). The President of the University and Chief Financial Officer of the University, in consultation with the Chancellor of UAF and the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of UAF, are authorized to negotiate the terms and conditions of an agreement with Bond Counsel, including a reasonable fee arrangement, and to execute such agreement as they determine is necessary and in the best interest of the University. If such negotiations are unsuccessful, the President of the University and the Chief Financial Officer of the University, in consultation with the Chancellor of UAF and the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of UAF are hereby authorized to negotiate with another bond counsel. Upon the conclusion of successful negotiations, Bond Counsel will begin documenting the issuance of the Bonds upon such schedule and in such manner as the President of the University shall direct.
- Section 9. For purposes of Arkansas Code Annotated §§ 16-115-101 et seq., the President of the University is hereby designated as the executive officer with the responsibility to confirm and effect the Board's and the University's compliance with the performance of the Board's and the University's obligations and duties pursuant to the Act, the Series Indenture, the Bond Purchase Agreement, the Bonds, the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, and all papers, documents, certificates and other instruments ancillary and/or related to the purposes set forth therein. For purposes of Arkansas Code Annotated §§ 16-115-101 et seq., the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of UAF is hereby designated as the executive officer with the responsibility to confirm and effect UAF's compliance with the performance of UAF's obligations and duties pursuant to the Act, the Series Indenture, the Bond Purchase Agreement, the Bonds, the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, and all papers, documents, certificates and other instruments ancillary and/or related to the purposes set forth therein.

<u>Section 10</u>. The provisions of this Resolution are hereby declared to be separable and if any provision shall for any reason be held illegal or invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Resolution.

Section 11. All resolutions and parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

3.8 Approval of Change in Terms of Inter-Institutional Loan with UASYS/eVersity:

A request to extend the original repayment terms of the inter - institutional loan between the campuses and divisions in the University of Arkansas System to the University of Arkansas System eVersity for an additional two years of interest only and principal payments beginning in the fifth year, presented by Chief Financial Officer Gina Terry, was discussed and approved, as follows.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board approves the change in the terms for the interinstitutional borrowing, pursuant to Board Policy 375.1, of the current loan of \$5,000,000 to the University of Arkansas System eVersity from the campuses and divisions of the University of Arkansas System.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Board set a term of ten years for the loan at an annual interest rate of 1.75% with interest only to be paid in the first two years of each loan, however, that will be extended to the first four years of the loan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Chief Financial Officer of the University of Arkansas System and the Chair of the Audit and Fiscal Responsibility Committee shall be, and hereby are, authorized to execute the amendment to the loan and such other required documents, to complete the change in the terms of the loan.

3.9 Approval of Fiscal Year 2018/2019 Operating Budgets for All Campuses and Units of the University:

Fiscal Year 2018/2019 Operating Budgets for all campuses and units, presented by President Donald R. Bobbitt, were discussed and approved, as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the 2018/19 budgets for each campus and program of the University of Arkansas are adopted as presented.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the President is authorized to make such appropriate corrections, additions, or deletions as may be required for the draft budget to the final budget document for fiscal year 2018/19.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT position lists to be developed and attached to final budget documents are solely for the purpose of authorizing the President, and the Chancellors, the Vice President for Agriculture, the Director of the Arkansas Archeological Survey, the Director of the Criminal Justice Institute, the Director of the School for Mathematics, Sciences, and the Arts, the Dean of the Clinton School of Public Service, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs for eVersity and other appropriate officials as authorized by the President, to determine persons who may be offered employment and the salaries and titles which may be offered within the framework of the respective operating budgets, should it be determined to fill such positions. Approval of the budget is not intended to constitute an act of contracting with any person or persons who may be listed in the final budget documents, or at salary amounts or titles in the positions indicated.

Under such delegation of authority the President, and the Chancellors, the Vice President for Agriculture, the Director of the Arkansas Archeological Survey, the Director of the Criminal Justice Institute, the Director of the School for Mathematics, Sciences, and the Arts, the Dean of the Clinton School of Public Service and the Vice President for Academic Affairs for eVersity and other appropriate officials as authorized by the President, may negotiate salaries below or above the amounts shown in the budget, so long as the amount is not in excess of the maximum amounts prescribed by law unless exceeding such line item maximum has previously been approved by the President, Chancellors or other appropriate administrators or by the Board, except as regards UAMS as set forth hereinafter, including previously approved housing allowances; and further, the President and Chancellor at UAMS may approve payment of special allowances as a part of the salaries of the physicians, dentists, and other professional faculty from receipts of professional income in the care of patients and/or funds received from federal agencies, foundations, and other private sponsors in support of research; provided that any such allowance shall not exceed, for any employee, an amount equal to two and one half (21/2) times that portion of the salary authorized by the General Assembly to be paid from the University of Arkansas Medical Center Fund. This authority shall include but not be limited to determining compensation for special services as provided by overload, overtime, and extra compensation policies, provided that the increased stipends from those sources do not exceed the statutory maximum amounts when added to regular salaries.

Senior Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration/CFO Bill Bowes presented an update to the committee on management actions taken since the March 28, 2018 committee meeting. Interim Chancellor Stephanie Gardner and Dr. Richard Turnage, Senior Vice Chancellor for Clinical Programs and Chief Executive Officer for UAMS Medical Center, were present to answer questions following the presentation by Mr. Bowes.

4.2 <u>Update on Internal Audit's Monitoring Actions Taken Since the Committees' March 28, 2018 Meeting:</u>

Chief Audit Executive Jacob Flournoy updated the committee on Internal Audit's monitoring of UAMS' management's action taken since March 28, 2018.

5. Report on the Joint Hospital Committee Meeting Held May 23, 2018:

Joint Hospital Committee Chair Eichler reported on the meeting held May 23, 2018, which included the approval of the minutes of the previous meeting held March 28, 2018. Upon motion by Trustee Eichler and second by Trustee Goodson, the following committee items were reported on and actions were approved by the full Board:

5.1 Approval of the Emergency Preparedness Report, UAMS:

The Board approved the Emergency Preparedness Report for April - May 2018 as presented by Dr. Richard Turnage.

5.2 UAMS & Baptist Graduate Medical Education (GME) Update:

Dr. Stephanie Gardner updated the Board on the Graduate Medical Education alliance between UAMS and Baptist Health.

5.3 Review of the Performance Improvement and Patient Safety Report, UAMS:

Dr. Richard Turnage reviewed the Performance Improvement and Patient Safety Report for the period ending May 2018.

5.4 Review of UAMS Clinical Enterprise Key Indicators, UAMS:

Interim Chief Financial Officer Amanda George reviewed the UAMS Integrated Clinical Enterprise Key Indicators for the period ending April 30, 2018.

5.6 Chief Executive Officer's Update, UAMS:

Dr. Richard Turnage presented an update on the status of the UAMS Cardiac Surgery Program.

6. Report on the Athletics Committee Meeting Held May 24, 2018:

Trustee Goodson, Chair of the Athletics Committee, reported on the meeting held May 24, 2018. Chair Goodson reported that Chancellor Andrew Rogerson of UALR introduced UALR's Athletic Director Chase Conque and new men's Head Basketball Coach Darrell Walker. The committee heard comments from both AD Conque and Coach Walker. Upon motion by Trustee Goodson and second by Trustee Broughton, the report was approved.

7. Report on Buildings and Grounds Committee Meeting Held May 24, 2018, and Approval of Actions Taken:

Chairman Goodson reported that the Buildings and Grounds Committee met on May 24, 2018 and moved that the actions of the Committee be approved by the Board; Trustee Gibson seconded the motion, and the following resolutions were adopted:

7.1 Approval to Demolish the HYPER II Building and the Strip Mall Located at 3300 Fair Park Boulevard, Little Rock, UALR:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the appropriate officials of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock shall be, and hereby are, authorized to contract for the demolition and removal of structures situated on the campus located at 3300 Fair Park Boulevard, Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas, and the HYPER II Building located on the UALR campus.

7.2 Project Approval for the Wrestling Facility, UALR:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the University of Arkansas at Little Rock's Wrestling Facility Construction Project is hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the President is authorized to enter into a short term lease of the property described in the project proposal, and that such lease shall provide for construction of the Wrestling Facility on such terms and conditions as are recommended by General Counsel and approved by the President.

7.3 Approval to Grant an Easement to the Little Rock Water Reclamation Commission, UALR:

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED THAT UAPB is authorized to undertake the projects described in the Gift Agreement, subject to applicable approval and procurement requirements described in this Board's policies and in Arkansas law.

7.5 <u>Project Approval and Selection of Design Professionals for the Kountz Kyle Renovation</u> Phase 3 Project, UAPB:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff is authorized to select AMR Architects as the design professionals for the Kountz Kyle Phase 3 Renovation Project.

7.6 Approval to Name the "Alvy Early Softball Field", UAM:

WHEREAS, Coach Alvy Early has served the University of Arkansas at Monticello with distinction for the past 39 years;

WHEREAS, Coach Early is the winningest college coach in Arkansas history, regardless of sport or division;

WHEREAS, Coach Early has served as a role model, mentor and positive influence on the young women he has coached;

WHEREAS, his contributions to UAM have created a lasting and indelible legacy;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board approves the naming of the softball field at the University of Arkansas at Monticello as the "Alvy Early Softball Field."

FUTHERMORE, the Board directs that this resolution shall be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and a copy shall be provided to Coach Alvy Early in recognition of the grateful appreciation of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas.

7.7 Project Approval and Selection of Design Professionals for the Wilhauf House Restoration Project, UAFS:

10. Campus Report: Dr. Andrew Rogerson, Chancellor, UALR:

Chancellor Andrew Rogerson gave a presentation about research at UA Little Rock and how research helps prepare students for the workplace and for graduate school. Chancellor Rogerson stated that UA Little Rock has 75 undergraduate, 56 master's and 10 doctoral degree programs and that 20 percent of the students enrolled at UA Little Rock are graduate students. In addition, UA Little Rock is classified as Doctoral/Moderate Research Activity (R3) which is the second highest research classification among traditional universities in Arkansas. Chancellor Rogerson also showed a video highlighting students and faculty who work together on major research projects, including breast cancer research and human trafficking. Dr. Rogerson then introduced Dr. Alex Biris, Chief Scientist and Director of the UA Little Rock Nanotechnology Center, and Dr. Carolina Cruz-Neira, Director of the George W. Donaghey Emerging Analytics Center, who both gave presentations about the cutting-edge research they are conducting with students including bone regeneration and data visualization. Finally, Chancellor Rogerson provided information about the success of students who graduate from UA Little Rock, noting that many go on to prestigious graduate schools like Yale, or to work for notable companies such as Acxiom and FIS.

11. President's Report: Dr. Donald R. Bobbitt, University of Arkansas System:

President Don Bobbitt thanked Chancellor and Mrs. Rogerson and their UA Little Rock colleagues for their exceptional hospitality in hosting the Board. He reported that the newly appointed chancellor at UAMS, Dr. Cam Patterson, will begin employment on June 1, 2018. Dr. Bobbitt recognized Stephanie Gardner and thanked her for her contributions as interim chancellor. Upon motion by Trustee Goodson and second by Trustee Broughton, the following resolution was approved:

WHEREAS, Stephanie F. Gardner, Pharm.D., Ed.D., has honorably and steadfastly led the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences as interim chancellor from Aug. 1, 2017 through May 31, 2018; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Gardner led the institution by reducing a \$70 million shortfall in the fiscal 2018 budget and presented the first balanced budget in many years to the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Gardner continued her role as provost to lead the academic affairs office at UAMS that offers 70 programs while serving as interim chancellor; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Gardner graduated the first class of physical therapy doctoral students on the UAMS Northwest Regional Campus, and opened a new \$10 million Family Medical Center on the UAMS West Regional Campus in Fort Smith and the first Family Medical Center in Helena on the UAMS East Regional Campus; and

WHEREAS, Research funding at UAMS grew 53 percent — from \$111.6 million in fiscal 2016 to \$170.6 million in fiscal 2017; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Gardner announced a statement of strategic intent with Baptist Health, reflecting the commitment of the two health organizations to offer a wider range of educational opportunities and deliver clinical care more efficiently, and formed the Baptist Health/UAMS Accountable Care Alliance to coordinate effective, high-quality care for patients receiving Medicare, initially caring for 50,000 Arkansans in 2018; and

WHEREAS, under Dr. Gardner's leadership, UAMS was chosen by the Home-Centered Care Institute as one of eight Centers of Excellence for its Home-Based Primary Care program, a first-of-its-kind program designed to make high-quality, home-based primary care a more common practice across the United States; and

WHEREAS, for the first time in several years, UAMS saw all of the 2017 graduating class of the UAMS College of Medicine "matched" with a residency after medical school, and was ranked for the fifth time in nine years in the top 10 nationwide for the percentage of its graduating class to pursue family medicine; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Gardner led UAMS to reaccreditation in 2017 for another 10 years by the Higher Learning Commission, the regional accrediting body for higher education institutions; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Gardner oversaw continued development of a new occupational therapy program, a collaboration with the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, with the expectation of accepting its first students in 2019; and

WHEREAS, under Dr. Gardner's leadership the campus was awarded an \$8.3 million grant by the National Cancer Institute for expansion and enhancement of an archive containing freely accessible cancer medical images and data, and was awarded a \$7 million National Institutes of Health (NIH) grant for the Arkansas Center for Health Disparities at UAMS for research on minority health disparities, including reducing tobacco smoke exposure among children in the Delta and studying HIV prevention among incarcerated African-Americans;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT, on motion duly made and seconded, the Board hereby bestows upon Stephanie F. Gardner, Pharm.D., Ed.D., its deepest and most sincere gratitude for her service to the UA System's academic medical center and to the state during a most challenging period in its distinguished history.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Secretary shall spread a copy of this resolution upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas and shall send a copy to Stephanie F. Gardner as an enduring pronouncement of the fondness and respect in which she is held by the members of the Board and the people of the State of Arkansas.

He then called on Chancellor Paul Beran, University of Arkansas at Fort Smith, who gave a brief presentation on his institution's workforce development efforts. These efforts have been recognized at the State level.

Chancellor Laurence B. Alexander requested approval of the updated Transit, Parking, and Traffic Regulations for the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. Upon motion by Trustee Harriman and second by Trustee Eichler, the following resolution was approved:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the attached Parking and Traffic Regulations of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff are hereby approved.

14. Approval to Correct a Date on an Agreement and Resolution Adopted at the May 21, 2015 Meeting, PCCUA:

Chancellor G. Keith Pinchback presented a request to correct a date on an agreement and resolution adopted at the May 21, 2015 Board meeting. The original agreement and resolution incorrectly stated the date Linda L. Killion would resign her position. Upon motion of Trustee Harriman and second by Trustee Eichler, the following resolution was approved:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the documentation submitted in support of the early retirement of Linda L. Killion, a division chairperson of the University of Arkansas (the "University") at its Phillips Community College campus, which was approved on May 21, 2015, be corrected to address a recently discovered scrivener's error in the original agreement and resolution. The original agreement and resolution incorrectly stated that Ms. Killion would resign her position on or before June 30, 2017. The correct date is June 30, 2018.

15. Approval of Parking Regulations, UA-PTC:

Chancellor Margaret Ellibee requested approval of the updated Transit, Parking, and Traffic Regulations for the University of Arkansas – Pulaski Technical College. Upon motion by Trustee Harriman and second by Trustee Nelson, the following resolution was approved:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the following parking and traffic regulations for the University of Arkansas – Pulaski Technical College are hereby approved:

VEHICLE REGISTRATION AND PARKING (Reviewed by UA-PTC on 4-24-18)

Every person who owns or operates a motorized vehicle on campus is required to register that vehicle and display the parking decal as instructed.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The Parking and Traffic Regulations have been designed to best utilize the facilities and maintain orderly parking and safe traffic flow. Please feel free to call upon the Office of Police and Public Safety if you need assistance.

In accordance with Act 328 of the 1967 General Assembly, the Board of Visitors of UA - Pulaski Technical College established the following rules and regulations for the registration

and operation of motor vehicles on UA - Pulaski Technical College's facilities. These rules and regulations are binding on all members of the faculty, staff and student body.

REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES

All students, faculty and staff members who operate vehicles and park on any facility of or at events sponsored by UA - Pulaski Technical College are required to register their vehicle.

Registration for students is required before the first day of classes. Each student may register up to two vehicles by providing the make, model, year, color and license plate number of each vehicle. Registration at events sponsored by the college will be at the discretion of campus police officers and/or the college administration. Students and employees who operate vehicles on campus must be registered.

When a vehicle is sold and another vehicle is brought onto campus, the new vehicle must be registered and a new decal obtained. If a parking decal becomes unreadable, a new decal must be obtained. Parking decals are not transferable to other students, non-students, faculty or staff.

DISPLAY OF PARKING DECALS*

Students may be issued up to two parking decals once they have completed the vehicle registration process. If a person chooses to register only one vehicle, they may only receive one decal. Students may obtain their decal, after they have registered their vehicle(s), from the Cashier's Window on the second floor of the Campus Center Building. The decal must be displayed on the outside, lower left of the driver's side back window.

All decals must be displayed clearly without obstruction of permit information. People who are permitted to park in donor spaces must also have a valid parking decal displayed on their vehicle to be considered in compliance with parking regulations.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND INFORMATION

Students and employees of UA-PTC may operate a motor vehicle on the college campus provided:

- 1. The operator has a valid driver's license.
- 2. The vehicle being operated on the campus meets state safety inspection standards, is legally licensed, and maintains vehicle insurance as required by the state law.
- 3. The vehicle is registered using the UA-PTC vehicle registration system.
- 4. The operator of the vehicle abides by the Parking and Traffic Regulations of the college.
- 5. The operator of the vehicle abides by motor vehicle and traffic laws as mandated by state law. All campus vehicle accidents must be reported to the Office of Police and Public Safety. It is understood that registration neither obligates the college to set aside a parking space for every vehicle registered nor permits the driver to violate parking and traffic regulations or Arkansas State Motor Vehicle Laws. All vehicle operators will observe and obey the orders of

the Police and Public Safety officers in the performance of their duties. This includes rendering and producing identification and proper registration when requested. UA - Pulaski Technical College assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or its contents. Please lock your vehicle. A traffic ticket or other communication on the vehicle from the college is an official notice. A recipient who does not comply with such communications will subject himself/herself to disciplinary action and/or arrest when applicable.

The college reserves the right to restrict or deny the use of any vehicle on the college campus if an operator violates Parking and Traffic Regulations or otherwise abuses the privilege of operating and parking a vehicle on the UA-PTC campus.

Vehicles may be towed from the campus at the owner's expense when: 1. The vehicle is parked on the UA-PTC campus after privileges have been revoked. 2. The vehicle is parked in a handicapped space (without proper tag or misuse of a permit), is blocking or partially blocking a street or driveway, is blocking or partially blocking sidewalks or crosswalks, is parked on the lawn, or is otherwise hindering the flow of traffic and/or parking. 3. Vehicles are abandoned and left parked in one location for a period of two weeks. 4. The operator ignores communications from the college concerning improper parking of his/her vehicle. 5. The vehicle is deemed unsafe by the Office of Police and Public Safety.

Students who owe a fee for a violation will have a hold placed on their student account, and they will be ineligible to receive an official transcript or register for classes until the obligation has been paid. Violation payments must be paid to the UA-PTC Cashier's Office, Monday through Friday, during normal business hours.

Student registered vehicles must park in all non-designated parking spaces. Faculty- and staff-registered vehicles may park in all spaces designated for faculty/staff parking when available.

Handicapped parking is exclusively reserved for vehicles legally and properly displaying a Handicapped Parking Permit issued by the State of Arkansas. Vehicles using the handicapped parking space (regardless of permit) must be transporting the handicapped individual that the permit was issued to assist and are subject to applicable state and federal laws.

The college reserves and marks with signage a limited number of parking spaces near the entrance of the Administration building and/or in designated areas. Visitor spaces are restricted to visitors of UA-PTC, not registered students, faculty or staff. Traffic cones are occasionally used to reserve visitor spaces for events. Individuals parking their vehicles and failing to observe the Visitor Parking areas will subject themselves to a parking violation.

The college reserves and marks with signage a designated number of parking spaces for faculty and staff. Unauthorized individuals parking their vehicles and failing to observe the Faculty/Staff Parking areas will subject themselves to a parking violation.

Donor parking is reserved exclusively for persons who have obtained that privilege from the UA-PTC Foundation Office. A donor hang tag is required to park in donor parking. The UA-PTC Foundation Office assigns donor spaces.

OTHER DRIVING REQUIREMENTS

- A. The campus speed limit is 10 mph except when conditions indicate a slower speed is necessary.
- B. All regulatory signs, pavement markings and/or traffic cones and barricades must be observed.
- C. Yield to pedestrians at all times.

OTHER PARKING REGULATIONS

- A. Vehicles must be parked within the boundaries of a single marked parking space.
- B. No parking is permitted on the lawn, in driveways, loading zones and open areas not marked for parking.
- C. Double parking and parking on the wrong side of the street are violations at all times.
- D. If a vehicle is improperly parked, whether attended or unattended, the driver is in violation.
- E. Vehicles in violation of parking regulations are subject to being towed at the owner's expense.

VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

- A. Individuals charged with violations of the UA-PTC Parking and Traffic Regulations will be issued the following violations:
 - 1. Reckless/unsafe driving \$25
 - 2. Invalid or no proof of license or vehicle insurance \$25
 - 3. Failure to observe sign, cone, barricade or officer \$25
 - 4. Speeding /too fast for conditions \$25
 - 5. Loud and raucous noise \$25
 - 6. Parking in a reserved area for faculty and staff, donor or visitors \$10
 - 7. No parking decal or invalid display on vehicle \$10
 - 8. Double parking/blocking street or restricted area \$10
 - 9. Parking in a no parking area or fire lane \$10
 - 10. Driving and/or parking on grass \$10
 - 11. Driving/parking wrong direction on one-way street \$10
 - 12. Parking over the marked line \$10
 - 13. Falsifying registration information \$10

Lack of space is not a valid excuse for violating parking regulations. Parking in violation of handicap regulations is also a citable offense at all UA-PTC sites. Officers may use discretion when issuing citations for handicap violations, and fines may vary. The amount of the fine will depend on whether the ticket issued is a campus or municipal citation.

A person receiving notice of a Parking or Traffic Violation is required to report to the Cashier's Office within 10 school days to pay the fees levied against him/her. Tickets not paid within 10 school days are subject to an additional penalty equal to the amount of the ticket. Students and employees are responsible for all traffic violations made by a vehicle displaying a decal issued to the student or employee. If you lend your car, proper operation of the vehicle is still your responsibility. If you transfer ownership of your car, remove the parking decal or you will be responsible for violations committed by the new owner.

UA - Pulaski Technical College Police and Public Safety officers maintain the right, as prescribed by law, to issue uniform traffic citations for any operator or vehicle violation committed within their jurisdiction. APPEALS Any person who feels that his or her vehicle has been unjustly ticketed may appeal. Appeals must be received within 10 business days after the issuance of the ticket or the right to appeal is forfeited. All appeals of parking violations will be considered with respect to the current UA-PTC parking policy. To file an appeal, obtain an appeal form from Student Services or the Office of Police and Public Safety, and complete the form in detail. The form may also be found on the Office of Police and Public Safety website at www.uaptc.edu. The appeal form should be submitted to the Office of Admissions and Records. The Non Academic Appeals Committee reviews the parking appeals once a month. The following are not accepted as valid extenuating circumstances for parking in violation of parking regulations, and an appeal will typically not be granted in these cases:

- An appeal based on how long the driver was parked in violation. Police/Public Safety
 Officers will issue a citation to any vehicle parked in violation of regulations. A parking
 restriction holds for parking for any period of time.
- An appeal based on the driver's need to get to class/work/an appointment on time. It
 typically requires a few minutes to locate a parking spot within the campus parking system.
 Drivers are urged to plan their schedules to allow sufficient time to find and park in a legal
 space.
- An appeal based on lack of parking space near a specific destination. Parking spaces near
 a specific entrance or building may be limited. The campus parking system does not
 guarantee a space in a specific lot. Drivers must park in a legal space within a valid lot.
- An appeal based on the assertion that class was not in session. Parking regulations are enforced throughout the entire calendar year and are not directly associated with the class schedule.
- An appeal of a restricted/prohibited violation during evening or weekend hours. All
 parking restrictions and prohibitions are enforced during normal college hours, including
 weekends, seven days per week.
- An appeal based on the assertion that the driver did not see the sign or line markings. It is
 the driver's responsibility to note and comply with all posted signage, notices and line
 markings.
- An appeal based on the assertion that the driver was unaware that a parking decal was needed. Drivers must display a decal in order to park legally on UA-PTC premises.
- An appeal based on vehicle malfunction. Drivers who experience a vehicle malfunction and cannot move their vehicle should contact the Office of Police and Public Safety for

assistance. Short-term authorization to remain parked may be received by the Office of Police and Public Safety. Four-way flashers are designed to warn other motorists that a vehicle may be a hazard. Use of four-way flashers does not allow a driver to park illegally for any period of time.

BP 425.5, University of Arkansas Retirement Program, BP 430.1, Self-Insured Major Medical Program (revised title to be "Self-Insured Major Medical Program and Self-Insured Dental Program"), and BP 430.2, Term Life and Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance (revised title to be "Basic and Optional Insured Employee Benefits Programs").

BOARD POLICY 425.5

UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS RETIREMENT PROGRAM

Effective July 1, 2018, the University of Arkansas Retirement Program is revised according to the attached resolution.

RESOLUTION

1. <u>Establishment of Plan</u>. This Retirement Resolution sets forth the provisions of the retirement plans for the University of Arkansas campuses established by the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas (the "University"), as of April 21, 1923, as amended and restated in its entirety effective July 1, 2018. The University of Arkansas Community Colleges Retirement Plan and the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith Retirement Plan have previously been combined into the University of Arkansas Retirement Plan, effective July 1, 2016. There shall be one plan-the University of Arkansas Retirement Plan ("RP") as

described in section 2. Contributions under the Plan shall be made pursuant to a 403(b) plan and 457(b) plan to investments selected by participants pursuant to Section 5. References to the "Retirement Plan" in these resolutions shall refer to the 403(b) Plan and 457(b) Plan components of the RP. The President shall adopt Retirement Plan documents which are consistent with this Board Policy.

2. Available Retirement Plans-University of Arkansas Retirement Plan.

- A. All of the campuses, divisions, units and entities of the University of Arkansas (collectively, "UAS") as identified in Exhibit A and A-1 and, with the approval of the Board, any additional campuses, divisions and units joining the UAS shall be included in the University of Arkansas Retirement Plan ("RP").
 - New eligible employees of the UAS shall participate in the RP. The University shall also contribute to Social Security for all employees subject to withholding.
- B. Notwithstanding paragraph A. above, for those employees of the UAS as of July 1, 2011 who were enrolled in the Arkansas Teachers Retirement System (ATRS) before July 1, 2011, participation shall continue in ATRS. No new employees shall be enrolled in ATRS on or after July 1, 2011. Also notwithstanding paragraph A. above, for those employees of the UAS as of July 1, 2016 and enrolled in the Arkansas Public Employee Retirement System (APERS) before July 1, 2016, participation shall continue in APERS. No new employees shall be enrolled in APERS on or after July 1, 2016. A former employee of the University who was enrolled in ATRS as of July 1, 2011, or was enrolled in APERS as of July 1, 2016, and who is subsequently reemployed by the University in a benefits eligible position, shall participate in the RP, and the University will not make further contributions to APERS or ATRS on account of such employee.
- C. Certain employees of University of Arkansas-Cooperative Extension Service participate in the Federal Civil Service Retirement Plan, and may participate in RP at a reduced employer contribution. Further certain other employees of University of Arkansas-Cooperative Extension Service participate in the Federal Employees Retirement System and may participate in the Federal Thrift Savings Plan, but do not participate in employer contributions under RP. New Cooperative Extension employees are not eligible for the federal plans, and have the same retirement options as employees of other campuses.
- 3. Eligibility for Employer Contributions. Full-time employees are eligible to participate in Employer contributions under the Retirement Plan, ATRS (if grandfathered as provided above) or APERS (if grandfathered as provided above). For purposes of the RP, "full-time employee" shall mean an employee who is employed half-time or greater and is on at least a nine-month appointment period. Employees who are seasonal, extra help, temporary or employees whose employment is incidental to their educational program

(including but not limited to student workers, graduate assistants, interns and residents) are not eligible for employer contributions.

4. Required Employee Contributions and Employer Contributions.

A. Effective July 1, 2016 and later, eligible Employees shall, as a condition of employment, be required to make employee contributions to the RP. The employee contributions as a percentage of Plan Compensation (as defined by the RP) are shown on Exhibits A and A-1 attached. Required employee contributions will begin as of date of employment.

In addition to the mandatory required employee contributions provided above, eligible employees may make voluntary Plan Contributions in any amount, subject to the contribution limitations of the Internal Revenue Code.

B. Employer contributions to RP for eligible employees will begin to accrue as of date of employment. The University employer contribution will be as shown on Exhibits A and A-1 attached.

Plan Compensation shall be defined as provided in the 403(b) Plan documents.

- C. Employee required contributions shall be made to the 403(b) Plan. Employee elective contributions by a participant will be made first to a 403(b) program and then may be made to a 457(b) program, if elected by the participant. University contributions will be made to the 403(b) contract or account.
- 5. Funding Sponsors/Investments. With input from the Chancellors, the Vice President for Agriculture, or the chief executive officers of the campuses, divisions and units, the President shall appoint a Retirement Committee. The Retirement Committee, with advice from the investment consultant retained by the University, shall be responsible for selection of the investment alternatives and retirement recordkeepers for the RP. A participant may select from among the investment alternatives available for participants. The Retirement Committee shall establish procedures for selection of investment alternatives in the event a participant fails to select investment alternatives. No investment alternatives other than those selected by the Retirement Committee are authorized.

6. Vesting.

A. Employees hired after June 30, 2016 or who first become eligible for employer contributions after June 30, 2016 shall be fully vested upon completion of two (2) years of service. If such an employee terminates before completion of two years of service, the accumulations attributable to Employer contributions in the Plans shall be forfeited. Employees shall be 100% vested in the employer contributions upon attainment of age 65, or upon death or disability while employed.

- B. Employees hired prior to July 1, 2016, shall be vested in the employer contributions in accordance with the vesting schedule in effect for such employees under the Board policies in effect prior to July 1, 2016.
- C. Participants terminating prior to July 1, 2016 shall be vested in the employer contributions in accordance with the Board policies in effect prior to July 1, 2016.
- D. The President shall provide in the plan documents rules concerning breaks in service for vesting purposes.
- E. All employee contributions to either the 403(b) plan or 457(b) plan are 100% vested.
- 7. <u>Distributions</u>. Plan provisions concerning distributions shall be as outlined in the separate 403(b) Plan documents and 457(b) Plan documents.
- 8. Spendthrift Clause. No participant in any of the Retirement Plans shall have any right to assign, pledge, encumber, or commute his/her interest in any benefits under the Retirement Plan, either voluntarily or involuntarily (except for a participant loan as permitted under the plans), and such benefits shall not in any way be subject to any legal process or levy of execution upon, or attachment or garnishment proceedings against, the same for the payment of any claim against any such person.
- 9. Amendment. The Board may amend these policies at any time. The President of the University or his delegate may amend any provision of either 403(b) Plan or 457(b) Plan so long as the amendment is not in conflict with these Board policies.
- 10. <u>Termination</u>. While it is expected that the retirement plans will continue indefinitely, the Board of Trustees reserves the right to discontinue the Retirement Plans at any time. Any termination cannot adversely affect the benefits accrued by participants prior to the date of discontinuance or modification.
- 11. <u>Administration</u>. The President of the University or the Retirement Committee named pursuant to section 5 may adopt rules and regulations for interpreting the Retirement Plans and for administering its provisions (including rules and regulations concerning funding sponsors) in a manner consistent with this Board Policy.

BOARD POLICY 430.1

<u>SELF-INSURED MAJOR MEDICAL PROGRAM AND SELF-INSURED DENTAL PROGRAM</u>

Effective July 1, 1990, the University of Arkansas established a self-insured major medical program. Effective July 1, 1990, the University also established a self-insured dental program.

The nature and extent of coverage for eligible employees and other eligible participants and the schedule of benefits shall be governed by the terms and conditions of the University of Arkansas Medical Benefit Plan Documents and the University of Arkansas Dental Plan Documents (together referred to as the "Plan Documents") each of which shall be approved by the President. A copy of the summary plan document for each plan will be made available to each eligible participant.

To be eligible for coverage and participate in either plan a person must be; an employee of the University of Arkansas who is employed to work 20 or more hours per week and holds at least a nine-month appointment; a resident, intern or house staff at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences campus; or an eligible retiree, eligible disabled employee, eligible dependent or other eligible participant, as defined by the Plan Documents.

The President shall contract with a company or companies qualified to do business in the State of Arkansas to provide for managed care and third-party administrative services and for other services in connection with the University of Arkansas Medical Benefit Plan. The President shall, in consultation with the Chancellors, the Vice President for Agriculture or chief executive officers of the campuses, divisions and units, establish from time to time the coverage and cost of coverage at the separate campuses, the Division of Agriculture, divisions and units for employee only, employee and spouse, employee and child and employee and family and the percentage of such cost to be paid by the employee and the University. The cost of coverage paid by the employee may vary for eligible employees who work less than full-time. The President shall advise the Board of any changes in the cost of coverage.

BOARD POLICY INSURED EMPLOYEE BENEFITS PROGRAMS

430.2

The University of Arkansas maintains insured benefits programs for eligible employees and other eligible participants.

Basic Life Insurance

The University makes available basic life insurance coverage for eligible employees of the University and other eligible participants in an amount equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the employee's base annual earnings, adjusted to the nearest multiple of \$1,000, subject to a maximum of \$50,000. Basic coverage is employer-paid for eligible employees of the University.

Basic Long-term Disability Insurance

The University makes available basic long-term disability insurance coverage for eligible employees and other eligible participants. Such basic coverage shall provide salary replacement for sixty percent (60%) of covered salary, subject to a salary maximum of \$20,000. Basic coverage is employer-paid for eligible employees of the University.

Basic Short-Term Disability Insurance

As selected by the University and at the election of each campus, the University will make available basic short-term disability insurance for eligible employees and other eligible participants. Such coverage shall provide salary replacement for sixty percent (60%) of covered salary. There shall be a two week elimination period. With the exception of maternity leave, all accrued leave balances must be exhausted prior to commencement of disability payments. Basic coverage is employer-paid for eligible employees of the University.

Optional Insurance

As selected by the University, and at the sole cost of the employee or other eligible participant, eligible employees and eligible participants may also obtain optional life insurance, optional long-term disability insurance, optional short-term disability insurance, dependent life and accidental death and dismemberment insurance and other optional insurance coverages.

For both the basic and optional programs, eligibility for participation, the extent of coverage for eligible employees, dependents and other eligible participants, and the schedule of benefits and premiums, shall be governed by the terms and conditions of the Plan Documents. The President shall approve the Plan Documents and determine the carrier or

carriers for the forgoing insurance. Eligible participants shall include employees of the University of Arkansas who are employed to work 20 or more hours per week and hold at least a nine-month appointment, and other eligible participants defined as such in the Plan Documents.

20. Approval of Revision to Board Policy 470.2, Establishment and Administration of Endowments, All Campuses and Units:

Upon motion by Trustee Harriman and second by Trustee Gibson, the following resolution was approved:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT Board Policy 470.2, Establishment and Administration of Endowments, is hereby revised in its entirety as attached.

BOARD POLICY 470.2

INVESTMENT AND ADMINISTRATION OF ENDOWMENTS AND OPERATING FUNDS

I. General Delegation of Authority to Accept and Establish Endowments.

The authority to act in the name of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas to establish endowments and the authority to accept gifts to establish endowments is delegated to the President, the Chief Financial Officer, the Chancellors, and the Vice President for Agriculture, subject to the provisions and restrictions in this Board policy, Systemwide Policies and Procedures issued by the President supplementing this Board policy, and applicable law.

II. Administration and Investment of Operating Funds and University-Held Endowments.

Although Endowment gifts may be made directly to the University, the University of Arkansas Foundation, Inc. ("UA Foundation"), or to other authorized institutionally-related foundations of the UA system, the primary and preferred repository for endowment gifts supporting academic programs, research or maintenance of facilities is the UA Foundation. Those endowment gifts that are made directly to the University and held in University accounts shall be administered by the campus benefiting from such endowment. The responsibility for investing University-held endowments and operating funds may be delegated to one or more investment managers consistent with Arkansas law and the University's investment policies. University-held endowments and any operating funds that need to be invested pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 19-4-805 shall be administered and invested under the supervision of a systemwide investment advisory committee. The committee shall be chaired by the Chief Financial Officer and include the chief financial officers from a number of campuses, divisions, or units. The Chief Financial Officer shall periodically, and at least annually, review the administration and performance of these investments and advise the Board of this review.

III. Endowment Agreements.

Unless created by a bequest or devise through a donor's will or trust, a signed endowment gift agreement is required to establish an endowment account. Any gift agreement for the establishment of an endowment shall require the review of the General Counsel's office prior to its execution or shall be on a standard form previously approved by the General Counsel's office. Endowments created by will or trust shall require the review of the General Counsel's office prior to acceptance and, following review, such endowments may be accepted by the Chancellors and the Vice President for Agriculture.

IV. Reporting of Endowments to the Board of Trustees.

All endowments established by will, trust, gift agreement or otherwise shall be reported to the Board at any regular or special meeting within a reasonable time after such endowment is established. The Chairman of the Board, or officials of the University designated by the Chairman, or the President, may, at the request of a Chancellor or the Vice President for Agriculture, acknowledge endowments by a Certificate of Endowment bearing the seal of the University. The Certificate may be presented by the Chancellor, the Vice President for Agriculture or the President to the donor or a representative of the donor in such manner as they deem appropriate. Certificates of Endowment may be presented after an endowment has been established and in advance of the endowment being reported to the Board at a regular or special meeting.

V. Minimum Requirements for Named Endowments.

The campuses, divisions and units of the University of Arkansas system differ substantially in terms of size, donor base, organizational structure and academic programs offered. As a result, it is contemplated that the minimum level of funding required to establish named endowments for prizes or awards, scholarships, lectureships, professorships and chairs as set forth hereafter may be lower than deemed appropriate by some divisions, units or campuses of the University of Arkansas system. The President may authorize a greater amount for named endowments at the request of the chief executive officer of a campus, division or unit of the University of Arkansas system and also may authorize the creation of other named endowments, including definite term endowments, and the minimum amounts required to establish such endowments. Endowments which the University has committed to donors to establish under minimum requirements previously in effect shall continue to be eligible to become named endowments upon achieving the amount set forth under the previous policies of the Board. The following minimum levels for named endowments may be inclusive of any matching grants from the State of Arkansas or other matching funding source.

VI. Standard Terms and Conditions of Endowment Gift Agreements.

The following terms and conditions shall be applicable to all endowments supporting the University of Arkansas system and shall be incorporated in the endowment gift agreement regardless whether such terms and conditions are specifically set forth in the agreement:

1. Endowment gifts made to the University, the UA Foundation, or another University of Arkansas system institutionally-related foundation authorized to receive endowment gifts shall be subject to the applicable spending policy of the entity receiving the gift. The primary objective of the spending policies governing UA system endowments is to provide a steady cash flow from the endowment that supports the purposes for which the endowment was established while at the same time protecting the endowment's purchasing power over the long-term. Consistent with the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA"), the policy for appropriation for expenditure of amounts from an endowment fund, such spending policies may allocate a portion of the annual spending from endowments to the reasonable and necessary costs of administering the endowment by the University,

the UA Foundation or other institutionally-related foundations and to efforts of the University through its development offices to increase and enhance the endowment through other gifts and endowments. Recognizing that an appropriate spending policy seeks to achieve the maximum prudent distributions over the long-term under changing economic and market conditions, the University, the UA Foundation and other institutionally-related foundations may amend their spending policies to adjust spending rates and amounts allocated to offset administrative costs and development overhead from time to time as may be consistent with UPMIFA. Any change to a spending policy shall be applicable to all endowments held by the entity regardless of the date of the endowment's creation. Amounts or percentages allocated for administrative expenses of the University, for support of the University's development activities and for UA Foundation and other institutionally-related foundation overhead shall be identified in promotional materials and communications used by the University in soliciting funding.

- 2. The investment of an endowment, and reinvestment from time to time, shall be governed by the investment policies of the University, the UA Foundation or other institutionally-related foundations holding the endowment. In the interest of efficiency and to promote prudent management and oversight, all endowment gifts should be eligible for commingling for investment purposes with other endowment funds, but each endowment shall be accounted for separately so that endowment fund will be clearly identified at all times.
- 3. An endowment shall also consist of such other property or money which may be received by gift, bequest or devise in the future from individuals, firms, foundations, estates or other entities and which shall be accepted by the University, UA Foundation or other institutionally-related foundations holding the endowment. When such gift, bequest or devise is accepted, it shall be credited to and held as a part of the endowment, provided that the name of the endowment, and any designation of it as an endowment, shall not be changed as a consequence of any other gift, bequest or devise made to it.
- 4. The University, the UA Foundation and other institutionally-related foundations holding endowments may contract with professional custodians and investment managers or advisors to hold, invest and reinvest an endowment and the cost of such custodial services and investment management shall be paid by the endowment with each endowment account bearing its pro rata share of such costs.
- 5. If because of changed conditions, it becomes impossible or impracticable to fulfill the purposes for which an endowment is established, the Board may direct that the endowment be used for other purposes as closely related as possible to those purposes for which the endowment was established. In such event, the University will, to the extent practicable, consult with the donor or the donor's heirs, descendants, personal

representatives, legal representatives or officers, or other such persons as may be appropriate.

6. Restrictions as to eligible beneficiaries of an endowment shall be consistent with applicable law. To the extent an endowment shall be determined to be illegal or unconstitutional, the Board may change the endowment to comply with the applicable law and to accomplish, as nearly as possible, the purposes of the endowment.

VII. Waiver of Endowment Policy.

The provisions of this Board Policy may be waived or modified by the President in his discretion when he determines that this is in the best interest of the University to do so. As an example, and not in limitation of this authority, such action may be taken in those instances where foundations or corporate donors have standard form endowment agreements or provisions which they customarily require to be included in any endowment.

WHEREAS, Mrs. Crandall is a respected colleague and a beloved teacher held in highest regard by her peers and students, for which she received the 2012 Lifetime Achievement Image Award for the University of Arkansas Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People;

Dr. Patsy Watkins, Emeritus Resolution

William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Arkansas, retired on January 31, 2018, having joined the University of Arkansas in 1984, where she served as chair of the Lemke Journalism Department from 1992 to 2010; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Watkins received her B.A. and M.A. in journalism from the University of Texas, and Ph.D. in American studies from the University of Iowa (1991). Dr. Watkins worked in newspaper reporting, magazine editing, freelance graphic design, radio, and university public relations. In addition, she was a congressional legislative assistant for Texas Congressman J.J. Pickle, and for 10 years had her own small press publishing company, Picadilly Press, where she published 30 books of poetry and short stories; and

6. REASON FOR PROPOSED ACTION:

The Department of Art + Design is proposing to modify our current M.A. in Art to make it more flexible and to revitalize the program. Through interviews with past graduate students and applicants to the program, we have identified several factors that have contributed to our decline in enrollment and student satisfaction. The following requested changes are aimed at correcting these issues. These factors include: inflexible curriculum structure; isolation of students from peers and faculty due to siloed teaching approach; overly restrictive admission requirements (Studio Art Concentration) and thesis requirement for MA.

To Address Inflexible Curriculum Structure:

The Department of Art + Design currently offers an M.A. in Art with concentration areas in Studio Art, 3D Studies and Art History. To address the inflexible curriculum structure, we propose to combine the current 3D Studies and Studio Art concentration areas and merge them into a single concentration area, to be called the Visual Art concentration. The rationale is to enable students to combine studies in 2D and 3D art media, instead of forcing a separation between these areas of study. This change will align graduate-level studio art study at UA Little Rock with contemporary art making practices, as it is common for working artists in today's art world to explore many mediums and methods in pursuit of a conceptual idea when making art. It will also provide an opportunity for more efficient use of faculty

load and department resources, as intermedia study opens the possibility of pooling resources when appropriate. The concentration in Art History will not be affected by this change.

Enrollment in the M.A. in Art has declined in recent years. Our most recent student graduated in December of 2017 and no graduate students are currently enrolled in the Studio Art or 3D Studies concentrations as of January 2018. The Department of Art + Design has concluded that changes must be made to the program in order to maintain a creative and flexible atmosphere for students and to increase enrollment in the graduate program to a healthy level. Because the creation of the new concentration will happen simultaneously with the deletion of the 3D Studies and Studio Art concentration areas, no new faculty or resources are required to make this change, and because no students are currently enrolled in the program none will be negatively affected by this change. No new students will be accepted into the 3D Studies and Studio Art concentration areas as of Spring 2018 to ensure a smooth transition. The goal date for students to be accepted into the M.A. in Art /Visual Art concentration is Fall of 2019.

It is the goal of the Department of Art + Design to increase enrollment in the Visual Art concentration to 20 graduate students per semester, not including graduate students in the Art History concentration. These moderate enrollment goals are due to limitations in the amount of personal studio spaces available for graduate student use in the Windgate Center of Art + Design. Graduate students will be a valuable addition to the program, as they provide mentorship for undergraduate students, and if granted one of the two teaching assistantships awarded to the department can replace adjunct faculty in teaching some undergraduate classes.

As educators, it is important to prepare students for success in the art world, but the current design of our M.A. program is to separate the 2-D media studio art concentrations from 3-D work, and within the 2-D disciplines to require students to work primarily within only one medium. Because of this structure, not only are students discouraged from working across media, but students within different concentrations are never given the opportunity to work together as a group. This denies them the opportunity to develop the important relationships that aid in retention through the graduate program, learning through collaboration and peer critique, and developing the professional network that will support them throughout their artistic careers.

The M.A. in Art with a concentration in Visual Art will offer tremendous flexibility within the studio art courses. Instead of taking a series of classes such as Graduate Photography I -VII or Graduate Painting I - VII, students will take a general Graduate Studio sequence of classes and study with the desired faculty under a unique section number. This simplification in class naming and organization will allow us to suspend 42 obsolete studio graduate classes from the program's offerings, while also providing needed flexibility. If a student feels inspired to produce photographs and print them on ceramic forms, for example, they would have the flexibility to take subsequent or simultaneous sections of the Graduate Studio classes with the appropriate faculty to create the desired artwork, with the approval of their M.A. Committee and the Graduate Coordinator. Within our current degree, this diversity can only be explored within an extremely limited number of elective hours. If the student desires a more traditional approach within a single art medium, the student would study primarily with the faculty working in that medium in the new program, so the opportunity for tightly focused study remains an option if that is where their creative muse leads. Additionally, students will have the opportunity of taking 3 credit hours of either MGMT 5383 Issues in Entrepreneurship, or ARED 7320 Art Education for the Professional Artist I. These classes

will provide students with valuable real world skills in creating and sustaining a small creative business, or in practical teaching skills if they wish to pursue a career in academia.

To Address Student Isolation:

To address the issue of student isolation, the M.A. in Art with a concentration in Visual Art will also offer students the opportunity to work closely with their peers. A new series of Integrated Practice courses will be a required part of the program. This class will be comprised of critique, visiting artist lectures, studio visits, professional practice and discussion of current art events, and is held every semester of the three-semester curriculum plan. This stacked course will provide a needed opportunity for cohort bonding and peer review. The creation of a graduate-only class would also help with faculty load, as the current class structure results in all 7000-level graduate classes being a form of independent study. Students will also present their work in a full-faculty critique once per semester, to ensure that they have an opportunity to interact and receive feedback from all art faculty.

To Address Overly Restrictive Entrance Requirements:

The admission requirements for the Studio Art concentration are currently overly restrictive and do not represent typical requirements for contemporary studio art programs. The 3D Studies concentration was developed more recently and reflects reasonable admission standards. The Visual Art concentration will be similar to the current 3D Studies requirements, which is also in close alignment with requirements at the University of Arkansas.

To Address Written Thesis Requirement:

Our existing MA requires a written thesis, and this will be removed in the proposed program. In the field of fine art, the MFA is the terminal professional degree and is required to teach at the university level. The MA is often pursued by students who wish to attain an MFA, but need to build the skills or portfolio to be accepted into an MFA program, or for students who wish to become working artists and are seeking to improve their artwork. Although the ability to write about their work and place it in both an historical and contemporary context is a critical skill and will be required in the proposed program, a written thesis at the MA level is unusual and excessive. The new program will shift the emphasis to the exhibition and the creation of a body of work, which is where the real work and research of an artist lies.

7. NEW OPTION/EMPHASIS/CONCENTRATION/MINOR OBJECTIVE:

The goal of the M.A. in Art with an concentration in Visual Art is to educate artists who balance craftsmanship, composition and concept, who think creatively and critically, and are able to solve problems and pursue artistic ideas through to the completion of a successful body of work. Students from a wide range of creative backgrounds will be given the opportunity to study the materials and techniques that lead to their unique artistic expression, including intermedia, drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture, ceramics, furniture design & woodworking, metalsmithing & jewelry, graphic design, illustration, or photography. Because of the Integrative Practice courses, students will work together as a group, participate in peer review throughout the program, and develop a cohort that will strengthen their artwork, creative practice, and professional network. As the graduate coordinator, Asst. Professor Joli Livaudais will develop marketing materials and make scheduled visits to regional university art programs to aid in program recruitment. The enrollment goals are to have 20 students enrolled in the Visual Art concentration each semester. This number does not include students enrolled in the Art History concentration. These moderate enrollment goals are due to limitations in the amount of personal studio spaces available for graduate

student use in the Windgate Center of Art + Design, and could be expanded if private graduate studios can be secured on campus in alternate facilities, such as in some of the evacuated spaces in the FA building or in University Plaza.

The enrollment goals are to increase enrollment to 20 M.A./Visual Art students enrolled in the program per semester. This does not include students enrolled in the Art History concentration area. These moderate enrollment goals are due to limitations in the amount of personal studio spaces available for graduate student use in the Windgate Center of Art + Design, and could be expanded if private graduate studios can be secured on campus in alternate facilities, such as in some of the evacuated spaces in the FA building or in University Plaza. As the graduate coordinator, Asst. Professor Joli Livaudais will develop marketing materials and make scheduled visits to regional university art programs to aid in program recruitment.

The Computer Science Education program, within the Department of Curriculum and Instruction, is designed to provide education graduates and professionals with the necessary theory practical skills, and competencies to become effective school teachers. This professional program of study will enhance candidates intellectual understanding, build teaching capacity skills, and position candidates to provide quality instruction in grades four through twelve.

8. NEEDS SUMMARY:

The primary purpose for creating a Master of Education in Computer Science program at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff is to prepare qualified teachers to address the demand of the shortage of teachers in the Delta region, state, and beyond. The program

seeks to expand and diversify the pool of STEM educators by preparing enthusiastic educators as change agents in Arkansas K-12 schools to teach Computer Science. More specifically, the purpose of the program is to offer school educators the opportunity to explore and apply discipline-based concepts, research findings, and models of inquirythat will provide our students unlimited opportunities to develop and further their interest in seeking Computer Science education. The program is intended to serve those who are seeking a degree to work in elementary, middle and secondary schools.

The proposed Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree program in Computer Science Education contributes to the expansion and diversity of the STEM workforce in the region and nation. Despite the improvement in the number of African-American science and mathematics teachers, the share of these teachers as compared to the need continues to be small. In addition, there is an immediate need to increase the number of graduates with degrees in Computer Science, Technology, or related disciplines. The rapidly growing sector of technology-based jobs in all industries have created a need for technologically-skilled professionals who can fill these positions.

The proposed project addresses the urgent need for computer science teaching workforce at the public secondary schools. The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff received a \$2.5 million dollar grant to support the creation and implementation of a Master of Education Program in Computer Science. This grant awarded to the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff would improve the number and diversity of well-trained teachers who have the computer science background plus the pedagogical skills to teach the content under the new Arkansas law. Currently, there are no master's level computer science education programs in the state of Arkansas and only one baccalaureate program (Henderson State University) preparing teachers for licensure in this demanding area. This program will expand and diversify the pool of the STEM workforce by preparing Masters level STEM teachers in computer science to help address the shortage of the computer science labor force in the Delta region, state, and beyond.

Program Five-Year Enrollment Estimate

The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) M.Ed. Program in Computer Science is designed to prepare qualified teachers in Arkansas's schools, grades 4-12. The candidates will be educators who hold a teaching license or bachelor degree or higher in STEM disciplines desiring a license to teach Computer Science. The candidates will enroll full-time and part-time. With the support of the grant, new admissions will range between 15-20 students annually, resulting in the projected enrollment reflected below:

9. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Master's degree in Computer Science Education builds on the existing M.S. Degree in Computer Science and Technology and the master level education courses required for teacher certification. The M.Ed. degree program will use a combination of courses from the existing M.S.

degree in Computer Science and Technology (18 hours) and the core education requirements for the M.Ed. (18 hours). Specifically, the curriculum will require 36 hours: 15 core education hours, 18 hours of specialization courses in computer science, and a 3 hour educational foundation elective.

All graduate programs within the School of Education share the same core courses to ensure that candidates are knowledgeable of research-based pedagogical applications: InTASC standards [2, 3], Teacher Excellence and Support System (TESS) [6], and as well as teaching strategies in STEM [2, 3]. Additional hours may be required after a transcript analysis by the advisor.

Students involved in these degree programs will be required to do field experiences in area school districts to enhance the learning environments of students enrolled in grades four through twelve as they prepare for teaching.

The courses for the computer science core were selected to provide students with the necessary pre-requisite knowledge for the PRAXIS Computer Science (C.S.) content. An option for a technology internship is offered to give teachers practical experience in the field, which would allow them to better incorporate real-world industry examples into their teaching strategy. The 18 hours of Computer Science specialization courses will be selected by the advisor to allow the students to gain a deeper understanding of computer science with regards to application areas including advanced databases, bioinformatics, intelligent systems (applied Artificial Intelligence-A.I.) and distributed computing (High Performance Computing-HPC).

Program Plan of Study

The Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Computer Science will have two tracks.

TRACK 1—LICENSED--For licensed teachers in mathematics education, science education or related areas of education.

TRACK 2—SEEKING LICENSURE: For those without a standard teaching license and seeking licensure in Computer Science Education. (1) Complete the same General Core, Specialization and elective (s) from Track 1 and (2) Other requirements.

Course Descriptions

The following are course descriptions for the proposed M.Ed. in Computer Science graduate degree program.

GEDU 5301 History and Philosophy of Education

This course analyzes major historical and philosophical developments of early childhood through secondary education and their impact on American education.

GEDU 5309 Computer-Assisted Instruction

Requires development of computer proficiency and treat applications of computer technology to the improvement of instruction.

GEDU 5324 Curriculum and Development

This course is designed to examine the principles underlying the development of a K-12 school curriculum. Emphasis will be placed on historical, philosophical, theoretical, and societal impact on early childhood, middle level and secondary school curriculum.

GEDU 5315 Instructional Technology

Treats basic media and instructional design with applications of state-of-the art technology.

GEDU 5320 Applications of Statistics and Research

This course emphasizes rudimentary statistics, research design and understanding of research leading to a research proposal on a current issue in education that will be developed into the graduate thesis or capstone experience.

GEDU 5322 Psychological Foundations of Teaching and Learning

This course provides an in-depth study of the learning process. It explores how the application of psychology to the teaching and learning process fosters and strengthens learning opportunities

GEDU 5336 Assessing Classroom Learning

This course investigates normative and criterion-referenced approaches to the assessment of learning. Consideration will be given to traditional and alternative methods of assessing student performance and the construction of instructional objectives; lesson plans and varied test items to assess classroom learning. Research and/or clinical experiences are required.

GEDU 5364 Teaching Diverse Learners

A study of the parameters of culture and how they affect human relations and the educational process.

GSPE 5363 Behavior Management

A course designed to improve skills among teachers and children in various classroom settings.

GSPE 5376 Differentiated Instruction in the Regular Classroom

Educators will learn how to plan instruction to accommodate all of the learning styles and modalities and behavior patterns of a diverse group of learners within a classroom setting so that they will be successful in courses that they take.

GEDU 5399 Internship

Supervised educational experience designed to provide practical participation in selected settings to gain experience in the application of concepts, principles, and theories related to the student's area of specialization and professional goals. Internship experiences are planned and directed under the guidance of a faculty member. Requires departmental approval.

GEDL 5302 Public School Law

A study of legal principles that relate to such matters as authority, responsibility, and liability of principals, teachers, students with disabilities, school boards, districts, and state and federal organizations.

GCST 5344 Networking & Security 3 Credits (3 hrs. Lecture)

This course provides an advanced understanding of the technical and management aspects of computer networking and security. The course builds on the knowledge and skills students have acquired in prior courses, such as CPSC 3344— Networking. Students are presumed to have a general understanding of information technology and its applications.

GCST 5331 Software Engineering 3 Credits (2 hrs. Lecture, 1 hrs. Lab)

This course will offer students advance topics in the discipline of software engineering in which students will study a collection of methods, which embody an "engineering" approach to the development of computer software and their impact on the associated hardware. The major work of the course will be group project. The course will be divided into two halves, in the first half students will analyze and design a moderately large software project. In the second half students will undertake the implementation, testing, release, and maintenance of the project that was started in the first half.

GCST 5345 Programming Concepts 3 Credits (2 hrs. Lecture, 1 hr. Lab)

This course provides students with a comprehensive understanding of the tools and problem-solving methodologies related to computer programming. The primary focus will be underlying problem-solving and information-gathering techniques. The course will cover topics on the general concepts and syntax, whereas the lab aspect will focus on implementation and practice. Students will be exposed to high-level programming logic, variables, programming tools, decision-making structures, loop structures and data structures beyond the standard undergraduate course.

GCST 5322 Advanced Robotics 3 Credits (2 hrs. Lecture, 1 hr.. Lab)

This course will introduce students to advanced topics in robotics and their associated technologies, and algorithms. Application of artificial intelligence tools and techniques to computer integrated manufacturing systems, including maintenance, product design, process planning, factory scheduling and control, robotics, and intelligent warehouse systems is also presented.

GCST 5394 Advanced Database Systems 3 Credits (2 hrs. Lecture, 1 hr. Lab)

This course is an advanced graduate course on database systems. It gives an overview of a few key research topics in database systems, including information retrieval (IR), principles of semi-structured XML databases and security and privacy from the database perspective. Course readings are drawn from recent top-tier international database conferences and journals.

GCST 5389 Distributed Systems 3 Credits (3 hrs. Lecture)

This is an introductory graduate level course in distributed systems. It will expose students to theoretical as well as practical aspects of designing such systems. The course assumes that the student has some familiarity with programming. Topics covered in the course include: models of distributed computation, resource allocation, global property evaluation, global computation, consensus, and fault-tolerance.

GCST 5356 Intelligence Systems 3 Credits (2 hrs. Lecture, 1 hr. Lab)

This course will provide a comprehensive introduction to the foundation in the field of intelligence system design at the operational, tactical, and strategic levels. Topics such as process analysis and design, transaction processing systems, management information systems, and executive systems will be covered, along with other topics relevant to the fields of computer science and engineering.

GCST 5346 Bioinformatics 3 Credits (3 hrs. Lecture)

This is a practical "hands-on" course in bioinformatics that will emphasize how to use computers and the web as tools to analyze and represent large collections of biological sequence and structure data. Prerequisites include a basic understanding of biological sciences and some mathematics and statistics, but no prior knowledge of computer programming or computer hardware is necessary.

GCST 5300 Technology Internship 3 Credits (3 hrs. Lab) This course is designed to provide students with an opportunity to gain work experience that will enhance and complement their academic learning. The course requirements are designed to provide a structure that will enable students to make connections between what they learn in the classroom and on the job, to further develop analytical and interpersonal skills, and to practice technical writing skills in real-world settings.

GCST 5320 Project Management & Managing Operations 3 Credits (3 brs. Lecture)

Students will learn how project management roles are changing as innovative contracts, alternate delivery systems, alternative dispute resolution, and creative project financing are increasingly changing how projects are administered. In addition, students will learn about cost and risk control as well as developing and applying policies and procedures. Other topics will include subcontractor management, purchasing and project financing. Project start up and close out techniques will be covered.

10. PROGRAM PARTNERSHIPS:

Districts, schools and community partners are organizations outside of UAPB that have agreed to sit on the Teacher Education Committee and to sponsor students in course projects and field experience. The Teacher Education Committee and members from the Computer Science program will meet annually regarding the M.Ed. in Computer Science degree program and will consist of School of Education faculty members, Computer Science faculty members, appropriate departmental faculty, appointed districts and school and local community partners. The purpose of the meeting will be to review the program curriculum to ensure that it is offering cutting-edge knowledge and experiences for preparing qualified educators.

The Educational Leadership program, within the Department of Curriculum and Instruction, is designed to provide education graduates and professionals with the necessary theory practical skills, and competencies to become effective school administrators. This professional program of study will enhance intellectual understanding, deepen leadership capacity, and position candidates for elevated organizational responsibility and expanded community or civic influence.

7. NEEDS SUMMARY:

The primary purpose for creating the Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Educational Leadership degree program at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) is to train well-prepared and highly qualify administrative leaders as change agents in Arkansas K-12 schools. The M.Ed. in Educational Leadership program will provide exceptional and important resources to the community, and state. More specifically, the purpose is to offer educational personnel who hold a teaching license the opportunity to explore and apply discipline-based concepts, research findings, and models of inquiry in educational teadership. Additionally, the program is intended to serve those candidates who are aspiring to become an elementary, middle or secondary school building principal, a general school administrator or supervisor.

This proposed program supports the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff mission statement: To promote and sustain excellent academic programs that integrate quality instruction, research and student learning experiences responsive to the needs of a racially, culturally, and economically

diverse student population. Graduates with a M.Ed. in Educational Leadership degree program will serve highly qualified candidates for education leadership and administrative positions in counties and districts, the state department of education, education centers, private organizations, plus many more. This program will provide exceptional and important resources to both the economic and social fabric of the great state of Arkansas.

In January 2018, a survey of district leaders from the communities of Pine Bluff and Sulfur Springs within Jefferson County was conducted and the majority, eighty-nine (89%) percent, indicated hiring preferences for those who graduate with a Master of Education degree in Educational Leadership. Thirty-five (35%) percent reported they currently have employment opportunities for building principals, assistant building principals, directors and academic deans. Over eighty (80%) percent surveyed indicated that they would have an increased need in the next two to five (2 to 5) years for employment opportunities in these positions.

The most appropriate measure of the need for a program is for graduates of the UAPB M.Ed. in Educational Leadership program can be found in the Occupational Outlook Handbook as reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Per the BLS, employment opportunities for elementary and secondary principals are similar to that of teachers and are projected to grow eight (8%) percent from 2016 to 2026. The growth is based on the increases in school enrollment and the number of educational institutions. In 2015, there were two hundred thirty-one thousand, five hundred (231,500) job positions in educational leadership as elementary, middle, and high school principals, and this number is expected to increase by 2026 by nineteen thousand, eight hundred (19,800) job positions.

8. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Educational Leadership Program at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff offers a planned sequence of study for those candidates seeking a Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree in Educational Leadership. The Educational Leadership program, within the Department of Curriculum and Instruction, is designed to provide education graduates and professionals with the necessary theory, practical skills, competencies and dispositions to become effective school administrators. This professional program of study will enhance intellectual understanding; deepen leadership capacities, and position candidates for elevated organizational responsibility and expanded community or civic influence. From this knowledge base, the program of study includes experiences to prepare candidates to assume leadership roles in educational organizations and to hold related professional positions in government, as well as, the private sector.

The academic requirements of the M.Ed. in Educational Leadership (MEEL) degree will be comprised primarily of coursework, field experience and internship, and a comprehensive examination. The M.Ed. graduate degree requires a minimum of thirty-six (36) semester units of graduate coursework that will consist of the following: nine (9) units of requisites; eighteen (18) units consisting of six (6) core courses; six (6 units) consisting of electives; three (3) units in addition to a required Internship. The program will link theory, research and practice in creative ways, and the thirty-six (36) semester credit hours may be completed within two years with a continuous commitment to full-time enrollment. The proposed program is to be offered in the evenings and on Saturdays through traditional instruction on campus.

COURSE LISTING

GELP 5301/GEDU 5301: History and Philosophy of Education

This course analyzes major historical and philosophical developments of early childhood through secondary education and their impact on American education.

GELP 5302: Foundations of Educational Leadership

Students will study behaviors and concepts related to leadership. Specifically, it will actively engage students in the acquisition of information about historical and contemporary theories, concepts, and issues associated with educational leadership.

GELP 5302/GEDU 5302: Public School Law

A study of legal principles that relate to such matters as authority, responsibility and liability of principals, teachers, students with disabilities, school boards, districts and state and federal organizations.

GELP 5304: Multicultural Aspects of Governance

This course is designed to enable students to examine and survey various anthropological, historical, sociological and political perspectives on multicultural education and apply relevant theories and principles to educational practices in different educational settings. The student should be able to identify what the essentials are to meanings of terms and concepts to understand how individual human differences can thrive and how our differences may suffer from the influence of people and groups.

GELP 5305: Human Resource Management

The course uses problem-based units on teacher recruitment and hiring, role playing on effective mentoring, video evaluations of teacher practices, and strategies for removing incompetent teachers. This course examines the role of the human resource professional as a strategic partner in managing today's organizations. Key functions such as recruitment, selection, development, appraisal, retention, compensation, and labor relations are examined. Implications of legal and global environments are appraised and current issues such as diversity training, sexual harassment policies and rising benefit costs are analyzed. Best practices of employers of choice are considered.

GELP 5306: Technology Applications for Administrators

This course is designed to enhance the computer literacy for educational administrators in the field of education and provide exposure to a wide spectrum of electronic technology in administration and a classroom setting. Attention will be paid to technologies that permit access to all branches of education. GELP 5307: School, Parent and Community Relations

The focus of this course is an investigation and study of the principles, skills, tasks, practices and communication ability of the school administrator to help maintain open communication between the school and the community. This course is designed to help administrators manage information about their schools and to receive or disseminate it properly. Also, to work collaboratively with all stakeholder to effective create a positive learning environment. The study of various media and constituents, as well as a variety of experiences relating to the public relations function of the school and district, is treated as a function of collaborative leadership.

GELP 5308: Advanced Supervision and Assessment of Teaching and Learning

This course is designed to develop skills required to systematically analyze and plan by making data driven decisions to improve instruction. Particular emphases will be placed on effective teaching models and the Correlates of Effective Schools Research.

GELP 5324/GEDU 5324: Curriculum Development

This course examines the consideration of historical, philosophical and societal impact on the middle level and secondary school curriculum; emphasis upon evaluation and analysis of curriculum development models and the change process.

GELP 5310: Grant Management and Program Evaluation

This course engages students in systematic research and study designed to improve the quality of grant writing and program evaluation within local governments, nonprofits, educational settings, and criminal justice and public service agencies. The course content emphasizes competence in the language of grants, proposal development, funding sources and processes, designing and writing creative proposal letters, creating budgets, developing effective evaluation tools and understanding fiscal management functions and regulations.

GELP 5311: Communication, Problem Solving and Public Relations

This course is designed to provide students with a deeper understanding of how to effectively communicate with internal and external publics. Special emphasis will be placed on group dynamics and problem-solving techniques designed to foster public relations through team building.

GELP 5312: Research and Independent Study

This course is available for students wishing to pursue independent study and/or research on topics not covered in regular courses. This course requires faculty member's approval of a study plan, reading list, and final paper or other products or projects. Permission required from individual faculty.

GELP 5313: School Finance and Resource Allocation

This course is designed to provide knowledge of the issues and practices of school finance. The main issues that are examined are why education is worthy of funding, who contributes to that funding and in what proportions and also how the funding is raised in adequate amounts and equitably distributed. Current trends in school finance and what the future holds for education finance will also be exam.

GELP 5320/GEDU 5320: Applications of Statistic and Research in Education

This course emphasizes rudimentary statistics, research design and understanding of research leading to a research proposal on a current issue in education that will developed into the graduate thesis or capstone experience.

GELP 5315: Affective Issues in Education

This course is designed to develop skills in social behavior management in the school environment. Specific emphasis will be placed on appropriate successful discipline models available to school leaders. Other affective matters that will be studied are the counselor's role, social workers' intervention, school climate, as well as a focus on health issues in the schools.

GELP 5316: Internship (Required)

The internship in public school leadership presents an opportunity to become immersed in the field of leadership practice and to appreciate the importance of instructional leadership in the creation of a learning environment. The internship combines opportunities to study effective leadership first-hand, develop and practice instructional leadership skills and be mentored for a career as a school principal. This course provides students with the opportunity to engage in field-based experiential learning activities related to school administration. This is a "hands-on" course that provides the opportunity for students to practice administrative and leadership skills under the guidance of a practicing administrator (mentor). Seminar activities will complement the ongoing field-based experiences, to document administrative and leadership activities and to assess the usefulness of the internship experiences on their personal development as educational leaders.

9. PROGRAM PARTNERSHIPS:

Districts, schools and community partners are organizations outside of UAPB that have agreed to sit on the Teacher Education Committee and to sponsor students in course projects and field experience. School of Education partners also agrees to provide access for practicum/supervised internships for enrolled candidates.

The Teacher Education Committee will meet annually regarding the M.Ed. in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies degree program and will consist of School of Education faculty members, appropriate departmental faculty, appointed districts and school and local community partners. The purpose of the meeting will be to review the program curriculum to ensure that it is offering cutting-edge program for preparing highly qualified educational leaders.

District, school and community partners will identify problems with accompanying data that will serve as research projects and in-class activities for M.Ed. in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies candidates. Candidates will meet regularly with an appointed university supervisor and a master/mentor principal from a participating partnering district/school or community partner. Candidates will also meet with M.Ed. in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies faculty advisors to ensure that current standards of practice are being adhered to. To date, we have agreements with a number of local districts/schools and community partners and we expect to continue fostering additional partnerships.

The independent study must be approved in advance by the course instructor, student's faculty advisor and the Coordinator of Graduate Studies.

An independent study course may be primarily a reading or a research course.

Dear Committee Members:

Chancellor Paul B, Beran, University of Arkansas at Fort Smith, has requested approval to offer a Master of Education with two areas of emphasis: Curriculum and Instruction and English, effective fall 2019. A summary of the proposal is attached.

The Curriculum and Instruction (MECI) emphasis is designed to increase the expertise of currently certified teachers. It will include twelve hours of core courses and 18 hours of content coursework relevant to all K-12 educators. Additionally, 18 hours of content coursework specific to English will be available, providing a Master of Education with an Emphasis in English (MELA). This program is based on the five-core propositions of the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. The program is designed to strengthen the practice of current teachers and will help to address the shortage of teachers and administrators identified by the Arkansas Department of Education in 2016. As such, this program does not lead to initial or additional licensure as some other programs in Arkansas do. In addition, the program will be delivered through a hybrid approach. It will require on-campus components in the foundation courses as well as online courses in the emphasis areas to allow maximum flexibility for current certified teachers in the program.

The proposal has received the necessary campus approvals. If enrollment and budget goals have not been met upon evaluation of the program after five years, the program will be discontinued. I concur with this recommendation and have attached a resolution for your consideration.

4. PROGRAM SUMMARY

John Hattie in his 2003 work, Teachers Make a Difference, What is the research evidence, identified five major dimensions of excellent teachers. "Expert teachers can identify essential representation of their subject, guide learning through classroom interactions, monitor learning and provide feedback, attend to affective attributes, and influence student outcomes." It is likely that teachers need additional training beyond a bachelor's degree to become the expert described by Hattie. Schools need expert teachers in the classroom to improve the quality of education that children receive in the K-12 classroom. A master's degree in education demonstrates a commitment to the profession and a higher level of expertise. It enables an educator to have upward mobility in the profession.

The proposed M.Ed. targets current classroom teachers already in the workforce who desire professional advancement, as well as recent graduates seeking advanced knowledge and further academic preparation prior to entering the workforce. The Master of Education (M.Ed.) will have two areas of emphasis: Curriculum and Instruction (MECI) and English (MELA). The MECI emphasis is designed to increase the expertise of currently certified teachers. It will include twelve hours of core courses and 18 hours of content coursework relevant to all K-12 educators. Additionally, 18 hours of content coursework specific to English will be available, providing a Master of Education with an Emphasis in English (MELA). Candidates may select the emphasis area which will best fit their educational goals. The School of Education will have procedural and policy oversight of the program(s) with English emphasis being housed in the College of Communication, Languages, Arts and Social Sciences (CLASS). CLASS will be responsible for content specific course delivery, and the Curriculum and Instruction emphasis will be offered through the School of Education in the College of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). Current qualified graduate faculty will serve as instructors for the courses. The university has current library holdings that are appropriate for this degree. New library holdings will be requested. This program is proposed as a hybrid program requiring minimal use of facilities. The four core, required classes for both emphases will be hybrid classes with required on-campus components and the content area courses will be delivered primarily online to build in maximum flexibility.

The Master of Education with an Emphasis in Curriculum and Instruction or English is based on the five-core propositions of the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. These standards describe what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do. The M.Ed. program at UAFS will provide candidates with a deep understanding of the expectations of a master teacher. The program will focus on the development of research based knowledge in the areas of theory, teaching strategies, research, and a broad knowledge base of various curricula. It is designed to strengthen the practice of current teachers.

Benefits of the Program

In keeping with the mission and strategic plan of UAFS, the M.Ed. program will:

- A. Expand educational opportunities at the graduate level for residents in Arkansas and beyond.
- B. Offer a program that will position UAFS as a nationally recognized regional institution for innovation in preparing expert teachers.
- C. Provide expanded opportunities for the growth of K12 teachers in Arkansas and beyond.
- D. Enhance the commitment of UAFS to expand its master's degree programs.
- E. Promote intellectually broad, ethical, socially just, and caring citizens in teachers and beyond.
- F. Increase the professional development of teachers that build 21st century relevance for the classroom.

Degree programs offered at UAFS that support the M.Ed. program.

The University of Arkansas Fort Smith offers bachelor's degrees with teacher licensure in seven areas: Elementary Education (K-6), Middle Childhood Education (4-8), English (7-12), Biology (7-12), History (7-12), Mathematics (7-12), Spanish (K-12), and Music (K-12). All of these programs will support the M.Ed. program(s).

5. NEED FOR THE PROGRAM:

Need for Higher Qualified Teacher Educator in Arkansas.

Arkansas is experiencing a shortage of teachers and administrators (ADE Teacher Recruitment & Retention Report, 2016). During the 2016-2017 school year, the Arkansas Department of Education identified the following areas with critical teacher shortages: Art, Family and Consumer Sciences, French, Spanish, Library Media, Mathematics, Special Education, Agriculture Science & Technology, Computer Science, and Physical Science/Chemistry/Physics. In 2016, the Arkansas Department of Education reported there were 57,940 individuals in Arkansas with a current teaching license of some type, although only 33,104 were employed as licensed teachers. In 2014-2015, the Arkansas Department of Education granted a total of 1,527 licensure waivers statewide. The top area was special education instructional specialist waivers, with 440 waivers. Other top shortage areas were middle school core areas, gifted and talented, career orientation, guidance and counseling, and library media specialists.

It is obvious Arkansas has a teacher shortage due to fewer entering the profession and a higher attrition rate. The Bureau of Legislative Research conducted an adequacy study in 2016 and identified the top factor cited by superintendents and principals as barriers to teacher retention was difficulty in offering competitive salaries. (Arkansas Department of Education, 2015). "Equitable Access to Excellent Educators Plan." Data sources: Statewide Information System (SIS), Arkansas Educator Licensure System (AELS).

Ladd & Sorensen (2015) reported that teachers are most likely to earn graduate degrees during their 4th through 6th years of teaching. This is a critical time in their career and could impact their decision to remain in education. They concluded from their research that educators who complete a Master's degree could play a role in retention. An increase in salary and investment in their own learning could be a factor in teachers remaining in the profession.

Benefits of Having a Master's Degree

The table below demonstrates the difference between those who have a Bachelor's degree and those with a Master's degree with 15 years of teaching experience in UAFS School of Education partner school districts (Fiscal year 2016-2017). Over a teaching career of 28-30 years, a teacher who has a Master's degree will earn significantly more and will have a higher retirement income.

Of the 39,099 teachers in Arkansas Public Schools (2013-2014), 37.6% have Master's degrees. There is an identified need in the state of Arkansas for teachers and administrators. The M.Ed. would address this need by supplying master level teachers to enhance professional retention and higher competitive salaries. UAFS has a pool of alumni teachers who are ready to move to the next level in their preparation in addition to the regional teachers wanting to enhance their education. As noted below, the School of Education has graduated over 1300 teachers since it began in 2002.

Needs Assessment Survey and Results:

Three assessment activities were conducted in the fall of 2016 to assess the demand and organizational capacity of the M.Ed. program. First, a needs assessment was sent to fall 2013 thru fall 2016 graduates of the UAFS School of Education in October, 2016. Second, an assessment survey was given to regional administrators who are members of the Guy Fenter Education Services Cooperative and finally, the Teacher Education Council (TEC) members were surveyed. The needs assessment survey purpose was to identify the interest level for a Master's degree, the type of preferred degree (M.Ed. or MAT), the method of delivery, and the preferred programs of study.

Needs Assessment Proposal:

Based on the feedback from the needs assessment, the School of Education recommends a Master of Education degree (M.Ed.). Survey respondents overwhelmingly preferred the M.Ed. track as opposed to a Master of Arts in Teaching. Respondents who are potential candidates in the program indicated a preference for a fully online format for course delivery. However, the area administrators indicated a preference for the hybrid model. UAFS is attempting to incorporate these preferences into the design of the program by combining elements of online and hybrid instruction into the program. The School of Education believes this is a viable way for content delivery and will solidify the relationships with students in the core courses and still offer maximum flexibility in the completion of the content areas.

Survey participants were asked to rank their choices for degree paths. Curriculum and Instruction was ranked in the top two choices with Special Education/Gifted and Talented being the other top choice. The School of Education currently has sufficient faculty to teach the curriculum and instruction emphasis area. English, while not offered as a choice for survey participants to select, is an option for secondary teachers who have an undergraduate degree in English with Teacher Licensure. This area will be helpful in addressing the increasing demand for concurrent instruction in English in our region of the state.

Employer tuition assistance or other enrollment incentives.

Employer assistance would be determined by the specific school district.

Students wishing to apply for financial aid and/or graduate scholarships must contact the UAFS Financial Aid Office. The Financial Aid Office provides a comprehensive program of federal loans, work study, and third party assistance. Veterans' education benefits are also coordinated through the Financial Aid Office.

Needs the proposed program will address and how the institution became aware of these needs.

This program will meet the need of currently licensed teachers to continue their learning and to obtain a master level teaching certificate. Teachers in the field must have professional development hours to meet recertification requirements. This degree will allow them to obtain the required hours while working toward an advanced degree. Previous graduates repeatedly ask faculty if/when the School of Education will have a master's degree in place. Further, area principals and superintendents often mention the need for such programs in this region so that their employees can further their education.

Indicate which employers contacted the institution about offering the proposed program Potential employers of the graduates of the M.Ed. serve on the Teacher Education Council and are members of the Guy Fenter Cooperative. During these meetings, they have expressed interest in the University of Arkansas Fort Smith offering a master's program for their current employees.

Composition of the Program Advisory Committee

The Teacher Advisory Committee consists of 34 members and will be chaired by the Executive Director of School of Education. The committee will meet twice each semester and will consider topics that include but are not limited to curriculum, admissions, policy and procedure. Committee members will include the following:

<u>UAFS</u> representatives: UAFS deans representing two colleges; Coordinator of Elementary/Middle Education; Coordinator of Secondary Education; Coordinator of Teacher Licensure and Field Placement; Coordinator of Assessment, Director of Western Arkansas Technical Center; eight faculty representatives from educational disciplines across the campus; and three UAFS student representatives.

Community representatives: One designee each from the Fort Smith Public Schools, Van Buren Public Schools, Greenwood Public Schools, Muldrow Public Schools and Roland Public Schools; Supervisor of Curriculum/Federal Programs FSPS; Supervisor of Professional Development FSPS; Designee of Guy Fenter Educational Cooperative; Executive Director Western Arkansas Child Development; Director of Pre-school Program; Director of Education Renewal Zone and the Institute of Math and Science Education; and one public school designee each from elementary, middle level, and secondary education.

Focuses on the principles of curriculum design. Draws from theories of child development, principles of learning, effective teaching methodology, cultural diversity and assessment. Emphasis placed on the application of student-centered design to classroom teaching. (Faculty: Dr. Sara Davis)

MECI 5103 Using Assessment Data as a Guide for Teaching and Learning

Examines research, theory, and practice relevant to the relationship between assessment, instruction, and the improvement of student achievement. MECI 5113 Applying the Science of Reading in the 21st Century Classroom

• MECI 5123 Teaching and Learning in STEAM Education

MECI 5133 Teaching and Learning with Diverse Populations

MECI 5143 Teaching and Learning in the 21st Century Classroom

Explore and enhance the vital components required for knowledge and competencies to promote 21st century learning skills. Reflect upon and modify current teaching practices to meet the learning needs of a diverse student population in the 21st century classroom. (Faculty: Dr. Shelli Henehan)

MECI 5153 Special Topics in Curriculum and Instruction

Designed to meet the current needs of the graduate candidate with regard to special topics, trends, and issues in Curriculum and Instruction in the 21st century classroom. (Faculty: Dr. Monica Riley or assigned graduate faculty)

• MECI 6103 Capstone/Thesis Project in Curriculum and Instruction

The graduate candidate will draw on prior knowledge and experience, course knowledge and current research in his/her area of specialization; embodying original, independent, and applied scholarship to complete a major Capstone project or Master's thesis that merits academic scholarship. (Faculty: Dr. Monica Riley or assigned graduate faculty)

English Emphasis:

*MELA 5103 Major Authors

A reading intensive and focused study of a major author of literary, historical, and/or cultural significance. Along with an intensive focus on the author's literary work, a close analysis of the historical and cultural context will be included. (Faculty: Dr. Cammie Sublette, Dr. Lindsy Lawrence, Dr. Carol Westcamp, or assigned graduate faculty)

*MELA 5123 Regional/Geographic Topics in Literature

A reading intensive and focused study of the literature of a specific geography or region. Students will engage in the process of critical analysis as they study the literature of the specified region. (Faculty: Dr. Kevin Jones, Dr. Laura Witherington, or assigned graduate faculty)

MELA 5213 Shakespeare

A reading intensive and focused critical study of Shakespeare's major works, including selected comedies, tragedies, and histories. Along with an intensive focus on the author's literary work, a close analysis of the historical and cultural context will be included. (Faculty: Dr. Erik Carlson, Dr. Kimberly Robinson, Dr. Dennis Siler, or assigned graduate faculty)

*MELA 5223 17th Century Literature

A reading intensive and focused critical study of major works in poetry, prose, and plays from the Renaissance in Europe. Along with an intensive focus on the literary works, a close analysis of the authors' historical and cultural context will be included. (Faculty: Dr. Christian Gerard, Dr. Dennis Siler, or assigned graduate faculty)

*MELA 5243 Victorian Literature

A reading intensive and focused study of the literature and print culture of nineteenth-century British literature. Students will engage in the process of critical analysis as they study the literature of the Victorian era. (Faculty: Dr. Lindsy Lawrence or assigned graduate faculty)

• *MELA 5773 18th Century British Literature

A reading intensive and focused critical study of literature produced between 1690 and 1789 in the British Isles. Along with an intensive focus on the literary works, a close analysis of the literary historical and cultural context will be included. (Faculty: Dr. Christian Gerard, Dr. Kimberly Robinson, or assigned graduate faculty)

*MELA 5783 19th Century American Literature

A reading intensive and focused study of the literature and print culture of nineteenth-century American literature. Students will engage in the process of critical analysis as they study nineteenth-century American texts. (Faculty: Dr. Kevin Jones, Dr. Laura Witherington, or assigned graduate faculty)

*MELA 5793 20th Century American Literature

A reading intensive and focused study of the literature and print culture of twentieth-century American literature. Students will engage in the process of critical analysis as they study twentieth-century American texts.

MELA 5883 Old English

Intensive study of the Old English language. Students will learn Old English vocabulary and grammar as they parse, read, and translate texts of literary, linguistic, and historical

interest written in English prior to A.D. 1150. Knowledge of Old English allows access to major literary texts such as *Beowulf* and *The Dream of the Rood* without translation, and it supports analysis of the development of English to its present state. (Faculty: Dr. Erik Carlson or assigned graduate faculty)

• *MELA 5903 Special Topics in Literature

A reading intensive and focused critical study of literature not included in other course offerings. Along with an intensive focus on the literary works designated, a close analysis of the literary historical and cultural context will be included. Topics vary, often crossing geographic and temporal lines and usually dealing with a specific genre or a theme. (Faculty: Dr. Cammie Sublette, Dr. Kelly Jennings, Dr. Carol Westcamp, Dr. Laura Witherington, Dr. Joe Hardin, or assigned graduate faculty)

MELA 6203 Advanced Pedagogy in Writing

Focused reading in the history and theory of writing pedagogy, including practical applications for creating effective writing assignments in various genres. (Faculty: Dr. Joe Hardin or assigned graduate faculty)

• MELA 6213 Young Adult Multicultural Literature

Designed to meet the needs of the graduate candidate in the selection and evaluation of young adult literature based on biological, sociocultural, psychological, and developmental characteristics, emphasizing gender-fair and multicultural resources. Examine the historical development of literary works written for and about adolescents, and introduce critical issues surrounding the use and teaching of a variety of genres of young adult literature in today's culturally diverse schools. (Faculty: Dr. Janine Chitty or assigned graduate faculty)

• MELA 6223 Capstone/Thesis Project in English

Designed to meet the needs of the English education scholar. The graduate candidate will draw on prior knowledge and experience, course knowledge and current research in his/her area of specialization; embodying original, independent, and applied scholarship to complete a major Capstone project or Master's thesis that merits academic scholarship. (Faculty: Dr. Janine Chitty or assigned graduate faculty)

* These courses are cross-listed with 4000-level courses. Graduate-level courses will include additional writing and research requirements, and may also include the following additional requirements: archival research, critical theory and its application, and presentations of original content.

7. TOTAL NUMBER OF FACULTY REQUIRED FOR PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION:

Five existing Education faculty are available for program implementation for the Master of Education with an Emphasis in Curriculum and Instruction. Ten current English faculty are available for program implementation for the Master of Education with an Emphasis in English. Some faculty are qualified in both areas. New faculty may be hired at a later date with growth in enrollment.

PROJECTED STARTUP COST FOR FACULTY AND RESEARCH ASSISTANTS.

In the beginning, a portion of existing faculty workload would be reassigned to instruct and supervise the M.Ed. program. This will require hiring adjunct faculty for undergraduate courses or paying overload pay for graduate courses taught. As the program grows, new faculty may be added at a later date.

There have been great expressions of interest and need by area teachers and their administrators in support of this program. As it is the function of the institution to address the educational needs of its constituencies, UAFS feels a great sense of obligation to bring this program forward. We are confident that the effort will translate to a higher quality of education in area classrooms and, by extension a better post-secondary workforce. It will also lead to better students matriculating to, and through, college. We believe the multiplier effect of the program will be large and positive.

Of the 39,099 teachers in Arkansas Public Schools (2013-2014), 37.6% have Master's degrees. Over a teaching career of 28-30 years, a teacher who has a Master's degree will earn significantly more and will have a higher retirement income. This program will be offered from an institution located in a region where a master's program is not currently available or advertised heavily. Recent graduates of UAFS will be one target, while teachers in Oklahoma and surrounding areas will also be targeted.

Our proposed program will target existing teachers in our area and will further develop content and pedagogical knowledge for the classroom teacher. It will not lead to additional or initial licensure as several other masters programs in Arkansas are designed to do. In addition, we will offer content area expertise (18 hours) that will qualify graduates to teach as adjuncts at the college level or as concurrent instructors at their own high schools.

Chancellor Steve Cole, Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas, has requested approval to add a Technical Certificate in Criminal Justice.

Local law enforcement agencies have approached the college concerning the demand for individuals trained and ready for entry-level positions in the field of Criminal Justice to fill dispatcher and jailer positions. CCCUA is requesting to implement a quality Criminal Justice technical certificate program to prepare individuals for these entry-level positions with law enforcement agencies.

The proposed program will be housed in the Division of Professional Studies. In addition to basic Criminal Justice courses, the program will emphasize communications for Criminal Justice and Jail Procedures and Practices. As a component of this program students will earn their certification as a dispatcher/jailer and will be prepared for immediate employment upon successful completion of the 24 hour certificate program. Three new courses will be created for this program.

5. PROGRAM SUMMARY:

The Criminal Justice Technical Certificate program prepares students for entry-level positions in the field of Criminal Justice as a Dispatcher or Jailer. In addition to basic Criminal Justice courses, UA Cossatot's program emphasizes Communications for Criminal Justice, Jail Procedure & Practice and Criminal/Juvenile Law as applied to all individuals. As a part of this program students will earn their certification as a dispatcher/jailer and will be prepared for immediate employment upon successful completion of the program.

Three new courses will be created by the institution:

CRJU 1111 Juvenile Law

CRJU 1112 Criminal Justice Basic Tele-Communications and

CRJU 1113 Jail Practice & Procedure.

The only new cost associated with the program will be the cost of adjunct faculty. There will be no need for additional facilities or equipment.

6. NEED FOR THE PROGRAM:

Survey data indicated that within the next 2-5 years there will be 10-15 job openings for Correction Officer/Jailer positions as well as 2-5 openings for Police/Fire/Ambulance Dispatchers across the region. Respondents indicated that job turnover is high and are hopeful that additional training prior to entering the position will help with this. Example of the survey sent is included in Appendix 3.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Arkansas has approximately 5,480 correction officers/jailer positions and 960 police/fire/ambulance dispatcher positions. Both areas of employment are expected to experience an increase in employment levels over the next ten years.

The Annual Mean Wage for Correction Officers/Jailers in Arkansas is \$33,810 per year and for Police/Fire/Ambulance Dispatchers the Annual Mean Wage is \$28,720 per year.

Surveys were requested of local law enforcement agencies who hire for these positions.

The Sevier County Sheriff came to us with the need for his department. He along with other departments are faced with a lack of individuals meeting the necessary requirements for employment. UA Cossatot offers an Associate of Science degree in Criminal Justice intended for students who wish to complete their Bachelor's degree. This program will provide students with the skills necessary to enter the workplace upon completion of the Technical Certificate Program.

Departments indicated that if necessary for existing employees they would provide tuition assistance and allocate time from work to attend classes.

The advisory committee is made up of 8 law enforcement officials, county judges and program instructors.

We project 7 - 10 enrollees in years 1 - 3 with 10 - 15 graduates in 3 - 5 years.

I am requesting that you consider the following items on the Unanimous Consent Agenda for the September 13, 2018 Academic and Student Affairs Committee meeting.

1. University of Arkansas, Fayetteville

- A. Existing Degree Offered via Distance Technology
 - Minor in Agricultural Business in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness – Providing the minor 100% online will allow the department to better serve current students, help manage continued growth of the minor, and attract and retain new students to the minor.
 - Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in Supply Chain Management with a Concentration in Transportation and Logistics in the Department of Supply Chain Management Offering a degree online strategically positions the College to capture new markets (e.g., students abroad, degree completion, transfer students and adult learners). Supply Chain Undergraduate Degree Labor and Market Analysis suggest strong growth for the supply chain labor market. There are seven universities offering online Supply Chain Management Bachelor of Science degrees. Cohort schools (SEC and Land-Grant Universities) do not offer online undergraduate degrees in this concentration. There are few state and regional universities that offer supply chain bachelor's degrees (face-to-face or online), which provides an opportunity to serve the needs of the state and region. This is one of the few fields in which Arkansas wage rates are among the highest in the nation. The program also has significant opportunities internationally.
 - Minor in Supply Chain Management for business Majors and Non-Business Students in the Department of Supply Chain Management - The minor for business majors and non-business majors support college and university interdisciplinary efforts, and provides flexibility for students. The market has moved to online programming to supplement face-to-face courses and/or add to a college's educational offerings. More and more of our peer and aspirant colleges of business have moved to some form of online programming.

- B. Address Correction for the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences Northwest Arkansas Campus Change the address from 2907 East Joyce Street to UAMS Northwest, 1125 N. College Avenue, Fayetteville, AR 72703-1908. The Joyce Street address was the former location for a UAMS AHEC in Fayetteville. The AHEC Clinic and associated programs moved in December 2009 to the NWA Campus location on College Avenue which opened as a regional campus in 2007, welcoming a first group of third-year medical students in July 2009.

3. University of Arkansas at Monticello

- A. Academic Policy Modifications:
 - Conditional Prep Status Policy to include students with an ACT Composite of 15 and
 to limit conditional prep students to selecting a technical certificate as their plan of study.
 This policy revision will align the conditional prep status policy with the degree
 pathways program.
 - Implement a Degree Pathways Program Historically, students with ACT scores below 19 are at greater academic risk during the first year of college. However, the retention and graduation rates for these students increase when they are initially placed in certificate or degree programs that are more compatible with their academic preparation. Initial placement in carefully designed degree pathways will better ensure student retention and degree/certificate completion and will continue to embrace the mission of UAM as an open access university. Pathways are initial program access points and are based upon student skill sets at an entry level. Students who complete an entry level program of study may then pursue an additional level of certificate/degree, if so desired. Students may *appeal up to one certificate/degree program level above their initial placement. For other placement scores, students falling within the Conditional Prep status must declare a technical certificate or file a Degree Pathways appeal.
 - Transferability of Technical Credits Policy The policy revision will allow students to use 12 hours of technical credit toward a baccalaureate degree instead of 6 hours, and allow academic units to use technical credit for specific degree requirements if so desired. These changes are needed to allow students to explore technical fields without worrying about transferability of credits, to allow academic units to determine the appropriate use of technical credits within their programs, and to aid UAM in its degree pathways implementation.

B. Reconfiguration of Existing Degree Programs:

• Bachelor of Business Administration to Create an Associate of Science in Business Administration – Coursework will be taken from the existing Bachelor of Business Administration degree. This degree offers an exit point for students interested in a two

year program in business or a measure of progress toward the four year BBA degree with majors in Business Administration or Accounting.

C. Curriculum Changes to Existing Programs:

- Bachelor of Arts in Music, Jazz Concentration modifications will replace seven (7) hours of music electives with seven (7) hours of jazz ensembles.
- Bachetor of Science in Land Surveying modifications will split a three credit hour
 course into two separate courses and change the prefix from NRM to GIS on four courses
 in the major requirements. The changes are necessary to better reflect that these courses
 are spatial science courses.
- Bachelor of Science in Natural Resource Management modifications are designed to improve student success both in the program and in their post-graduate careers.
- Bachelor of Science and Minor in Psychology modifications to expand the number of courses that count within four designated categories. These changes will allow faculty to offer a broader array of courses as well as give students more options, which helps them to graduate within the required 120 hours. The psychology minor changes are necessary to align with the major.
- Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing modifications will assure appropriate
 academic standards necessary to prepare MFA graduates for the professional expectations
 they will encounter in academia.
- Change the Name of the Bachelor of General Studies to the Bachelor of
 Interdisciplinary Studies The proposed name change and curriculum modifications
 will allow students to customize their education toward their particular goals and plans
 for employment or advanced study. The new program is also more adaptable to the
 rapidly changing workplace.

D. Place on Inactive Status:

Military Science Minor - The Military Science program was administered with the
University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB). As a part of the partnership, UAPB
provided faculty to teach the required leadership coursework on the UAM campus.
UAPB is no longer providing faculty to teach onsite at Monticello; therefore, it is
necessary to request that the program be designated as inactive.

4. University of Arkansas at Little Rock

A. Change the name of the Office of Institutional Research to Office of Institutional Research and Analytics.

B. Curriculum Changes to Existing Programs:

Bachelor of Science in Electrical and Computer Systems Engineering - changes were
proposed to prepare for the prospective ABET Engineering Accreditation Commission
(EAC) program accreditation visit later this year. EAC guidelines require that (1)
Discrete Mathematics and (2) Network Analysis courses be added. Besides addition of
these two courses, other changes to the curriculum include changes to the FYE course
and one of the laboratory courses. These changes do not impact the total number of credit

- hours required for degree (128 hours), but will reduce the program electives from current nine hours to three hours.
- Bachelor of Science in Environmental Engineering The existing B.S. in Environmental Engineering program requirements were developed without the advice and guidance of a licensed environmental engineer and external advisory board. The proposed curriculum changes are being made after review and consultation with the external Environmental Engineering Advisory Board at UA Little Rock and a licensed environmental engineer. All proposed courses are existing and changes are in compliance with the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET). The total number of credit hours required for a degree will decrease from 128 hours to 124 hours. An organic chemistry course and lab will be removed from the list of required courses.
- Master of Arts in Applied Communication Studies Early Entry The proposed early
 entry will allow exceptional undergraduate students working toward a major or minor in
 Applied Communication Studies to apply and be accepted to the MAACS program.
 Students can being working towards the graduate degree while completing their
 baccalaureate degree making this graduate program a more affordable option in a
 shortened timeframe. No new courses,

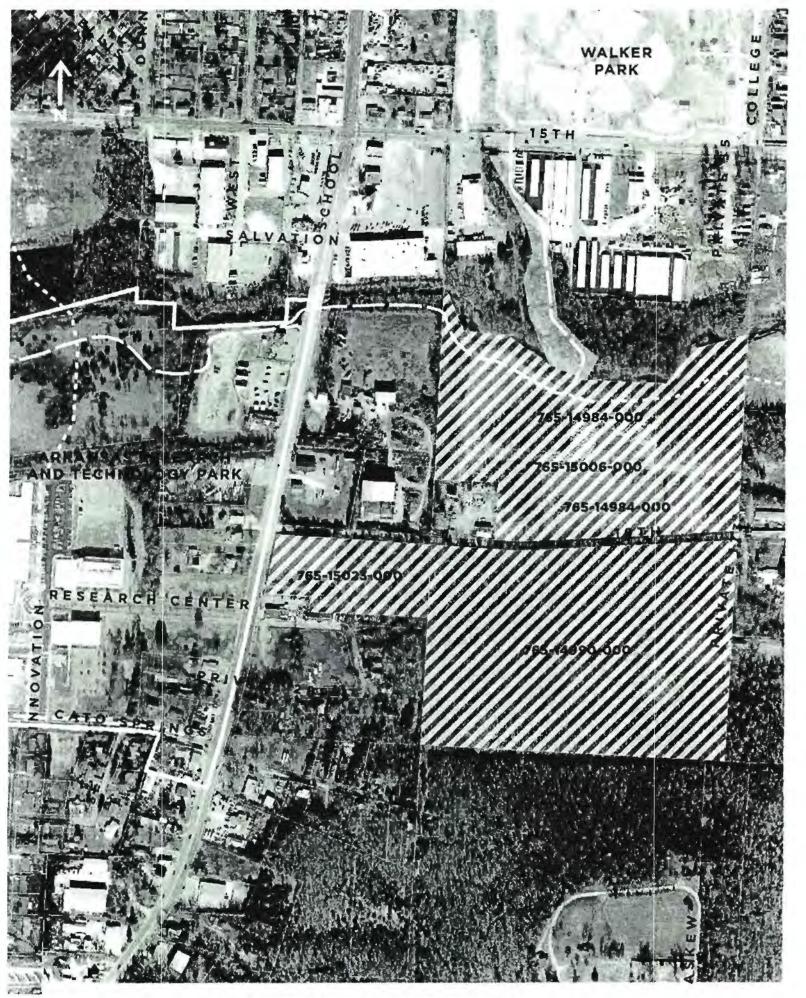

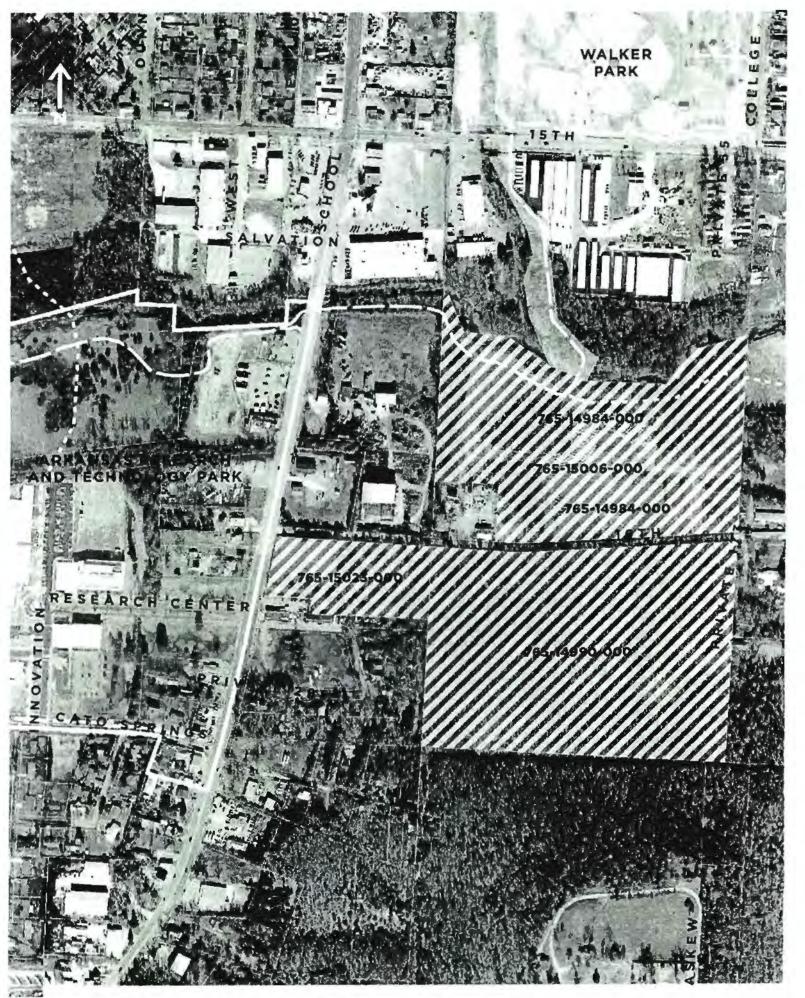

Chancellor Joseph E. Steinmetz, University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, is requesting approval for a capital project for the North Chilled Water Plant Modernization Project. The Capital Project Proposal Form and map are attached for Board consideration. The project costs are estimated at \$4.5 million and will be funded with a combination of Utility Reserves and Revenue Bonds, with debt service generated through Utility Operations utility rates.

Authorization was granted on July 2, 2018, to begin the process and proceed pursuing a "Justification for Special Procurement" under A.C.A. § 19-11-263 to allow for sole source selection of the design professional.

Affiliated Engineers, Inc. has performed significant design work on the project. Affiliated Engineers, Inc. completed construction documents through Design Development under a contract with Johnson Controls, Inc. as a part of a potential energy savings project. Though the final ESPC scope of work did not include the North Plant, the University has essentially paid for that design work under the other project. It is estimated that allowing Affiliated Engineers, Inc. to complete the design work will recover approximately \$70,000 of value from the existing completed design work. Chancellor Steinmetz recommends that the committee approve the use of Affiliated Engineers, Inc. as the sole source selection for this project.

I concur with Dr. Steinmetz's recommendation. A resolution is attached for your consideration.

1. Project Function

The North Chilled Water Modernization project will update the major mechanical and electrical systems in this district utility chilled water production facility. The original plant was constructed in 1994, and at the time had a steam turbine driven chiller. That chiller was replaced in 2012 with an available 1300-ton chiller of the same age. No other significant capital improvements or facility renewal funding has been invested, so all supporting mechanical and electrical equipment is original to the building from 1994. The facility is reaching the end of its 25-year service life and needs modernization.

The project scope will replace the existing 1994 chiller at the North Chilled Water Plant (NCHP) with a new nominal 2,500-ton capacity unit, increasing net available chilled water production capacity by 1,200 tons (10% system capacity increase). This increased capability is necessary to maintain the high reliability of the district cooling system and to meet projected campus cooling load growth. In addition, the new unit will be significantly more efficient than the existing 1994 machine, with estimated energy savings of approximately \$400,000 over its lifespan.

The project scope will also replace and upgrade the supporting process systems, including the plant electrical switchgear, the cooling tower fan drive systems, and the chilled water and condenser water pumps. The project will include minor work on the building envelope to insure its condition is comparable with the plant process equipment. Finally, the refrigerant safety exhaust systems will be brought up to current safety code requirements based on the larger chiller.

2. Facility Location & Description

The North Chilled Water plant is located at the 1236 W Maple Street, on south end of the Agriculture Food and Life Science building. This plant is the smaller of two summer peaking district energy chiller plants operated for campus cooling. This plant primarily serves the north end of campus, including the Maple Hill area and adjacent Bumpers College facilities.

3. Total Project Cost

The current total project cost is estimated to be \$4.5M, which includes equipment, construction, professional service fees, and other miscellaneous project costs.

4. Parking Plan to Support New or Expanded Facility

No changes in parking are required for this project.

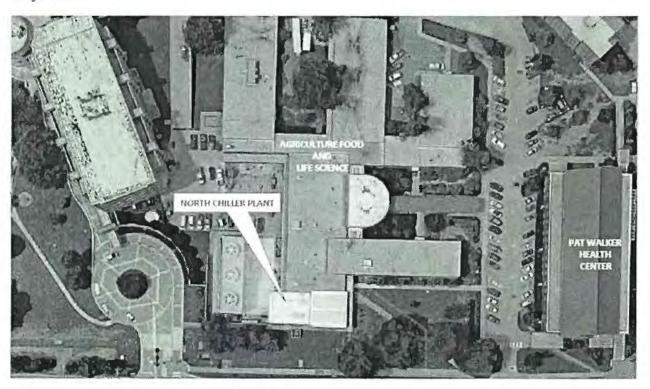

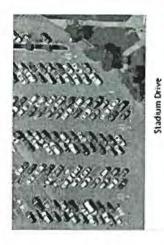

Interim Chancellor Edward Serna, University of Arkansas at Fort Smith, has requested approval to waive enforcement of restrictive covenants on three residential parcels near the Stubblefield Center and Crowder Field in Fort Smith. UAFS received this request from a local property owner and developer. The restrictive covenants prohibit subdividing and multi-family housing. The City of Fort Smith has approved the developer's request to rezone the property to permit multi-family housing. The University's property is not subject to these covenants, but the developer is concerned that language in an old deed in the chain of title may give UAFS the right to enforce the covenants.

Dr. Sema and the UAFS administration believe that waiving any right to enforce the restrictive covenants is an appropriate course. Enforcing the covenants is of little value to UAFS and the waiver would appear to be beneficial to local development. The proposed waiver document, which has been reviewed by the Office of General Counsel, is attached.

Dr. G. Keith Pinchback, Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas, has submitted a request for approval of a minor renovation project that would affect the façade of the College's Fine Arts Center, approval of continued use of SCM Architects, and approval to name PCCUA's Fine Arts Center, the **Hendrix Fine Arts Center**. Chancellor Pinchback's detailed explanation concerning this request is as follows:

Approximately sixteen months ago planning began on a facelift for the Fine Arts Center on the Helena-West Helena Campus. I have included with this letter a separate description of the facility and the proposed renovation. We will be funding this project through a combination of college funds and a donation of \$250,000 received by our foundation in December 2017.

We initially estimated the project would cost approximately \$700,000, and we submitted an MOF for this amount in June 2017. We believed we could accomplish this project through a job-order contractor. SCM Architects, our on-call architects, were consulted, and began working on plans and drawings for the project. Over the next several months, planning continued and the architects began working with a job-order contractor to secure pricing for the project. In July 2018, the job-order contractor submitted, to our surprise, proposed pricing in the amount of \$1,153,127.

SCM Architects is preparing to issue invitations to bid for contractors for this project. Based on the proposed pricing received from our job-order contractor it appears that the construction cost may exceed \$1,000,000. Accordingly, we

request approval, pursuant to Board Policy 740.2(3), to move forward with SCM Architects to complete this project, notwithstanding that the construction cost may exceed \$1,000,000.

This project involves changes to the building façade. A graphic representation of the new face is included with this letter. We request Board approval of this change to the façade.

Finally, we propose to re-name the fine arts building in honor of a donor and her late husband, and request Board approval for the naming. Bettye Hendrix and the late Dick Hendrix have been life-long supporters of Phillips Community College. Prior to Mr. Hendrix' passing, the Hendrixes had donated over \$240,000 to the Phillips Community College Foundation to fund scholarships, renovate facilities, and assist in various campus updates. Mrs. Hendrix serves as the Chair of the Helena Health Foundation and has been instrumental in assisting with securing funding for the College in the form of scholarships and allied health equipment grants to the PCCF in excess of \$950,000. Mr. Hendrix served on the PCCF Helena Council for over 15 years. Having a passion for cultural arts, Mrs. Hendrix served on the Warfield Concerts Committee to organize free music concerts for the community in the Fine Arts Center, Upon Mr. Hendrix' passing, Mrs. Hendrix donated \$250,000 to renovate the Fine Arts Center. These restricted funds, along with previous donations, have proven their love of the College by the Hendrix family. Naming our fine arts center after the Hendrix family is very appropriate and rewarding. We propose re-naming our fine arts center the Hendrix Fine Arts Center, and ask that the Board of Trustees approve this change.

I concur with Dr. Pinchback's recommendations and have attached a proposed resolution for your approval.

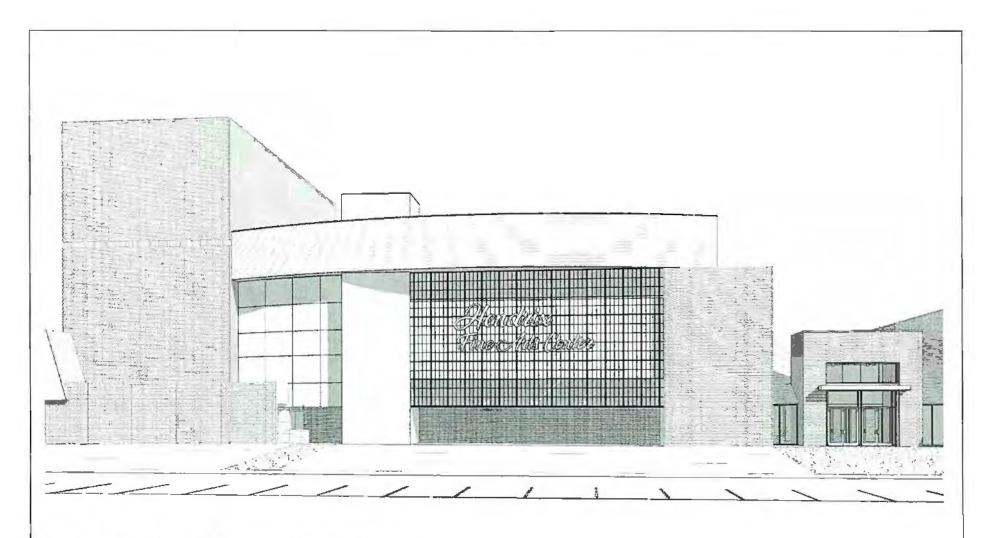

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas recognizes and esteems John Ed Anthony, who was born in Camden, Arkansas, and raised in sawmill towns throughout both east Texas and south Arkansas, where he worked in the Anthony family's mills; and

WHEREAS, the Board recognizes that Mr. Anthony, who earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in 1961, returned that same year to take up management of his family's business upon the untimely death of his father, Edwin "Ted" Anthony; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Anthony formed Anthony Timberlands, Inc., in 1974, and during his tenure as president of ATI, oversaw the expansion of Anthony family land holdings to nearly 200,000 acres, making it the largest independent owner of timberland in Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, in 2004, Mr. Anthony stepped down as president of ATI and into his new role as Chairman of the Board, where he serves an essential role of key operation decisions and all land and timber procurement activities for ATI and its affiliates; and

WHEREAS, in 2012, Mr. Anthony was elected into the Arkansas Business Hall of Fame; in addition, he has also served as the President of the Arkansas Forest Association and as a member of the Executive Committee of the Southern Forest Products Association; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Anthony has demonstrated his care for the University of Arkansas by having previously served on the University of Arkansas Board of Trustees; he and his wife, Isabel, are included in the University's Towers of Old Main, a giving society for the University's most generous benefactors, as well as the Chancellor's Society; and

WHEREAS, Anthony and Isabel have made an exceptionally generous \$7.5 million donation allowing the construction of a new materials innovation center in the Fay Jones School of Architecture and Design at the University of Arkansas, which is intended to be a center of excellence for innovation in wood design and product development to expand the use of wood in architectural design, construction techniques, and product design; and

WHEREAS, the Anthonys' gift to establish the new materials innovation center is intended to provide studios, seminar and conference rooms, faculty offices, housing for visiting faculty, a small auditorium, and a public exhibition space, contributing immeasurably to the cultural heritage and future of the State of Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, the Anthonys' gift to establish the new materials innovation center represents capital support that will enable the University of Arkansas to attract and educate the best and brightest students and hire and retain outstanding faculty from across the nation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board formally expresses its high regard for and lasting gratitude to John Ed and Isabel Anthony for their exemplary contributions to the

University of Arkansas by creating and naming the **Anthony Timberlands Center for Design** and **Materials Innovation** to be located within the Windgate Art and Design District. With this naming, we honor the Anthonys especially for their enduring support of the University of Arkansas and for their far-sighted philanthropic gift in support of the educational, economic, and cultural well-being of the University, the state, and the world, ensuring that University of Arkansas will become a nationally prominent school.

Dear Trustees:

Chancellor Cam Patterson and the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) request approval to authorize UAMS to sell UAMS's forty-nine percent membership interest in a dialysis Joint Venture called Little Rock Renal Services, LLC ("LRRS").

On July 1, 2015, UAMS and Dialysis Clinic, Inc. ("DCI"), a Tennessee non-profit corporation that has a history of treatment and research in this patient-care area, entered into an Operating Agreement to own and operate jointly LRRS. LRRS was formed for the purpose of establishing, owning, and operating one or more outpatient End-Stage Renal Dialysis facilities. One such facility was built and operated in Little Rock.

After three years of operating LRRS and the dialysis facility in Little Rock, four main reasons have arisen to influence UAMS's decision to sell its membership interest back to DCI. First, changing Medicare reimbursement rates for both the professional and technical revenues that support this business model create concerns for a viable long-term financial relationship. Second, if DCI owns the total membership interest, it can more aggressively expand dialysis programs in Central Arkansas and throughout the State. Should DCI expand in Arkansas, UAMS can still provide medical directorship services to newly opened clinics, but there would be no capital call against UAMS. Third, the academic subdivision of DCI allows for UAMS nephrologists to more readily apply for research-grant support in a non-Joint Venture model. Finally, as currently configured, the Joint Venture was experiencing financial losses that UAMS was unable to sustain into the future. Of note, before and up through 2015, many academic medical centers participated in joint venture relationships similar to the one at issue here; subsequently, nearly all have sold back their interest to DCI based upon similar considerations indicated above.

Both UAMS and DCI conducted financial valuations of the business, and UAMS submits that the value of UAMS's membership interest has been fairly and adequately determined at Four Hundred and Ten Thousand Dollars (\$410,000.00).

Chancellor Patterson, Chief Financial Officer Bill Bowes, and Managing Associate General Counsel-UAMS Mark Hagemeier, who have all been working with DCI on this membership interest sale, will be present at the meeting to discuss this matter with you and answer any questions.

A resolution is attached and I recommend its approval.

Parking and Traffic Policies

Statement of Policies

A University of Arkansas - Fort Smith (UAFS) parking permit is required to park on campus. The purchase and display of a valid parking permit does not guarantee the holder a specific parking space. It is the sole responsibility of the vehicle driver to locate a valid parking space. These regulations are applicable to all members of the University community, which shall include but is not limited to, UAFS students, faculty, staff, visitors, and vendors. Parking enforcement is conducted 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

A. General

- A vehicle is defined as a motorized means of transportation that is licensed by the state (if applicable) and must adhere to all state and campus regulations. Vehicles may not drive on sidewalks unless approved by University Police.
- 2. Anyone who utilizes University parking facilities, including but not limited to, faculty, staff and students, must have a current UAFS parking permit visible and properly displayed and shall be responsible for the registered vehicle and any citation(s) issued to that vehicle.
- If a vehicle receives a citation while parked on the UAFS campus and it has not been properly registered, the owner of that vehicle shall be responsible for the citation.
- 4. The University shall assume no liability or responsibility for any vehicle parked on campus property.
- 5. Motorcycles and scooters are subject to the regulation governing motor vehicles.
- 6. The owner of a disabled vehicle located in a parking lot shall notify the Parking Program Office or the University Police Office within 30 minutes of the disability or the vehicle is subject to be towed and/or ticketed at the owner's expense. The owner of a disabled vehicle parked improperly shall be responsible for moving the vehicle within 24 hours. A disabled vehicle on the roadway must be moved as soon as a wrecker or other appropriate means can be employed.
- 7. Any repairs made to vehicles which will create a nuisance, safety hazard, or cause property damage shall not be performed on campus. Violators are subject to revocation of parking privileges and permit.

- 8. Anyone who needs temporary parking for a trailer should contact the Parking Program Office or the University Police to make appropriate arrangements.
- 9. A <u>red</u> curb and/or sign designates a <u>fire zone</u>, and no parking is <u>permitted</u>. Loading and/or unloading is only allowed where indicated by the appropriate signage.
- 10. Warning violations will be issued the first week of classes of each semester to vehicles without permits and that have not been previously issued a parking citation. Exceptions are handicap spaces, loading zones and unauthorized parking areas.
- 11. <u>A UAFS parking permit is required in order to utilize University</u> parking facilities.
- 12. A vehicle shall be registered to one person only.

B. Visitors

- 1. Visitors parking on campus shall obtain and display a visitor permit on their vehicle. Visitor permits may be obtained prior to campus arrival by contacting the Parking Program Office via email at parking@uafs.edu, or the University Police via email at upd@uafs.edu. They can also be picked up in person at the Parking Program Office, Room 231-C, in the Smith-Pendergraft Campus Center or at the University Police Office in the 51st Annex building.
- 2. Whenever possible, the host, whether student, faculty or administrator, should obtain visitor parking permits for guests.
- 3. University Police shall provide visitor permits to event coordinators when requested. An event coordinator should contact the Parking Program Coordinator via email at parking@uafs.edu or University Police for specific instructions at least two weeks in advance of the event.
- 4. Visitor parking permits are valid for a maximum of three (3) days unless otherwise specified by University Police.

C. Operation of Vehicle

- 1. Observe all campus traffic and parking signs. Posted signs shall supersede this written policy.
- 2. The maximum speed limit on campus is 15 mph. Violators are subject to University citation.
- 3. State and city motor vehicle and traffic laws are included in the University's motor vehicle regulations governing the use of vehicles on the University's campus.
- 4. No one is permitted to drive around or over any barricade erected to control traffic or parking, or to alter, deface, remove or destroy any traffic or parking control device.
- 5. A vehicle operator shall comply with instructions given by a University Police Officer (voice, gesture or whistle).
- 6. Vehicles shall not be parked against the flow of traffic.

D. Parking Areas

- Resident student parking is permitted only in areas designated as "resident student parking". A resident parking permit (orange in color) is required in those areas (Sebastian Commons). A resident is defined as a student who is assigned to University housing.
- 2. Resident parking is restricted 24 hours a day and a resident parking permit shall be required.
- 3. Commuter student parking is permitted only in areas designated for "commuter student parking" (green in color). A displayed permit is required in these areas. A commuter student is defined as a student who resides off campus and commutes to the University for classes.
- 4. Faculty/Staff & Commuter student parking is restricted 7 a.m. 5 p.m., Monday through Friday unless otherwise posted.
- 5. Faculty and Staff parking is permitted in areas designated as "Faculty and Staff parking" or commuter student. A faculty/staff permit (blue in color) is required in these areas.
- 6. Only vehicles with a state issued physically disabled license plate or hang tag shall park in designated physically disabled spaces. A UAFS parking permit is also required.
- 7. Visitor parking is designated for visitors only from 7 a.m. 5 p.m., Monday through Friday unless otherwise posted. Any vehicle with a non-visitor permit displayed shall not park in visitor parking and shall be subject to citation for parking in an area designated for others.
- 8. If a UAFS student who resides in University housing is a member of the immediate family of a UAFS employee with a faculty/staff permit, he/she may not park that registered vehicle in resident student areas.
- 9. No vehicle shall display more than one current parking permit.
- Only those designated people will use spaces that are specifically designated by a sign. These areas shall be reserved 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Motorcycles and scooters are allowed to park in areas designated for motorcycles and scooters by signage and lot stripping. All motorcycles and scooters must display a valid UAFS motorcycle/scooter parking permit.

E. Restricted Parking

- 1. See #4 above in "D. Parking Areas." Also, parking in Lot R is reserved 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Parking spaces with posted signs indicating specific restrictions
 (Ex: College Deans) will be reserved 24 hours a day, 7 days a week).

F. Permits

 All UAFS parking permits are available at the Parking Program Office, located on the 2nd floor of the Smith-Pendergraft Campus Center (Room #231-C). Temporary and visitor parking permits are also

- available at the Parking Program Office, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. 5 p.m., and at the University Police Office, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- 2. All parking permits expire on August 31 of each year.
- 3. Temporary parking permits are available free of charge for any valid permit holder who brings a different vehicle to campus other than their original registered vehicle. Temporary permits are valid for a maximum of two (2) weeks. Please contact the Parking Program Coordinator or University Police if an extension of two (2) weeks is necessary.
- 4. If your student status changes at any time throughout the academic year, you may exchange your current parking permit free of charge at the Parking Program Office in the Smith-Pendergraft Campus Center to reflect your change in status.
- 5. No refunds will be issued for parking permits reported lost or stolen. The permit owner shall be responsible for purchasing a replacement permit. Lost or stolen permits shall be reported immediately to the Parking Program Office or to University Police. Failure to properly report a lost or stolen permit could result in the owner of the permit being responsible for any or all citations issued to the permit.
- 6. No one shall register a vehicle on campus belonging to another individual without permission of the legally registered owner of the vehicle.
- 7. A parking permit shall only be displayed on the vehicle to which it is registered.
- 8. Parking permits not properly displayed in the vehicle shall be subject to citation for failure to properly display a permit.
- 9. Students who work part-time for the University as staff members are not entitled to a staff permit.

G. Special Permits

- All vendors are required to register their vehicles and obtain a vendor parking pass at the Parking Program Office in the Smith-Pendergraft Campus Center.
- University parking facilities are restricted to use by those who
 participate in University functions, activities, or business on
 campus.

H. Display of Permit in Vehicle

- 1. Sticker style parking permits are to be completely affixed to the lower portion of the right front windshield (passenger side) in plain view, with the permit number visible, and by its own adhesive.
- 2. Hang tag style permits and visitor permits shall be hung on the rear view mirror of the vehicle being used that day with the information clearly visible through the windshield.

3. Motorcycle and scooter permits are to be affixed to the right front fork or fender of the vehicle, in plain view, with the number visible.

I. Replacement of Parking Permits

- 1. A permit holder who becomes ineligible for parking privileges must remove the permit and provide it to the Parking Program Coordinator or University Police.
- 2. When transferring a vehicle, before a no-charge replacement permit will be issued, the old permit must be presented at the Parking Program Office in the Smith-Pendergraft Campus Center. If you are unable to recover the permit for any reason, any of the following will be accepted as proof the permit is not recoverable:
 - a. a copy of the bill of sale
 - b. transfer of title
 - c. accident report indicating the windshield was damaged or the vehicle was totaled
 - d. any other appropriate documentation

J. Payment of Fines

- 1. Fines shall be paid online or at the Cashier's Office on the 2nd floor of the Smith-Pendergraft Campus Center.
- 2. All citations issued are subject to billing through the Cashier's Office.

Failure to pay fines may result in withholding of transcripts, class registration, and/or formal collection efforts (including liens through the state income tax system).

K. Appeals

1. If a visitor, student, staff, or faculty member believes the citation was issued in error, he/she has the right to appeal to the Traffic and Parking Appeals Committee. This appeal must be received in Parking Program Office or the University Police Office within five (5) calendar days of receipt of the citation or billing notice from the University. Late appeals shall not be considered, except for extenuating circumstances. Appeal forms are available online at the University Police website under the Parking Program or at the Parking Program Office. The appellant shall be notified of the committee's decision via email. The Committee shall consist of a faculty member, a student, and a staff member. A second appeal option is available for those whose first appeal was denied. This appeal must be requested within five (5) calendar days of notification of first appeal denial, and it must be done in person to the Appeal Committee.

L. Revocation

- 1. The Director of University Police may suspend or revoke a driver's parking privileges when violations exceed 12 during the permit year (Sept. 1 Aug. 31).
- All revocations made by the Director of University Police shall be effective for the remainder of the permit year in which the revocation order is issued, or as otherwise noted.
- 3. Student parking privileges may also be revoked by the Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs, the Student Conduct Board, and the Chief Conduct Officer.
- 4. Payment or appeal of any traffic citation does not exempt one from the standard revocation procedure.

M. Towing and Immobilization

- Vehicles may be towed or immobilized for the following reasons:
 - a. parking on campus after a permit has been revoked
 - b. accumulation of 12 or more violations per vehicle within the permit year
 - c. blocking fire lanes or fire hydrants
 - d. obstruction of pedestrian or traffic lanes or creating a hazard
 - e. abandoned vehicle
 - f. blocking loading zones
 - g. blocking or impeding snow removal
 - h. parking in a handicap designated area without a valid handicap permit
 - i. parking in a reserved or blocked off area
 - j. not displaying proper campus registration
 - k. as University Police personnel deem necessary for safety, security, or any campus operation.

N. Traffic Enforcement

University Police Officers will enforce violations of Arkansas' general
motor vehicle laws or University policy that occur on its campus
roads in accordance with the 2015 Arkansas Motor Vehicle and Traffic
Laws and State Highway Commission Regulations. Such violations
will have the same effect as though such had occurred on Fort Smith
city streets. Citations will be issued and collected upon or through
UAFS and/or the Fort Smith District Court.

Dear Trustees:

Dr. Mark Cochran, Vice President for Agriculture, seeks approval of a research fund agreement, a draft of which is enclosed, between the Arkansas Rice Research and Promotion Board (ARRPB) and the Board of Trustees for a gift by ARRPB in the amount of \$5 million, which will be matched by the Division of Agriculture ("Division"), to establish an endowment that will be used to provide funding for the operations of a new Northeast Arkansas Rice Research and Extension Center ("Rice Center"). It is contemplated that the Rice Center will be constructed in Poinsett County, Arkansas, on land purchased earlier this year with funds previously gifted by the ARRPB.

As background, the ARRPB is currently benefiting from a unique flow of funds from a bilateral trade agreement dealing with unfair trade practices. This special source of funds has allowed the ARRPB to invest tens of millions of dollars in rice research for the state, including long-term investments in infrastructure and special initiatives over and above its regular transfers of rice check-off and tariff quota funds ("Funds") to the Division to support rice research. To that end, the ARRPB expressed its desire to provide financial support for the creation of a new Division rice research and extension center in Northeast Arkansas that would enable rice research on the Henry silt loam and other lighter mixed soils that typify the Arkansas rice acreage West of Crowley's Ridge and North of I-40. The Division did not have a farm in its portfolio with these soils, which limited the Division's ability to conduct relevant research for developing best practices and new technologies for these production systems.

In furtherance of this desire to create a new Division rice research and center in Northeast Arkansas, ARRPB and the Board entered into a July 27, 2017 Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) that outlines the ARRPB's proposed financial commitment to establish the Rice Center and the Board's commitment on the management of such a facility over the next 50 years. With the MOA in place, the ARRPB entered into a gift agreement with the Board to fund the purchase of real property in Northeast Arkansas for the placement of the new Rice Center, transferred gift funds of \$4 million for the property, and using those funds, the Board, on behalf of the Division, purchased approximately 614 acres in Poinsett County earlier this year to establish the Rice Center. The design plans for the new Rice Center have not yet been finalized, but once that occurs the ARRPB intends to fund the construction of the Rice Center

through a separate gift agreement. In the meantime, the ARRPB has a passed a resolution to provide a \$5 million gift to establish an endowment to help pay for the operating costs for the new Rice Center.

Because this \$5 million gift will be paid in a lump sum, which was not anticipated at the time the MOA was entered into, the research fund agreement contains a potential repayment obligation provision similar to those in the MOA for the gift funds used to purchase land and construct the Rice Center. Notwithstanding this gift, the ARRPB intends to continue transferring Funds to the Division to support rice research, and the parties understand that the potential repayment obligations in the research fund agreement and the MOA are contingent upon the ARRPB continuing these transfers of Funds.

Following the Board's consideration and approval of an agreement substantially in accord with the attached draft, the parties will execute the research fund agreement and the ARRPB will promptly provide the \$5 million gift that will be used to create the research fund endowment, which along with matching funds from the Division, will be used for operating expenses for the Rice Center.

A resolution is attached for your consideration. I recommend its approval. Dr. Cochran will be available to answer questions at the meeting.

AGREEMENT TO ESTABLISH THE NORTHEAST ARKANSAS RICE RESEARCH AND EXTENSION CENTER FUND

This Agreement ("Agreement") is between the Arkansas Rice Research and Promotion Board (hereinafter "Donor") and the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas (hereinafter "Board"), acting for and on behalf of the Division of Agriculture (hereinafter "Division").

WHEREAS, Donor is organized pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. §§ 2-20-501, et. seq. and has statutory authority to promote the growth and development of the rice industry in Arkansas by research, extension, promotion, and market development; and

WHEREAS, Donor realizes that the current and future success of the Arkansas rice industry depends upon improved rice research and extension programming in Northeast Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, the Board is a public institution of higher education established under Arkansas law, and the Division, a separate division of the University of Arkansas System, includes the Arkansas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Arkansas Cooperative Extension Service; and

WHEREAS, the mission of the Division is to provide research and extension on all aspects of agriculture, food, youth, families, and communities, and is encouraged to cooperate with state agencies and rural, urban and agricultural stakeholders throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Arkansas Agricultural Experiment Station is to develop and advance scientific knowledge through basic and applied research regarding food, fiber, feed, agribusiness, bioenergy issues, and other programmatic areas; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Arkansas Cooperative Extension Service is to advance and disseminate scientific knowledge regarding agriculture, the environment, human health and wellbeing, communities, and other programmatic areas; and

WHEREAS, the Division, with the approval of the University's Board of Trustees, may establish and maintain research and extension offices, facilities, centers, and stations throughout the state to better serve its stakeholders and the Division is uniquely situated among Arkansas institutions to further the mission of the Donor; and

WHEREAS, Donor receives rice check-off funds and tariff quota funds ("Funds") and through a Memorandum of Agreement between Donor and the Board dated July 27, 2017 (the "MOA") and a Gift Agreement dated October 26, 2017, Donor has contributed Funds to the

Division to purchase land for the establishment of the Northeast Arkansas Rice Research and Extension Center (the "Rice Center"); and

WHEREAS, Donor and the Division seek to establish a fund for the purpose of operating the Rice Center and for the purpose of strengthening rice research and extension in Arkansas;

NOW THEREFORE the parties agree to the following the terms and conditions.

1. Intent

It is the intent of the Donor to strengthen rice research and extension in Arkansas. It is further the intent of the Donor that the Division, through the establishment of a rice research operating fund (the "Rice Research Fund"), as provided by this Agreement, will operate the Rice Center on land in Poinsett County specifically purchased by the Board on behalf of the Division for this purpose, and in facilities to be specifically constructed for this purpose, with both the purchase of the land and the construction of the Rice Center made possible through gifts from Donor as referenced in the MOA. Moreover, because the Division is uniquely situated to operate the Rice Center and further the mission of the Donor, it is the intent of the Donor that the gift that is the subject of this Agreement be, at least for the time specified in this Agreement, subject to the condition that the Division remain a separate and distinct division of the University of Arkansas System and that the Rice Center remain part of the Division.

2. Donor Commitment

Pursuant to the terms and conditions set out in this Agreement, the Donor shall gift to the Division the total sum of \$5 million (the "Gift Funds") for the purpose of establishing the Rice Research Fund. The Donor acknowledges its understanding that the Division's obligation to meet its commitments under this Agreement is contingent upon receipt of the Gift Funds from Donor.

3. Division Commitment

The Division shall establish the Rice Research Fund as a separate fund of the Division, and shall use the Gift Funds to capitalize the Rice Research Fund. The Rice Research Fund will be established as an endowment for the benefit of the Division (the "Endowment"). The Division will cause the Endowment to be invested and professionally managed for the benefit of the Division, as further described herein. Funds deposited in the Rice Research Fund shall be the property of the Division, subject to the terms of this Agreement. Within five years of the date of this Agreement the Division will contribute at least \$5 million to the Rice Research Fund (the "Division Funds").

The Endowment shall be subject to the investment and spending policies of the University of Arkansas System, which may be subject to periodic revision. Amounts available for distribution under the terms of the adopted spending policy, after payment of the reasonable expenses of management and investment, (hereinafter "Distribution Amounts"), shall be appropriated for

operational costs of the Rice Center including, but not limited to, research and extension-related expenses, maintenance, and promotion associated with the Rice Center, as broadly defined. The Division shall separately account for the Gift Funds and the Division Funds, attributing separately the Endowment's expenses, earnings and distributions to the Gift Funds and the Division Funds in proportion to the balance of each.

4. Use of Distribution Amounts

As soon as available under the adopted spending policy, the Distribution Amounts may be utilized by the Division upon approval by the University of Arkansas System Vice President for Agriculture (hereinafter "VPAG"), or his or her designee(s). In the event that any Distribution Amount is not required for operational costs of the Rice Center, the amount of such excess may be reinvested in accordance with the adopted investment policy. Stewardship reports on the utilization of the Distribution Amounts shall be provided to the Donor at any time upon request, but at least annually. In addition, reports on the performance of the Endowment shall also be made available to the Donor at any time upon request, but at least annually. The Division may pay from the Endowment a reasonable fee for development and management of investment policies and spending policies for the Endowment, and for the creation of reports to Division and to the Donor.

Further, because of the potential obligation to return the Gift Funds as further provided in Paragraph 5, the Distribution Amounts shall, for accounting purposes, be deducted proportionately, and not equally, to the balance attributed to the Gift Funds and the balance attributed to the Division Funds.

5. Administration

With Division endowments lasting in perpetuity, it is generally understood and agreed that if, because of changed circumstances or conditions in the future, it is impossible, impracticable, or no longer feasible to use the Endowment for its original purpose, the Endowment will be directed by the Division to purposes that, in the opinion of the Division, are as closely related as possible to the purposes of the Rice Research Fund. However, for the reasons stated below, if at any time before July 27, 2047, either (a) the Division ceases to be a separate and administratively distinct division of the University of Arkansas System or (b) the Rice Center ceases to be a part of the Division (each a "triggering event"), the balance of the Endowment attributed to the Gift Funds, as of the date of a triggering event, shall be returned to the Donor if demanded in writing by Donor and Donor has continued to transfer Funds to the Division for rice research as set out in the MOA. In the event these conditions occur, the Division (or its successor in interest) shall use its best efforts to refund the balance as soon as practicable, consistent with the policies of the University of Arkansas System and the Arkansas Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act, and in any event within 24 months of the date of Donor's written demand. The parties agree that the return of the Donor's contribution of the Gift Funds to the Rice Research Fund is appropriate under the aforementioned circumstances in recognition of Donor's status as a statutorily created board responsible for promoting the growth and development of the rice industry in Arkansas by research, extension and promotion, the Donor's pledge of on-going transfers of Funds to the Division for rice research as set out in the MOA, the Division's

commitments to the Rice Center set out in the MOA, and the Division's unique role in agricultural development and research in Arkansas. Further, because of Donor's status, the parties do not contemplate that the return of any portion of the Gift Funds will have any negative tax implications on either party. However, any negative tax implication from the return of these monies will be the sole responsibility of the Donor.

In the event a triggering event occurs, Donor makes a written demand for the return of the Endowment balance attributed to Donor's Gift Funds, and such balance is returned to Donor, the balance of the Endowment created through the Division's contribution to the Rice Research Fund shall nevertheless remain in the Endowment and be used for purposes that, in the opinion of the Division or its successor in interest, are as closely related as possible to the intent of the parties as stated in this Agreement.

6. Standard Terms and Conditions

In addition to the terms set out herein, this Agreement is subject to the terms of the MOA, as well as the policies and procedures of the Division and of the Board including, without limitation, Board Policy 470.2 as it may be amended from time to time. In the event of any inconsistency between the MOA and this Agreement, the terms of this Agreement shall control. This Agreement is also subject to all applicable provisions of the Arkansas Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (Ark. Code Ann. §§ 28-69-801 et. seq.). In the event of any inconsistency between the Arkansas Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act and this Agreement, the terms of this Agreement shall control.

7. Amendment

This Agreement may not be modified or amended except by written agreement signed by each of the parties. Upon the mutual consent of the parties, in writing, any provision of this Agreement may be amended, modified, or deleted. Any such changes, deletions, or additions shall be recorded in a written addendum and signed by the Donor's authorized representative and the VPAG, which shall form part of this Agreement.

8. Acceptance

Except as otherwise set forth herein, the foregoing terms and conditions supersede all previous agreements, written or oral, and shall be effective only upon agreement and proper execution thereof by the Donor and the Division. Signatories to this agreement understand that the investment of the Gift Funds shall be managed under the terms described herein, and that the Distribution Amount shall be administered by the VPAG or by another entity or person designated by the Division.

9. Notices. Notice to the Division required or permitted by the Agreement shall be effective upon receipt. Any notices given by a party pursuant to this Agreement will be in writing and delivered personally or sent on a prepaid basis by certified or registered mail (return receipt requested), receipted courier service, or facsimile, to:

Dear Trustees:

Extracurricular camps are conducted on the various campuses of the University primarily during the summer months and holiday breaks. Authorization of use of University facilities for these camps by University employees for private compensation is permitted by State statute and Board policy. In addition, some camps may be conducted on University campuses by the University itself rather than by University employees for private compensation. In such cases, these camps may be approved by the Chancellor under campus policies. Since all camps have in the past been approved by the Board, certain camps which are not for private compensation may be included in the attached listing of extracurricular camps.

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, campus requests approval of additional Volleyball camps beginning September 23, 2018, and running through February 9, 2019. The reason for the proposal of additional camp dates is due to a recent NCAA ruling change. The new NCAA rule states that sports other than football and basketball cannot have on campus recruiting interactions with a prospective student-athlete in their 9th or 10th grades. Because of this change, sports may utilize camps/clinics as a way to have prospects on campus and have non-recruiting interactions with them.

A resolution is attached for your consideration. I recommend its approval.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

As part of our ongoing process to review and update Board of Trustees policies, we are proposing updated versions of three board policies and the deletion of four others. The Office of General Counsel has worked on these policy revisions in consultation with individuals within the system with expertise in these areas. The policy changes were distributed to the Chancellors in early August to be circulated on the campuses for feedback. Additionally, the proposed revisions were posted on the system's webpage with information on how to provide feedback.

Each policy is presented with both red-lined and clean versions. The policy revisions include:

- Board Policy 405.3: Resignations of Employment was revised to account for resignations communicated electronically and verbally. These changes were made to align the policy with current practice.
- Board Policy 705.1: Use of University Facilities was revised to expand the definition of the educational mission of the University related to facility use to include economic development and community involvement, as well as to account for [or address other appropriate] other uses of University facilities allowed under campus policies. These changes were made to align the policy with current practice.
- Board Policy 1725.1 Funding Intercollegiate Athletic Programs was reorganized for clarity and revised to remove outdated language and align the policy regarding funding athletic programs with current state law.

Additionally, we are recommending the deletion of the following policies:

- Board Policy 225.1 Solicitation and Fundraising Activities, which is addressed partially by the revised Board Policy 705.1 and will be further incorporated into a forthcoming draft of UASP 715.1 Use of University Facilities that complements Board Policy 705.1.
- Board Policy 1240.1 Policy for Obstetrical Services at UAMS, which was created in 1977 to limit the number of patients that could be accepted for obstetrical services. Because of the growth and changes at UAMS and within the practice of Obstetrics, this policy is outdated and no longer necessary.

- Board Policy 1225.1 Utilization Review Plan of the University Hospital, which was created in 1969, and is now obsolete because its contents are now governed by federal regulation and UAMS Medical Center policy and procedures related to guidelines published by the Centers for Medicare and Medical Services.
- Board Policy 1440.1 Women's Housing at UAM, which was passed in 1971 and is outdated and no longer applies to housing policy on the campus.

I recommend approval of each of these changes to Board Policy.

University facilities, grounds, and other resources (collectively "facilities") exist for the purpose of fulfilling the University's broad educational objectives, including its primary educational mission of teaching, research, and public service; promoting a robust exchange and critical evaluation of diverse viewpoints; and fostering economic development and community involvement. When not required for its organized educational programming or official functions, University facilities may be made available for extracurricular use to colleges, departments, and other organizational units of the University; to organizations composed exclusively of faculty and staff; to organizations that exist solely for the benefit of the University; and to recognized student organizations with the approval of the faculty advisor.

When a facility is not in use for a regularly scheduled educational activity or for an extracurricular activity by one of the University organizations listed above, pursuant to policies or procedures tailored to the educational objectives of the University adopted by each campus or unit, such facilities may be made available for use by individual or informal groups of students as part of their overall educational experience, or by other persons or entities if such use serves institutional objectives. For example, it is an objective of the University to provide opportunities for University and broader communities to see and hear leaders from throughout the state, nation, and world. The SSCH fee for each campus supporting an intercollegiate program shall be approved by the Board of Trustees.
- 4. The Board of Trustees shall certify annually to the AHECB that the athletic programs at all campuses will either generate sufficient revenue through athletic generated income, other auxiliary profits, other AHECB approved revenue sources, and AHECB allowable educational and general transfers to meet expenditures, or that any athletic deficit will be met by separate institutional Board-sanctioned student athletic fees to fund the athletic program within the limitations of the policies of the AHECB.

BOARD POLICY 225.1

SOLICITATION AND FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES

The buildings and grounds owned by the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas exist for, and are exclusively devoted to use for, the conduct of an organized and approved University program of higher education. As such, these buildings and grounds are committed to being used for the non-profit, tax-exempt use of the official program of the University. Therefore, private business activities are not permitted on University premises. However, in certain limited areas, the University contracts with private firms to provide needed on-campus services for the convenience of students, faculty, and staff which contribute to the accomplishment of the University's educational purposes.

Apart from prohibiting profit-making commercial business activities, the University also regulates, within limits, under separate policies, and consistent with the above policy, any use of its buildings and grounds for solicitation, including fund-raising activities.

POLICY FOR OBSTETRICAL SERVICE AT UAMS

Trustee Miller presented a recommendation from the Committee for approval of a policy regarding the obstetrical program at the University Hospital. He reported that for a long time there has been discussion about the patient safety and educational problems attendant to the large obstetrical program. A summary statement on this matter was developed by the Chief of Obstetrics and endorsed by the University Hospital Medical Board.

After discussion, the following Resolution moved by Trustee Miller and seconded by Dr. Kemp was adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS, THAT:

The Board of Trustees concurs with the following policy developed by the Chief-Of-Obstetrics and endorsed by the University Hospital Medical Board:

"The number of patients presenting themselves to the University of Arkansas Medical Sciences Campus Obstetrical Service far surpasses the capacity of the physical facilities, nursing services and support services. In the interest of patient's safety and improved educational programs, it is requested that an institutional policy be established that allows pre-registration of approximately 150 new patients each month for prenatal care, delivery and post-partum services. An additional fifty patients per month would be accepted if transfer had received prior approval from the senior resident or a staff physician on the obstetric service. Authority for making this determination is vested in the Chief Resident of Obstetrics."

BOARD POLICY 1225.1

UTILIZATION REVIEW PLAN OF THE UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

Introduction

The Utilization Review Committee of the University Hospital was established on January 6, 1966, at a meeting of the Medical Board at 4:00 p.m. in Room 1708 of the Education Building at the Medical Center. At that meeting, extended discussion took place with regard to the organization, functions, methods, and objectives of the Utilization Review Committee. The Medical Board is the representative group for the Medical Staff which acts for the staff in matters of policy. Therefore, all actions approved by the Medical Board are automatically sanctioned by the entire staff. The Board of Trustees of the University Hospital is the Board of the University of Arkansas and ordinarily does not approve matters of professional operations such as utilization review.

As a result of the discussion, the following standards were established:

Organization and Composition

The Utilization Review Committee of the University Hospital is a committee of the Medical Board, a group of the Medical Staff advisory to the administration and consisting of the clinical department heads in medicine, obstetrics, pediatrics, pathology, psychiatry, radiology, and surgery of the School of Medicine of the University of Arkansas. Because of the importance of utilization review, it was agreed that this obligation should have direct supervision by the directors of each clinic service who compose the Medical Board. The membership of this Medical Board Committee for Utilization Review is composed of representatives of:

Medicine Department Obstetrics Department Pediatrics Department Pathology Department Psychiatry Department Radiology Department Surgery Department

Other representatives on the committee are:

Hospital Administrator Medical Record Librarian Director of Nursing Service Director of Admissions Director of Social Service As salaried physicians of the faculty of the School of Medicine, none of the physicians has a direct financial interest in the hospital.

II. Frequency of Meetings

Meetings of the Utilization Review Committee are scheduled for the first Thursday of each month at 4:00 p.m.

III. Type of Records Kept

Minutes of the proceedings of the Utilization Review Committee meetings are maintained by the Hospital Administrator, who is the secretary of the Medical Board. Reports are regularly made by the Committee to the Executive Committee of the medical staff and relevant information and recommendations are reported through usual channels to the entire medical staff and the governing hody of the hospital.

The Hospital Administration studies and acts upon administrative recommendations made by the Committee.

A summary of the number and types of cases reviewed, and the findings, are part of the records. A Utilization Review Committee check list is the document which is completed by the various departments on selected patient records and scrutinized by the Utilization Review Committee. These check lists are maintained on file by the Committee.

Committee action in extended stay cases is recorded, with cases identified only by hospital case number.

IV. Method of Case Selection

Reviews are made on a basis of duration of stay by diagnosis with respect to the medical necessity of the service for the purpose of promoting the most efficient use of available health facilities and services. Such reviews emphasize identification and analysis of patterns of patient care in order to maintain consistent high quality.

Sampling of all types of diagnoses is carried out through the Medical Record Department so that the records of a cross-section of patients with similar medical problems may be reviewed by the Committee. All patients who stay longer than the pre-established length of stay by diagnosis are reviewed. Review of cases includes diagnoses of special relevance to the aged group. Some review functions are carried out on a continuing basis. Reviews also include a sample of recertification of medical necessity.

A copy of the listing of pre-established lengths of stay by diagnosis is attached.

V. <u>Definition of Period of Extended Duration</u>

Statistical reports kept by the Medical Record Department indicate the average length of stay for patients on each service. These standards are utilized along with the judgment of the physicians who conduct departmental record conferences to determine which patients stay in the hospital overly long and which patients are discharged too early. Any continuous hospitalization of Medicare patients in excess of 30 days is considered extended duration.

VI. Relationship of Utilization Review Plan to Claims Administration by a Third Party

On rare occasions, third parties such as the State Welfare Department question the length of stay of patients hospitalized at the University Hospital. It is expected that the operation of the Utilization Review Committee will tend to eliminate these questions. However, any such problems called to the attention of the administration by third parties are submitted to the Utilization Review Committee members for their opinion. The Administration will notify the Fiscal Intermediary of any adverse finds of the Committee.

VII. Arrangements for Committee Reports and Their Dissemination

Reports of the work of the Utilization Review Committee are available immediately to the members of the Board of Professional Operations. This information, therefore, is disseminated in the usual University channels through the heads of departments.

VIII. Responsibility to the Hospital's Administrative Staff

The Utilization Review Committee has the support and assistance of the hospital's administrative staff in assembling information, facilitating chart reviews, conducting studies, exploring ways to improve procedures, maintaining committee records, and promoting the most efficient use of available health services and facilities.

With respect to each of these activities, a physician representing each clinical department is designated as being responsible for the particular service. The Social Service Department, Admissions, Personnel and the Hospital Administrator, as well as the Medical Record Department, cooperate in meeting the objectives of improved patient care of the Utilization Review Committee.

In order to encourage the most efficient use of available health services and facilities, assistance to the physician in timely planning for post-hospital care is initiated as promptly as possible. Current information on resources available for continued out-of-hospital care of patients is made available to the attending physician and arrangement for prompt transfer of appropriate medical and nursing information is carried out in order to assure continuity of care upon discharge of a patient. This is a daily responsibility of the Social Service Department.

IX. Utilization Review Committee Check List

The Utilization Review Committee Check List is an adaptation of the form pioneered by the Hospital Utilization Project for the Pennsylvania Medical Society and the Hospital Council of Western Pennsylvania and shown under Appendix B in the publication "Guide to the Establishment and Functioning of a Medical Staff Utilization Committee."

X. Review of Cases of Continuous Extended Duration

The Admission Office prepares daily lists of Medicare patients who in 48 hours will exceed 30 days of continuous hospitalization and again at 60 days of continuous hospitalization. These lists are then forwarded by the Admission Office to the services on which these patients have been admitted. The attending physician completes a request for extended stay or discharges, the patient within 48 hours.

The request for extended stay is reviewed within two days and no later than the seventh day following the last day of the period of extended duration specified in this plan. This review is made by a Utilization Review Committee member other than the member representing the service on which the patient in question is being treated.

If, in the opinion of the reviewing physician, continued in-patient stay is not warranted, the reviewing physician notifies the attending physician and the Admission Office within 48 hours. If the attending physician differs with the reviewing physician regarding the medical necessity of further hospitalization, the matter is referred to the full committee for Utilization Review.

If physician members of the committee decide, after opportunity for consultation is given the attending physician by the committee, and considering the availability and appropriateness of out-of-hospital facilities and services, that further in-patient stay is not medically necessary, there is notification in writing within 48 hours to the institution, the attending physician and the patient or the patient's representative.

Because there are significant divergences in opinion among individual physicians in respect to evaluation of medical necessity for in-patient hospital services, the judgment of the attending physician in an extended stay case is given great weight, and is not rejected except under unusual circumstances.

All cases which require extension of hospital stay are made a part of the records of the Utilization Review Committee so that they may be scanned periodically by the members. The reasons for

prolonged stay are tabulated in order to develop information about patterns of delay and to improve the efficiency of care wherever possible.

XI. Special Characteristics of the University Hospital

It should be understood that the University Hospital operates in a fashion different from that of the community hospital. The University of Arkansas School of Medicine faculty is essentially a full-time group headquartered at the Medical Center and available at all times to patients and students. The process of teaching the medical student, the intern and the resident necessitates intensive continuous review of the care of all patients. This review is done primarily through the departmental structure of each clinical service and is conducted on a number of levels from that of the medical student on up to the level of the chief of the department. Intensive departmental review does not mean that there is not room for the improvement of the efficiency of services to patients. However, teaching considerations in the University Hospital are obviously important and may not be completely ignored for the sake of rapid turnover of patients. In addition, the average length of stay in the University Hospital tends to be longer because of two factors, namely, the teaching process and the increased complexity of medical problems seen in the University setting.

The University Hospital recognizes, however, that efficient and effective care of the patient is the principal objective of the institution and expects that the process of utilization review will assist in meeting this objective. The philosophy of the University of Arkansas Hospital is similar to that of F. Markoe Rivinus, Chairman of the Board of Managers of the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, who said in a recent annual report of that institution, "I don't think there ought to be any compromise or any suggestion that patient care doesn't come first in a teaching hospital; it may have other considerations connected with it such as teaching and research, but if you are not doing those things for the improvement of patient care either on that patient or the next one, you'd better not do them at all."
