## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Nancy Jo Atkins Smith, 73, of Little Rock, director of Special Services at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS), passed away on August 28, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the Board wishes to express its condolences to Ms. Smith's son, J.C., and her siblings, May Atkins, Julie Atkins, Charles Atkins and Billy Atkins and their family and loved ones; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Smith, a Camden native, graduated from UAMS as part of the first nurse practitioner program. Her 45-year UAMS career included positions as a nurse in the Emergency Medicine Department and Chief nurse in the Orthopaedics Department in the College of Medicine. In 2002, she became director of Special Services transforming the department into an invaluable resource for patients who needed help navigating the health system; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Smith's dedication has been recognized in several ways at UAMS. The second floor surgery waiting area of UAMS Medical Center is named in her honor and she received the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Service at UAMS' commencement in 2022. An annual Chancellor's Circle grant named in her honor supports patient services. A scholarship in the College of Nursing bears her name. And, she was named a "Phenomenal Woman" during a UAMS celebration of Women's History Month; and

WHEREAS, in 2024, Ross and Mary Whipple of Arkadelphia honored Ms. Smith for her service and unwavering commitment to patients by establishing the Nancy Jo Smith Special Services Fund for Excellence to support and expand patient services across UAMS; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Smith was also honored as Nurse of the Day on the floor of both the Arkansas Senate and Arkansas House of Representatives; and

WHEREAS, on September 20, she will be honored for her outstanding contributions to improving the lives of UAMS cancer patients with the Pat and Willard Walker Tribute Award at the UAMS Winthrop P. Rockefeller Cancer Institute's Gala for Life; and

WHEREAS, thousands of patients across Arkansas and the world were touched by Ms. Smith's compassion. She was there for them when they needed her the most, sitting by their bedsides, arranging appointments, meeting them in the emergency room and comforting their loved ones. Her compassion wasn't based on any timetable as she made herself available 24 hours a day. She treated everyone with the same kindness and respect, whether they were dignitaries, donors or strangers; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Smith was beloved by members of the UA Board of Trustees as well as by her work family, her many friends and the patients and families she helped across our state and world. All will miss her;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board expresses its deep appreciation for Ms. Smith's contributions and service, and its enduring gratitude for the immeasurable contributions she made to the UA System and the legacy she leaves.





WHEREAS, for more than two decades, ASMSA has partnered directly with the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) to offer distance education services, benefiting thousands of students across the state; and

WHEREAS, ASMSA's 2025 Strategic Plan challenges the school to explore innovative ways to serve an expanded audience of students and grow enrollment, including the development of additional online learning opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the passage of the LEARNS Act of 2023 greatly expanded opportunities for school choice, educational freedom, and parental empowerment in how best to ensure Arkansas students have access to a quality education; and

WHEREAS, the ACCESS Act of 2025 seeks to promote academic acceleration for gifted and talented students, with acceleration being dependent upon access to high-quality, rigorous, and college-level coursework in high school; and

WHEREAS, Act 730 of 2025 specifically names ASMSA as an approved provider to meet ADE's vision for the state's online Course Choice Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the School is authorized to establish the ASMSA Online Academy.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT if enrollment and budget goals have not been met upon evaluation of the program after five years the program will be discontinued.

(a) For the following border states: LA, MO, MS, OK, TN and TX, tuition will be charged at the in-state resident rate for College of Medicine, College of Pharmacy-Pharm. D. program only, College of Nursing programs (with the exception of the Nurse Anesthesia program), and the following programs in the College of Health Professions: Audiology, Cytology, Medical Laboratory Sciences traditional program, Respiratory Therapy BS and MS, and Dietetics.

(b) The Accelerated BSN program's incoming students' first term is Summer 2025. Students in this program will be charged FY26 tuition and fees starting in the Summer term instead of the fall term.

(c) Tuition is an annual rate that remains the same throughout the academic year. Students will be charged a flat rate per semester that will remain the same for three (3) semesters (summer, fall, spring). Any increase in tuition will be effective May 2025 or the date of the next incoming class.

(d) The Medical Laboratory Sciences Traditional Program students are charged standard resident tuition rates. Non-Degree students, historically transfer into the online program and should be charged the Medical Laboratory Technology to Medical Laboratory Sciences BS online rate.

(e) Tuition is an annual rate that remains the same throughout the academic year. Students will be charged a flat rate per semester that will remain the same for three (3) semesters (summer, fall, spring). Any increase in tuition will be effective May 2026 or the date of the next incoming class.

(f) Tuition is an annual rate that remains the same throughout the academic year. A flat rate is charged for each semester (fall and spring).

(g) Tuition is a set program cost and will not increase while the student is enrolled in the program. Any increases in tuition will be effective for the next incoming class.

**TUITION NARRATIVES**

The College of Medicine is requesting a 2.8% increase in base tuition for FY25-26. The College is above the mean of Public Medical Schools in the AAMC Southern region currently. Student debt remains a concern. The student indebtedness in the COM remains above the southern average and about \$35k above the national public school mean.

The College of Pharmacy is not requesting an increase in tuition for FY25-26. Tuition was increased by 3% in FY24-25 and was increased by 5% for FY22-23. Enrollment into Pharm. D. programs is highly competitive; therefore, keeping the COP tuition rate within the 25th percentile allows the UAMS COP to stay competitive within the region.

The College of Nursing is requesting an increase in the resident tuition for the graduate Masters and DNP Programs, as well as an increase in the resident and non-resident tuition for the DNP-CRNA Program in FY2025-2026. These recommendations will continue to keep tuition competitive with other nursing programs in Arkansas and the southern region.

The College of Health Professions is requesting to maintain its tuition rates for undergraduate and graduate programs. These recommendations will continue to keep tuition competitive with other allied health programs in the state and region. Starting in FY25-26, the in-state tuition rate is charged for the Audiology, Cytology, Medical Laboratory Sciences Traditional Program, Respiratory Therapy BS and MS, and Dietetics programs for the following border states: LA, MO, MS, OK, TN and TX. This will increase our ability to attract highly qualified non-residents in the region and highly qualified non-residents currently enrolled at colleges/universities within Arkansas. We are recommended to clarify the tuition rates currently being charged for MLTMLS-BS online, MLS Traditional, Extended Internship program and Non-Degree students.

The Graduate School is requesting an increase in tuition for FY25-26 of 1.7%. Rates will remain competitive within the region with the Graduate School being in the median for regional peer comprehensive academic health centers.

The College of Public Health is requesting an increase of 5% for FY25-26. We will remain slightly below the median for tuition base and slightly above the median in total tuition/fees among the 60 schools reporting to the ASPPH. Plus we remain competitive with other regional CEPH accredited schools.

- 1 The Student Health Fee is not charged to students enrolled in UAMS-designated 100% online programs and is not charged for the summer semester.
- 2 The Student Transportation fee is not charged to students enrolled in UAMS-designated 100% online programs. For each term, students enrolled in programs on the Northwest campus will not be charged. Summer session rate is \$39.
- 3 The UAMS Technology Fee is charged to all students with the exception of students enrolled in UAMS-designated 100% online programs. They are charged one-half of the standard rate. This fee is not charged for the summer semester.

- 4 Undergraduate students taking less than 6 hours and Graduate students taking less than 5 hours will not be charged. The fee is not charged for the summer semester. Students enrolled in UAMS-designated 100% online programs will be charged one-half of the standard rate.
- 5 The Student Activity fee is not charged to students enrolled in approved, UAMS-designated 100% online programs. It is not charged for the summer semester.
- 6 This fee is charged to students actively engaged in a UAMS degree program but not enrolled in credit-bearing courses/activities, are preparing to fulfill graduation requirements and/or awaiting completion of final licensure tests. Requesting an increase of \$50 for FY26 due to the increased number of students in the dual degree programs and corresponding teaching and administration of these programs.
- 7 The following fees were included within the COM tuition rates starting Fall of 2017: Disability Insurance (\$26/semester), Malpractice Insurance \$188/semester, Standardized Patient Fee (\$170/semester) and Curriculum Assessment Monitoring Fee (Exam Software) (\$35/semester). Total = \$419/semester; \$838/year.
- 8 A one-time student application fee is charged to all applicants.
- 9 In Fall 2019, the College of Medicine instituted a fee to students during their M1 and M2 years for mandatory course study materials. These materials are provided to students at a reduced institutional rate. In FY23, the fee was extended to include the M3 and M4 students.
- 10 The CON sets the Undergraduate Standardized Patient Fee amount based on required usage of standardized patients.
- 11 The College of Nursing Graduate Program Fee is a generic fee that replaced the Advanced Health Assessment Fee previously charged to the graduate students enrolled in the Advanced Health Assessment course. The fee covers the use of standardized patients (\$75), Typhon, a graduate student tracking software (\$25), and the addition of Osmosis Clinical Sciences Library (\$66). This fee is charged each semester to students enrolled in graduate programs.
- 12 The College of Nursing Progression Test Fee includes price increases associated with the cost of ATI, ExamSoft, ExamSoft Clinical Judgement Exams Complete Solutions, Kahoot, and Nursing Central for the BSN students. The fee should be charged each semester.

- 13 Although not a fee, this deposit is due upon acceptance, as a reservation of enrollment prior to actual registration. It is non-refundable, but will be applied to the first semester tuition if the applicant enrolls within a year.
- 14 The Anesthesia Professional Liability Insurance/Student Liability Insurance is provided to students only by the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists (AANA). The needed liability insurance for CRNAs is more comprehensive in the variety of anesthetizing locations in which they will gain clinical experiences.
- 15 The CRNA Progression Fee includes the costs of AANA/NBCRNA Dual Enrollment, SEE Exam and APEX. All components are either required and/or enhance performance with uniquely tailored assignments geared towards ensuring successful completion of the program. Students who were admitted into the program in 2020 and 2021 are exempt from the CRNA Progression fee. Starting with incoming Fall 2022 students, the fee will be charged annually during the Fall term.
- 16 The College of Nursing Graduate Simulation Fee is being added to support the use of PCS Spark which allows for formative and summative evaluations of student competencies. This fee is to be charged each semester to students enrolled in graduate programs.
- 17 The Pre-NAPLEX fee covers the cost of the Pre-NAPLEX exam. The exam will be administered to the P3 and P4 students.
- 18 The NAPLEX Prep Course fee is spread out over the duration of the program to cover the cost of an externally provided prep course to improve NAPLEX pass rate.
- 19 Immunization Training by APhA is required by most state Boards of Pharmacy to administer immunizations. This training is during the P1 year Fall semester only.
- 20 The Professional Development Fee is used to subsidize the current Student Activity Fee funding of professional development activities specific to the COP students.
- 21 Decision Support Technology for students includes various technology tools (such as device-based LexiComp & AccessPharmacy fees). In FY26, we are requesting an increase in this fee because the vendor has increased the cost of the software.
- 22 Electronic Test Delivery Software secures test delivery for onsite and remote testing for (P1, P2, & P3 per semester only).
- 23 Laboratory fees in the College of Health Professions are set on a credit hour of enrollment basis with the following exceptions:
  - (a) Physical Therapy charges a \$180 lab fee during the fall and spring terms.
  - (b) Physician Assistant Studies charges a laboratory fee of \$450 for summer, fall,

- and spring terms.
- (c) Genetic Counseling charges a laboratory fee of \$275 for fall, and spring terms.
  - (d) Speech-Language Pathology charges a laboratory fee of \$164 for fall, and spring terms.
  - (e) Nuclear Medicine Imaging Sciences charges a laboratory fee of \$54 for fall, spring and summer terms.
  - (f) Dental Hygiene charges a laboratory fee of \$300 fall, spring and summer semesters.
- 24 The Student Liability Insurance in the College of Health Professions covers students in a wide range of programs. Fall term only. Student in Physician Assistant Studies will not be charged for malpractice coverage.
  - 25 The College of Health Professions sets the Standardized Patient Fee amount based on required usage of standardized patients.
  - 26 The Audiology program purchases Oscopes for the first year students as part of their necessary equipment.
  - 27 The Respiratory Therapy 'voucher' fee provides funding to the student when it is time to sit for his/her registry exams while still in school. With the voucher, the student would only need to enter a code in order to sit for their exam.
  - 28 The Credit by Examination fee would apply to College of Health Professions courses for which a student demonstrates competency or equivalency in the subject matter. This would be similar to a CLEP exam. The fee for Credit by Examination would be 1/2 the per credit hour rate of the course in which the student is seeking credit.
  - 29 The Medical Laboratory Sciences BS Traditional Program and Cytology charges a one time fee of \$150.00 for the maintenance of the classroom microscopes and associated information technology.
  - 30 This College of Public Health fee covers the cost for the Certificate in Public Health exam that is a college requirement. The exam is offered by the National Board of Public Health Examiners, to be taken by all MPH students upon completion of their MPH core courses. This fee is assessed one-time when students take the Certified Public Health Exam Prep Seminar course. This fee will be charged starting fall 2024.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the 2025/26 budgets for each campus, division, unit and program of the University of Arkansas are adopted as presented.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the President is authorized to make such appropriate corrections, additions, or deletions as may be required for the draft budget to the final budget document for fiscal year 2025/26.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT position lists to be developed and attached to final budget documents are solely for the purpose of authorizing the President, and the Chancellors, the Vice President for Agriculture, the Director of the Arkansas Archeological Survey, the Director of the Criminal Justice Institute, the Director of the Arkansas School for Mathematics, Sciences, and the Arts, and the Dean of the Clinton School of Public Service and other appropriate officials as authorized by the President, to determine persons who may be offered employment and the salaries and titles which may be offered within the framework of the respective operating budgets, should it be determined to fill such positions. Approval of the budget is not intended to constitute an

act of contracting with any person or persons who may be listed in the final budget documents, or at salary amounts or titles in the positions indicated.

Under such delegation of authority, the President and the Chancellors, the Vice President for Agriculture, the Director of the Arkansas Archeological Survey, the Director of the Criminal Justice Institute, the Director of the Arkansas School for Mathematics, Sciences, and the Arts, and the Dean of the Clinton School of Public Service and other appropriate officials as authorized by the President, may negotiate salaries above or below the amounts shown in the budget, so long as the amount is not in excess of the maximum amounts prescribed by law unless exceeding such line item maximum has previously been approved by the President, Chancellors or other appropriate administrators or by the Board, except as regards UAMS as set forth hereinafter, including previously approved housing allowances; and further, the President and Chancellor at UAMS may approve payment of special allowances as a part of the salaries of the physicians, dentists, and other professional faculty from receipts of professional income in the care of patients and/or funds received from federal agencies, foundations, and other private sponsors in support of research; provided that any such allowance shall not exceed, for any employee, an amount equal to two and one half (2½) times that portion of the salary authorized by the General Assembly to be paid from the University of Arkansas Medical Center Fund. This authority shall include but not be limited to determining compensation for special services as provided by overload, overtime, and extra compensation policies, provided that the increased stipends from those sources do not exceed the statutory maximum amounts when added to regular salaries.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas (the "Board") adopted a resolution on March 13, 2024 (the "2024 Resolution") which (i) authorized the marketing and issuance of the Board's Various Facilities Revenue Bonds (Pine Bluff Campus) (the "Bonds") for the purpose of refunding certain bonds, (ii) authorized the execution of certain documents pertaining to the Bonds, and (iii) set forth other matters pertaining to the authorization, sale, marketing, and issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Bonds have not yet been issued; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to confirm and continue the authorizations granted by the 2024 Resolution;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS:

Section 1. The 2024 Resolution, and the authorizations granted thereby, are hereby in all respects confirmed and continued.

Section 2. The forms of all bond documents distributed to representatives of the University of Arkansas System (the "System") and made available to the Board may be updated with such revisions as shall be approved by the Chair of the Board or the President of the System, the signature of either on such documents to constitute proof of acceptance of any such revisions.

Section 3. The provisions of this Resolution are hereby declared to be separable and if any provision shall for any reason be held illegal or invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Resolution.

WHEREAS, the Widening Project will benefit the public and University of Arkansas Division of Agriculture, including improved traffic flow, crosswalks, sidewalks, a roundabout, a trail, and transit benefits;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board hereby approves the grant of certain rights of way and easements to the City of Fayetteville for the express and sole purpose of the City's completion of the State Highway 112 (Garland Avenue) Widening Project, said rights of way and easements being located in Fayetteville, Washington County, Arkansas, and described as follows:

12. Campus Report: Chancellor Steve Cole, Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas:

Chancellor Steve Cole presented "UA Cossatot: Then and Now" which outlined the institution's evolution over the past 50 years, from its beginnings in 1975 as Cossatot Vocational-Technical School with just 75 students, to its present status as UA Cossatot, a dynamic and expanding part of the University of Arkansas System. Key milestones include partnerships with Southern Arkansas University, its transformation into a technical college and later a community college, the development of multiple campuses in De Queen, Ashdown, Nashville, and Lockesburg, and its most important milestone: becoming part of the University of Arkansas System in 2001. Dr. Cole spoke about significantly expanding academic offerings, student support services, and physical infrastructure, including renovations, new facilities, and the implementation of cost-saving Open Educational Resources.

Dr. Cole provided insights into UA Cossatot's strategic vision, which emphasizes innovation, access, and workforce development. Its 2025 Facilities Master Plan proposes major upgrades across campuses, student housing, and enhanced technology. The college has launched or expanded programs in cybersecurity, medical lab technology, fiber optics, agriculture, veterinary technology, and athletics, positioning itself as a leader in rural workforce education. With a spring 2025 enrollment of nearly 1,500 students (credit and non-credit) and a focus on first-generation, Hispanic, and non-traditional learners, Dr. Cole talked about how UA Cossatot continues to align its mission with the needs of its community—committed to progress, people, and possibilities.

13. President's Report:

President Silveria reported on commencements held at the UA System campuses stating there were 39 ceremonies from May 2 to May 17 with the system graduating just under 14,000 individuals. He highlighted inspirational stories of students from several of the campuses as examples of the remarkable work of the UA chancellors and UA institutions across the system. He then called UA-PTC Chancellor Summer DeProw to come forward and recognized her as a University of Mississippi 2025 School of Education Hall of Fame

Inductee. The President and the Board congratulated Dr. DeProw for the recognition of her visionary leadership in higher education and workforce development.

14. Consideration of Request for Authorization for the President to Negotiate and Finalize the Merger Agreement, NAC:

President Silveria reported that the North Arkansas College (NAC) Board of Trustees passed a resolution to formally investigate becoming a member campus of the UA System on March 13, 2025. Since that action, he and UA System staff have met with the faculty and staff at NAC to discuss the benefits of System membership and to investigate the alignment of institutional missions and participated in NAC led community meetings in NAC's region. On May 8, 2025, the NAC Board of Trustees unanimously adopted a resolution to approve a proposed agreement for NAC to become a member campus of the UA System. In that same spirit, President Silveria requested approval of a proposed merger agreement. Upon motion by Trustee Dickey and second by Trustee Lawson, the following resolution was approved.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas has historically sought to grow its land-grant mission of providing affordable, quality post-secondary education and related public services to the State of Arkansas and its citizens through adding strategically and geographically aligned institutions as member campuses; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of North Arkansas College shares this mission of education and service to its community and has expressed the desire for the College to join the ranks of University of Arkansas System institutions; and

WHEREAS, North Arkansas College provides an array of associate's degrees, general education transfer programs, and workforce-relevant technical programs, along with public service and outreach programs to serve the citizens of the region; and

WHEREAS, North Arkansas College and its administration, students, faculty, and staff promote a culture of academic excellence and community outreach that seamlessly aligns with the existing campuses, divisions, and units of the University of Arkansas System; and

WHEREAS, the presidents of the University of Arkansas System and North Arkansas College have discussed the benefits of creating a formal partnership between the System and the College;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board hereby approves of the proposed merger

in which North Arkansas College will become a member campus of the University of Arkansas System.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Board requests that the President, in consultation with the General Counsel, negotiate and prepare a merger agreement and plan of transition to be signed as soon as practicable by the Chairperson of each institution's Board of Trustees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the President and Chief Financial Officer are authorized to take such other actions and sign such other documents as are prudent or necessary to implement the merger and transition, subject to review and approval of the General Counsel.

15. Approval of Authorization for Razorback Transit to Apply for Federal Transit Administration Funds, UAF:

UA Fayetteville Chancellor Charles Robinson requested authorization for Razorback Transit to seek federal financial assistance from the Federal Transit Administration Funds. Upon motion of Trustee Lawson and second by Trustee Fryar, the following resolution was approved:

WHEREAS, the Federal Transit Administrator has been delegated authority to award federal financial assistance for a transportation project;

WHEREAS, the grant or cooperative agreement for federal financial assistance will impose certain obligations upon the applicant, and may require the applicant to provide the local share of the project cost; and

WHEREAS, the applicant has or will provide all annual certifications and assurances to the Federal Transit Administration required for the project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS:

That the Senior Advisor, Office of Sponsored Programs, or a successor designated in writing by the Vice Chancellor for Research and Innovation (hereinafter "Senior Advisor – OSP"), is authorized to execute and file an application for federal assistance on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas, acting for and on behalf of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville – Razorback Transit (hereinafter "Razorback Transit"), with the Federal Transit Administration for federal assistance authorized by 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53, title 23, United

States Code, or other federal statutes authorizing a project administered by the Federal Transit Administration.

That Razorback Transit is the Direct Recipient of Federal Funds under the Designated Recipient, the Northwest Arkansas Regional Planning Commission, and is authorized under 49 U.S.C. §5307, either alone or in addition to other federal assistance administered by the Federal Transit Administration, and has received authority from the Designated Recipient to apply for Urbanized Area Formula Program assistance.

That the Senior Advisor – OSP is authorized to execute and file with its applications the annual certifications and assurances and other documents the Federal Transportation Administration requires before awarding a federal assistance grant or cooperative agreement.

That the Senior Advisor – OSP is authorized to execute grant and cooperative agreements with the Federal Transit Administration on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas, acting for and on behalf of Razorback Transit.

16. Approval of Allocation of Bobbie Jean Threlkeld Living Trust Funds to Land of Opportunity Scholarship Fund, UAF:

In December 2024, the University of Arkansas received a generous trust distribution from the Bobbie Jean Threlkeld Living Trust, which states that the funds are to be distributed to the “UA Fayetteville campus to be used in the general fund as the Board of Regents shall determine.” Chancellor Charles Robinson proposed that the Board allocate these funds to support the Land of Opportunity Scholarship Fund to benefit high need students attending the University. Upon motion of Trustee Fryar and second by Trustee Lawson, the following resolution was approved:

WHEREAS, the University of Arkansas received a generous trust distribution from the Bobbie Jean Threlkeld Living Trust in December 2024, which states that the funds are to be distributed to the “UA Fayetteville campus to be used in the general fund as the Board of Regents shall determine;” and

WHEREAS, the funds are currently being held in a quasi-endowment by the campus; and

WHEREAS, Chancellor Charles Robinson has recommended that the Board allocate these funds to support the Land of Opportunity Scholarship Fund, in order to benefit high need students attending the University;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board expresses its gratitude for this generous gift from the Bobbie Jean Threlkeld Living Trust.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Board hereby approves the use of these funds for the purpose of the Land of Opportunity Scholarship Fund, to be used consistent with the policies established by the campus for this scholarship.

17. Approval of Summer Camps, UAPB, UAF, CCCUA, UAPB and UALR:

Upon motion of Trustee Dickey and second by Trustee Fryar the following resolution was approved:

WHEREAS, the activities involved in the proposed extracurricular camps at the various campuses of the University of Arkansas present no conflict of interest with the mission and purpose of the institution; and

WHEREAS, the activities proposed will bring to campus a number of potential students who might enroll on campus as a result of their exposure to its facilities and its personnel while engaged in these activities; and

WHEREAS, the contemplated activities will generate funds to be paid to the University for housing and meals and for the use of other institutional facilities which will be used to help support the auxiliary functions of the campuses serving to enroll students;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board fully supports the mission and purpose of the various campuses hosting extracurricular athletic and academic camps, and generally grants permission to the employees and campuses seeking to conduct during 2025-26 the extracurricular camps set out below, and further approves the fees as shown below.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT each campus whose employees are conducting the aforesaid camps pursuant to Board Policy 1715.1 as well as each campus that may host or allow use of facilities for other camps that do not require the express approval of the Board shall make certain that policies and contractual provisions are in place to assure that all applicable laws and regulations dealing with mandatory reporting of suspected child maltreatment are followed, that appropriate staffing patterns are utilized, that personnel involved in the conduct of such camps receive instruction in applicable policies, procedures, laws and regulations regarding protection of children, and further that campus officials shall assure that persons involved in the conduct of such camps have undergone criminal

20.1 Lewis E. Epley, Jr. Sorrow Resolution:

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Epley, Jr., 88, of Fort Smith, Trustee Emeritus of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas, passed away on March 19, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley was born in Fort Smith on April 28, 1936 before his family transplanted to Springdale, and he was later diagnosed with polio during high school, rendering his left arm, hand and leg partially paralyzed; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley spent the first semester of his senior year of high school at the Arkansas Children's Convalescent Center in Jacksonville, where he coached and encouraged younger patients in their recovery and discovered his own discipline and strength in the process; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley played the clarinet in the Springdale High School band prior to his diagnosis, and upon returning to school for the second semester of his senior year, was unable to continue playing music due to the paralysis; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley instead became involved with the band program in other ways after being invited to be the public announcer for a regional marching band contest and meeting E.J. Marty, the director of the Razorback Band at the U of A, who eventually made Mr. Epley the "Voice of the Razorback Band," a position he held seven years; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley started classes at the U of A in the fall of 1954 and earned a degree in public administration from the Sam M. Walton College of Business, and his Bachelor of Laws from the School of Law in 1961; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley traveled with the Razorback Band to away games and made lifelong friends with many of the band members and directors, giving him an overwhelming acceptance from the band that motivated him to help the faculty and students improve the band experience at the U of A when he came into positions of success; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley met his wife of more than 60 years, Donna Swopes, in his last year of law school, and she was the first member of the Epley family to graduate from the University of Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley received his attorney license from the Supreme Court of Arkansas in 1961, established a law practice in Eureka Springs, and was admitted to practice before the Federal District Court and the United States Supreme Court in 1974; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley was appointed Special Associate Justice of the Arkansas Supreme Court and was also appointed by then-Gov. David Pryor as a founding member of the Arkansas State Building Council; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley was appointed by then-Gov. Bill Clinton to a 10-year term on the Board of Trustees where he advocated for the expansion and improvement of the Razorback Bands and the university's band building, which was expanded and named the Lewis E. Epley Jr. Band Hall in his honor in 1997; and

WHEREAS, after exiting the Board of Trustees, Mr. Epley served as board member of the University of Arkansas Foundation and was recognized by the Foundation for 25 years of service in 2019; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley received the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences Chancellor's Award for his generous contributions to the university, including serving on the UAMS Foundation Board, the UAMS Northwest Campus Advisory Board, and helping to establish a new physical therapy department on the UAMS Northwest Campus; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley was a charter member to the U of A Chancellor's Society and as a member of the 2010 Commission, the Campaign Steering Committee and on the board of directors for the Arkansas Alumni Association and the Razorback Band Alumni Society; and

WHEREAS, in 1999, the Walton Family Charitable Support Foundation established the Lewis E. Epley Jr. Professorship in Economics in the Sam M. Walton College of Business in recognition of his distinguished leadership and service on the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Epley and his wife, Donna, made a founding gift to create a 45,000 square-foot clinic, classroom and laboratory space named the Epley Center for Health Professions, which houses the Speech and Hearing Clinic and the Eleanor Mann School of Nursing; and

WHEREAS, the University of Arkansas System and the Board of Trustees wishes to express condolences to the family of Mr. Epley and honor his many accomplishments and contributions within the UA System.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Dear Trustees:

As you are aware, the University of Arkansas System administrative team has worked to review and update our outdated strategic plan and mission statement. At the Board retreat in early August, we discussed this process and reviewed initial ideas for a new mission statement and for new “strategic pillars” to guide our work in the coming years. I distributed drafts of the mission statement and strategic pillars on August 25 to the Board and to our Chancellors and Directors across the system for feedback. While the work to gather feedback and refine the strategic pillars is ongoing, the revised mission statement is ready for your formal consideration.


The current mission statement of the University was adopted by the Board in 1989 during a time before the system included many of the campuses, divisions, and units that we have today. For example, the system did not begin adding community colleges as members until the late 1990s. While the current statement acknowledges our land-grant mission, including important roles in education and research, we felt the statement needed additional breadth to include the system’s important public service, economic development and health care roles, along with incorporating our focus on continuous improvement through stewardship, responsiveness, and collaboration. While this statement is not meant to touch on each individual role or campus of the system, it is meant to provide overarching themes for the work we do across the state, and those themes will be further explored and defined through the strategic pillars. The proposed mission statement follows:

The University of Arkansas System is a publicly supported, multi-campus institution committed to advancing Arkansas through education, scholarship, and service. Rooted in the land-grant tradition, the UA System expands access to academic, practical, and professional opportunities, fosters intellectual growth and student success, promotes discovery and public service, and strengthens Arkansas’s economy, health, and culture. It remains focused on continuous improvement through resource stewardship, statewide responsiveness, and strategic collaboration across its campuses, divisions, and units.

I believe this statement acknowledges our heritage, the diversity of the work we do across the state, and the expectations of accountability for a 21st Century public higher education system. With your adoption of the revised mission statement, we will continue our work on the strategic pillars, which will include defining the metrics we will monitor related to those pillars in the years ahead.

I recommend approval of the revised mission statement. A resolution is attached for your consideration.

Chancellor Christy Drale, University of Arkansas at Little Rock, requests approval of the establishment of a Workforce Development Center, housed within the Office of the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost. A summary of the proposal is attached.

UA Little Rock proposes this new center to bring together existing units from Study Abroad, University Career Services, Concurrent Enrollment, and Corporate and Community Education under a unified structure to enhance collaboration, optimize resource use, and better align university efforts with state and regional workforce priorities. The center is strategically designed to support students' academic and professional development while serving as a vital partner in economic growth for Central Arkansas and beyond.

1. **NAME OF THE COLLEGE, SCHOOL, DEPARTMENT, OR UNIT IN WHICH THE CENTER WILL BE HOUSED.**

The Workforce Development Center will be housed with the Office of the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost in Academic Affairs. Units included in the Center include: Study Abroad, Concurrent Enrollment, Career Services, and Corporate and Community Education. Each of these units have existed on campus but have previously been housed in different departments. This plan centralizes workforce development and educational/career pathway units in order to maximize resources, enhance collaboration, and expand internal and external impact.

2. **NAME AND TITLE OF THE PERSON(S) PROPOSING CREATION OF THE CENTER.**

Dr. Christina Drale, Chancellor; Dr. Ann Bailey Bain, Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost; and Dr. Aaron Duvall, Executive Director of Workforce Development

3. **THE CENTER TYPE (RESEARCH, SERVICE, OR INSTRUCTIONAL) THAT IS REQUESTED.**

The Workforce Development Center is designed to be a vital resource for the university and our community partners by supporting the diverse units and initiatives housed within the Center.

The Center is a service and instructional unit that maintains a direct, student-facing role while providing services that enhance student engagement, learning, and career readiness. Beyond serving the university community, the Workforce Development Center extends its reach through Corporate and Community Education, offering a broad array of programs and services to the surrounding community. These offerings include non-credit courses that address various personal and professional development needs. Additionally, the Center delivers targeted upskilling programs such as the Leadership Academy and AI for Businesses, which are designed to meet the evolving needs of industries throughout Central Arkansas. The Center will continue to initiate ongoing interactions with community businesses and members of our Community Partners Program to frame a systematic means of expanding needed career and upskilling programs.

Study Abroad enhances the service component of UA Little Rock by preparing students to become globally minded, community-focused leaders. Through exposure to varying cultures and real-world experiences, students develop communication skills, and a deeper

understanding of several universal challenges, including global economic and workforce development issues. It also allows students to engage in meaningful projects while overseas, including global internships.

The Workforce Development Center incorporates a strong instructional component. Several units within the Center carry both instructional and advisory responsibilities that directly benefit students, providing them with essential guidance and expertise. For example, Concurrent Enrollment strengthens both the academic mission and community outreach of the university.

Instructionally, it ensures alignment between high school and college curricula and opens the door to expanded pathways, such as career and technical education offerings, to degree/credential completion. It serves the community by expanding access to higher education, reducing future college costs, and creating a clear pathway to college and career.

The placement of Career Services within the Center will ensure that UA Little Rock maximizes, coordinates, and systematically tracks the impact of cooperative education, internships, and other experiential learning opportunities. This structure further ensures all students have access to career guidance, interview preparation, and job placement resources. Additionally, the integration of services will enhance the effectiveness of internal and external career fairs, strengthen partnerships with employers, and provide sustained, high-quality career readiness programming aligned with regional workforce demands.

**4. THE UNIQUE VALUE OF THE PROGRAM TO THE UNIVERSITY, AND THE DISTINCTION TO ANY SIMILAR PROGRAMS IN ARKANSAS.**

The unique value of a Workforce Development Center to UA Little Rock lies in how it directly aligns with the university's mission to fostering quality education, promoting lifelong learning, and applying knowledge in unique ways that enhance workforce readiness and societal contributions. The Center will serve to support UA System workforce initiatives, state workforce initiatives, and university initiatives. Through events like a UA Little Rock workforce summit, the Center will help the university contribute to the economic and social advancement of the greater central Arkansas region. It will also provide students with greater access to workforce readiness programs, increasing their employability, and strengthening the university's impact.

Several distinctions set apart the Workforce Development Center at UA Little Rock. UA Little Rock's Center, embedded within an accredited research university, can offer pathways to graduate-level education and research partnerships, and grant greater access to faculty expertise and physical resources.

**5. INFORMATION ON THE DIRECTOR POSITION AND THE ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE.**

The Executive Director of Workforce Development at the University of Arkansas Little Rock is a leadership role focused on enhancing workforce development initiatives in collaboration with various university departments and community partners. This position aims to create

innovative educational programs that cater to lifelong learners and professionals seeking skill advancement, thereby increasing the university's impact on the local community and economy.

The Executive Director of Workforce Development's job responsibilities include:

- Lead the establishment of the Workforce Development Center.
- Implement workforce development programs, initiatives, and projects.
- Interface with community partners to develop programming that meets their needs.
- Collaborate with colleges, departments, and schools to create career pathways and workforce readiness programs.
- Engage university stakeholders and industry leaders to assess workforce needs.
- Co-create relevant curricula and develop partnerships for internships, co-op programs, and apprenticeships.
- Coordinate with the university's communications department to develop a marketing plan for workforce development initiatives.
- Design and implement workforce pathway programs, including credit and non-credit micro-credentials and upskilling opportunities.
- Work closely with local businesses, K-12 institutions, community colleges, and apprenticeship programs to establish clear career pathways.
- Ensure workforce programs align with federal and state legislation and regulations.
- Collaborate with the Vice Chancellor for University Affairs to develop relationships with government officials connected to workforce development.
- Manage the center's budget to ensure financial viability of programs and sound fiscal management.
- Assess program effectiveness through tracking student outcomes and make data-driven decisions to enhance initiatives.
- Assist with securing and managing external grants and contracts
- Other duties as assigned

The Executive Director of Workforce Development will report to the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost. The Executive Director will be a member of the Provost Leadership Council.

**6. IDENTIFICATION OF FACULTY (OR QUALIFICATIONS OF TYPE OF FACULTY), OTHER PERSONNEL, AND ACADEMIC UNITS THAT WILL BE INVOLVED WITH THE CENTER.**

The Workforce Development Center will consist of four existing units: University Career Services, Concurrent Enrollment, Study Abroad, and Corporate and Community Education. Each unit and all personnel within those departments, including supporting staff will be considered part of the Workforce Development Center. The Center will have an administrative analyst position and a finance manager position to support the Center and all units within the Center. The only new position within the Center is the finance manager position.

7. **STUDENT INVOLVEMENT, IF ANY.**

The Workforce Development Center is dedicated to supporting both university-enrolled students through credit-bearing courses and non-university students through non-credit offerings. The Center will unify outreach and support students both internally and externally. Each of the units within the Center may employ graduate assistants and, occasionally, work-study students. Additionally, students may serve as ambassadors for both the individual departments and the Center as a whole.

8. **ANNUAL BUDGET FOR THE UNIT OR THE ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES PER YEAR.**

Each of the units housed in the Workforce Development Center already exist on the UA Little Rock campus and have established budgets and position lines that will remain in place. UA Little Rock plans to hire a dedicated financial manager for the Center with reallocated E and G dollars (base salary: \$53,000 plus fringe). These are the only new funds allocated in the establishment of the Center. The salary for this position is included in the General Salary line below.

This summary reflects E and G dollars and excludes designated funds and foundation accounts linked to specific units. Both Corporate and Community Education and Concurrent Enrollment have yearly income and expenditures that vary based on course offerings, enrollment, and course faculty salaries.

Salaries represent the largest expenditure in both categories. The general budget allocates \$557,000 toward salaries. Fringe benefits follow a similar pattern, with the general budget dedicating \$139,250.

For supplies and services, the general budget allocates \$163,308.

In total, the general budget amounts to \$859,558.

**9. ESTIMATED FISCAL RESOURCES AND POTENTIAL SOURCES OF FUNDING (E.G., STATE, PRIVATE, ENDOWMENT, GRANT, CONTRACT, OR OTHER).**

As the Workforce Development Center begins implementation, its primary source of funding will come from a UA Little Rock supplies and services fund established by the Office of the Provost. The salary for the Director of Career Services is funded with private dollars. The existing supplies and services budgets of each unit within the Center will be consolidated into the Center's overall budget.

Each unit also maintains designated accounts with earned income, which will be used to support and expand the Center's impact on students and the broader community.

Grant funding as well as unit annual revenue will play a pivotal role in the Center's growth. UA Little Rock has established infrastructure to monitor availability of federal and state grant opportunities. The infrastructure enables support for the development and submission of quality grant proposals as well as systematically reporting on funded grants.

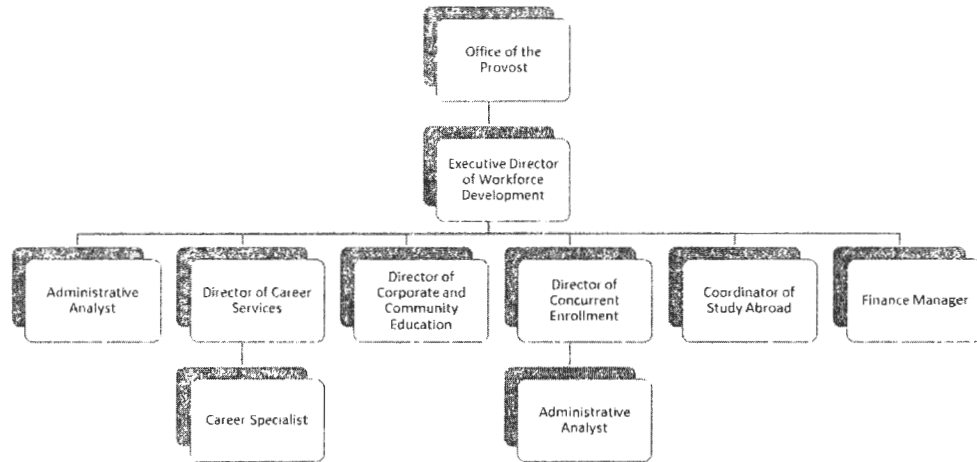
Examples of potential future funding opportunities include the Office of Skills Development (OSD). OSD offers workforce grants to help educational institutions and industries enhance employee training, close skill gaps, and boost statewide economic competitiveness. Funding is typically available for customized training programs, apprenticeships, and industry-recognized certifications, all of which are offered through Corporate and Community Education. Several other organizations and state or federal agencies also provide competitive grants for workforce development. Potential funding sources include CareSource and the National Science Foundation, which could support initiatives led by the Workforce Development Center.

Another promising source of funding is private philanthropy. University Career Services has already received a donation from the Taylor Foundation to expand paid internships across the university. Additional private gifts and/or endowments will be actively pursued to further support and grow these efforts.

**10. SPACE AND EQUIPMENT NEEDS OF THE CENTER AND A DESCRIPTION OF HOW THEY WILL BE MET.**

The Center will be located in existing equipped space on the fourth floor of the Reynolds Building. Nine offices are available on this floor that are designated for use by Center staff. The Career Closet, located on the first floor of the Reynolds Building, includes two additional offices that will be used by graduate assistants. The designated space also includes a classroom and conference room. Additional space for workforce training is available within the Reynolds building and within the UALR Downtown space. An additional conference room on the fourth floor (operated by MidSouth) can be reserved by the Center as needed.

**11. DESCRIPTION OF ADMINISTRATIVE CONTROL AND LINES OF AUTHORITY FOR THE CENTER.**



The Workforce Development Center operates under the Office of the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost. The Executive Director of the Workforce Development Center will be a direct report to the Provost and will serve as a member of the Provost Leadership team. Direct reports to the Executive Director are noted in the organizational chart. Each unit director/coordinator is responsible for managing the staffing and operations within their respective units.

**12. DESCRIPTION OF THE ADVISORY BOARD, INCLUDING ITS SIZE, THE METHOD OF ITS SELECTION, AND THE LENGTH OF TERMS.**

The Workforce Development Center Advisory Board will serve as a strategic advisory body that supports the mission and growth of the Workforce Development Center by providing community insight, industry expertise, and guidance on workforce trends and needs. The board will be composed of five community members, each serving a three-year term with the option for one consecutive reappointment. To ensure continuity, initial members may be assigned staggered terms (e.g., one-, two-, and three-year terms) during the board's inaugural year. The board will meet quarterly, with special meetings scheduled as needed.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Dear Trustees:

Acts 340 and 341 of the 95th General Assembly, more commonly known as the Arkansas ACCESS legislation, require state-supported institutions of higher education to accept the Classic Learning Test (CLT) examination to the same extent the institutions accept the ACT and the SAT tests. The legislation specifically applies to student admissions, and changes to admissions standards for the campuses of the University of Arkansas System must be approved by the Board of Trustees. As such, below is a proposed resolution authorizing the campuses of the UA System to take the necessary action to implement the CLT as an accepted examination for student admissions.

WHEREAS, Acts 340 and 341 of the 95th General Assembly, known as the Arkansas ACCESS Acts, require state supported institutions of higher education to accept the Classic Learning Test (CLT) to the same degree they accept the ACT and SAT tests; and

WHEREAS, the legislation specifically applies to admissions criteria and final approval for admissions criteria rests with the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT all colleges and universities in the University of Arkansas System are hereby authorized to take the necessary steps to include the Classic Learning Test in institutional admission criteria as required by Acts 340 and 341.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT further Board approval of individual campus actions related to the CLT is not required.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the President is hereby authorized to submit this proposal to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education for appropriate action.



- Master of Science in Dietetics – Program to be offered at UAMS Northwest regional campus in Fayetteville *to address rising health care workforce needs in that fast-growing region of the state. The UAMS Northwest cohort will add five students to the program. In addition, it will allow undergraduate students at the University of Arkansas the option to complete their supervised practice rotations for the master's degree program in Northwest Arkansas. This change will be effective in the summer 2026 term.*

The new track in Guidance and Counseling incorporates coursework from related disciplines to provide graduates with a greater breadth of training in a rapidly evolving field, while the Generalist track will continue to prepare students for a variety of careers or further education in the field. There are no new courses; no new resources required, and the number of hours does not change.}*
- C. Title Change
- Change name of the General Agriculture option in the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture to Agriculture Sciences. *{The name "Agriculture Sciences" will better describe the diversity of agriculture disciplines covered in this degree plan.}*
- D. Delete Program/Option/Emphasis/Track

3. University of Arkansas at Fort Smith
- A. New Certificate Program (CP, TC or GC made primarily of existing coursework)
- Graduate Certificate in Healthcare Administration –*12-hour Graduate Certificate that helps students stay up-to-date professionally, showcases early academic achievements while upholding academic standards, and demonstrates to employers and others that one has expanded their healthcare administration skill set. No new courses; no new faculty or resources.*

This partnership will benefit incumbent workers (students), business and industry, and will address a critical need for nurses in rural Arkansas. The proposed partnership will require no new faculty or additional resources.

B. Curriculum Revision of Program/Option/Emphasis/Concentration/Minor

- Associate of Science Education K-6 – *Modify the degree hours from 60 to a range of 60-63 hours.*

C. New Certificate Program (CP, TC or GC made primarily of existing coursework)

- Certificate of Proficiency – Industrial Systems Technology: *Add a certificate to allow students to focus on industrial electrical and mechanical system maintenance. All courses are part of the Technical Certificate curriculum and would be stackable credentials. No new faculty or resources.*
- Certificate of Proficiency in Phlebotomy Technician - *adding existing courses to create a for-credit Certificate of Proficiency. Students will acquire knowledge in basic phlebotomy technician skills, while receiving hands-on experience in a variety of healthcare settings where phlebotomy technicians are utilized. No new faculty or resources are required.*

5. University of Arkansas – Pulaski Technical College

A. New Off-Campus Instruction Center

- **Bentonville West High School, Centerton, AR** - UA-PTC seeks to offer Certificates of Proficiency in Basic Food Preparation (DC 4581) and Basic Pastry Techniques (DC 1585) in partnership with Bentonville West High School, 1351 Gamble Road, Centerton, AR 72719, at the high school location effective fall 2025. Bentonville West High School contacted UA-PTC to partner and offer these credentials to their students. BWHS has agreed to provide qualified instructors, facilities, and equipment to teach their students using the UA-PTC curriculum. UA-PTC agrees to provide appropriate oversight and ownership of its curriculum to ensure consistency and quality at this location.

Chancellor Charles Robinson at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, is requesting approval to sell five acres of undeveloped property located in eastern Washington County, Arkansas.

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, received this property as a gift from Dr. Jack H. Cole in memory of his wife, Carol Sue Cole. Pursuant to the associated gift agreement, the real estate, comprised of five acres in the Northwest part of Goshen, near the White River, was for use for research and educational purposes relating to the environment, conservation, hydrology, and water quality, with specific research and programs to be directed by a former faculty member. At such time that the faculty member (now retired) was no longer employed by the University, the Chair of the Department of Geosciences was charged with directing such research and programs. The gift agreement further provided that, if the Board of Trustees were to determine that it was impractical to use the property as described, then the Board was authorized to sell the property, with the proceeds to be used to create an endowment benefiting the Fayetteville campus, in the names of Jack and Carol Sue Cole, to support research and education in the areas of the environment, conservation, hydrology, and water quality.

On September 12, 2024, the Board approved a resolution determining that it was impractical to use the property for research and education purposes, and that the property should be sold, with the proceeds to establish an endowed research and education fund to benefit the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, in the names of Jack and Carol Sue Cole. Further, the Board approved a resolution authorizing the University of Arkansas to offer said property for sale, with the proceeds to be used to establish The Dr. Jack H. Cole and Carol Sue Cole Endowed Fund for Research and Education in the Environment, Conservation, Hydrology, and Water Quality, with spendable income to be administered by the Chair of the Department of Geosciences, subject to the approval of the Dean of the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences.

Maps showing the location of the property are attached to this letter. The University marketed the property through Colliers Arkansas, Inc. J. David Ewing made an offer in the



## CAPITAL PROJECT PROPOSAL FORM

### 1. PROPOSED FUNCTION OF PROJECT

This project will add around 110,000 square feet of new space on the last remaining site available for development within the Walton College precinct. Two recent studies have informed the program of the new building. The first is the Walton College Study, started in late 2022, which documented existing conditions of the college's buildings, analyzed programmatic relationships among departments, and surveyed faculty, staff, and student perceptions of the college's spaces. The second is the Campus Space Use Study, started in late 2023, which documented and analyzed all academic space across campus, projected future needs, and recommended new space management strategies. The campuswide study showed a deficit in academic, research, and student-focused space with even minimal growth in overall enrollment, while the college-focused study showed a distinct need for right-sized classrooms and collaborative space within the college. It noted, for example, that in the 2024-25 academic year, over 400 business classes were not taught in Walton College buildings due to the mismatch of existing rooms and class section sizes.

In response to the studies, the primary goal for the new building is to increase the number of large classrooms available for Walton College use, which will in turn free up classroom space across campus. An initial building test fit confirmed that a five-story building at 110,000 square feet could house 17 new classrooms with capacities of 70 seats and up. These new classrooms will help free instructional spaces throughout the rest of campus for other academic units and concentrate the college's activity within its own precinct. Along with classrooms, the new building will create a student hub for study, collaboration, and innovation. Survey responses have shown that Walton College students currently feel they have no on-campus "home" and tend to leave campus outside of class time. The hub will provide a lively environment that encourages students to stay and interact with their peers and faculty throughout the day. The McMillion Innovation Studio, which is currently located across the street in a small storefront space, will be moved and co-located with the student hub to engage more students with the Studio's culture of innovation. The test fit envisioned both of these active spaces on the ground floor, opening up to the surrounding campus landscape, and creating a welcoming presence for students, faculty, and visitors.

### 2. PROPOSED FACILITY LOCATION AND DESCRIPTION

The site is located southeast of Willard Walker Hall, facing Harmon Avenue.

### **6. PARKING PLAN TO SUPPORT NEW OR EXPANDED FACILITY**

In August 2023, the university hired a consultant team to study how parking can be more effectively managed throughout campus and where additional parking is most needed, in concert with upgrades to transit operations and other modes of transportation. Work is currently underway to implement those recommendations. Harmon Avenue Garage will continue to provide parking for faculty, staff, and students in the area, directly across the street from the new building.

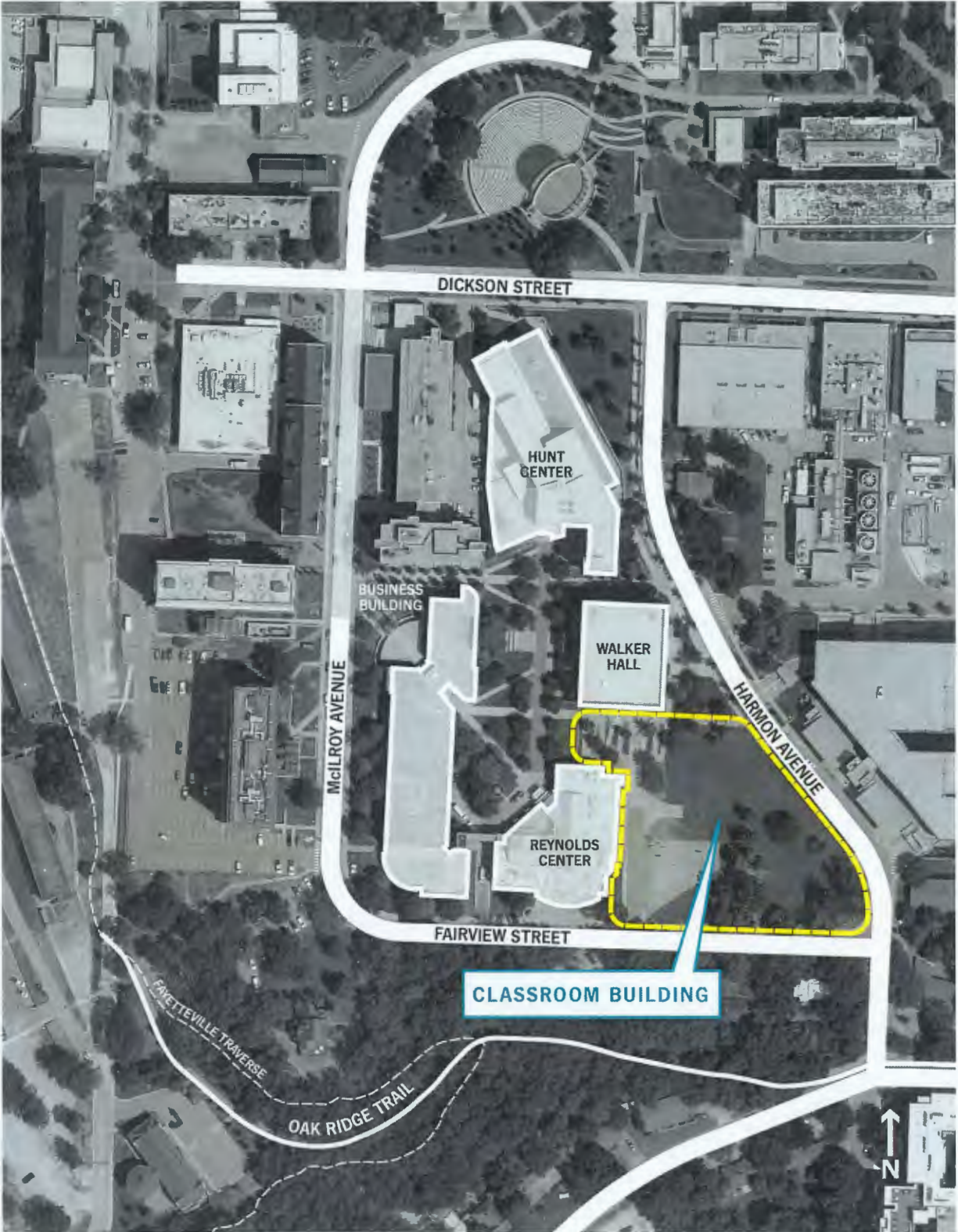

### **8. SOURCE OF PROJECT FUNDS**

The project will be funded from university reserves, private gifts, and general obligation bonds supported by the Student Facility Fee revenue.

The financing plans call for a future bond issue not to exceed \$70 million, amortized over a 30-year period at a true-interest cost estimated not to exceed 5%. Annual debt service is estimated to be no greater than \$4.4 million funded by student facility fee revenues.

Chancellor Terisa Riley, University of Arkansas at Fort Smith, is requesting authority to demolish the 51<sup>st</sup> Annex facility, located at 425 N 51<sup>st</sup> Street, Fort Smith, Arkansas.

The 51<sup>st</sup> Annex is a former nursing home that was acquired in October 2007 for the purpose of serving as additional office space for UAFS faculty and staff. Built in the 1960's and added onto in the 1980's, the 51<sup>st</sup> Annex is approximately 16,339 square feet of space. The building has suffered from water damage, infestation, and deterioration over the past decade. Due to its condition, the building is empty and has been unoccupied for almost two years. In 2018, the UAFS Facilities Audit Program (FAP) report estimated the cost of deferred maintenance for the building of almost \$1.2 million. Therefore, remodeling the building is not economically feasible. Further, it is no longer practical to bear the expense of maintaining the property for which over \$27,000 is spent annually on gas and electric. It will cost approximately \$288,000 to demolish the building.

I concur with Dr. Riley's recommendation. A proposed resolution for your consideration follows.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith is hereby authorized to demolish the 51<sup>st</sup> Annex facility which currently exists on the campus of the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith.

Dear Trustees:

Vice President for Agriculture Deacue Fields has requested approval of the Division of Agriculture's strategic plan, *Growing Stronger*, to set the Division's course for the next decade. A summary of the plan is attached.

Work on the plan began in early 2023, as Assistant Vice President Stacey McCullough and her Community Professional and Economic Development Department faculty began surveying the people served by the Division. In February 2024, about five dozen employees from all over the Division of Agriculture gathered at the Winthrop Rockefeller Institute to take the strategic plan project to its next phase. These employees — a cross-section of the organization including support staff, faculty, county staff and administration — had the hard work of distilling the hundreds of responses gathered during the surveys and listening sessions. These employees were divided into five groups that embraced the breadth of what UADA does. The following topics/challenges emerged:

- Helping Communities Thrive;
- Advancing Innovation;
- Preparing the Workforce;
- Enhancing Resilience and Sustainability;
- Supporting a Healthier Arkansas; and
- Achieving Excellence.

The groups began with a SWOT analysis, looking at all the data and seeing the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. From there, they were tasked to create two sets of objectives: internal and external. With the objectives set, the final phase of plan development was implemented: establishing metrics to measure successes or to work to recalibrate.

Pending your approval, the Division plans to officially release the strategic plan this fall and immediately begin work on the goals and objectives identified.

I concur with Dr. Fields recommendation. A proposed resolution for your consideration follows.





ARTICLES OF LOCAL CAMPUS GOVERNMENT FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS,  
FAYETTEVILLE (Effective \_\_\_\_\_, 2025)

PREAMBLE

IN ADOPTING THIS POLICY FOR ARTICLES OF LOCAL CAMPUS GOVERNMENT FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS, FAYETTEVILLE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, ON ITS OWN MOTION, MAY AT ANY TIME REVIEW, AMEND, REVISE, OVERRULE OR AFFIRM ANY MATTER, POLICY, RESOLUTION OR LEGISLATION THAT MAY BE ADOPTED BY ANY GROUP REFERRED TO HEREINAFTER. THESE ARTICLES ARE ADOPTED PURSUANT TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES POLICY 100.4.III.5.

ARTICLE I - THE FACULTY

A. Authority

1. The faculty, acting under the Board of Trustees and through the Faculty Senate, shall be authorized to develop and recommend educational and academic policies and programs. Such matters shall include, but not be limited to:
  - a. admission requirements; transfer of credits; withdrawals; academic integrity; academic probation, suspension, and dismissal;
  - b. curriculum and courses;
  - c. degrees and requirements for degrees;
  - d. University academic calendars;
  - e. awarding of academic honors; and
  - f. recommendations to the Chancellor of the names of individuals to receive honorary degrees.
  
2. The faculty, acting through the Faculty Senate, may also make recommendations on any institutional matter of faculty concern. Such matters shall include, but not be limited to:
  - a. policies regarding faculty status, including appointments, promotions, granting of tenure, annual review, retirement, non-reappointment, and dismissal of faculty;
  - b. policies affecting the general welfare, working conditions, and the services performed by and for the faculty;
  - c. policies relating to academic and professional research and other scholarly and creative activities; and
  - d. disciplinary policies for graduate and undergraduate students.

## ARTICLE II - THE FACULTY SENATE

### A. Authority

1. The Faculty Senate shall exercise general legislative authority for the faculty and shall be the sole campus representative governance body authorized to develop and recommend educational and academic policies and programs. The Faculty Senate may also make recommendations on any institutional matters impacting faculty consistent with Article I, Section A.
2. The Faculty Senate shall report to the Campus Council for informational and advisory purposes all legislation which it passes.
3. Recommendations adopted through the Faculty Senate shall be transmitted to the Chancellor, with a specific request for the Chancellor's review and favorable action. If the Chancellor declines to act favorably upon such a recommendation within two weeks of receiving it, the Faculty Senate, upon a majority vote, may refer the action to the Campus Council for review. The Campus Council, upon a three-fifths vote, may request that the President consider the matter.
4. If a resolution is not achieved on the recommendation within 30 days after referral to the President, the President may submit the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration.
5. The Faculty Senate shall have authority to pass legislation expressing its approval or disapproval of any recommendation of the faculty of any college or school or of any other group of the faculty on educational and academic policies and programs or other recommendations on any institutional matters impacting faculty. Further, any favorable recommendation of the Faculty Senate shall be referred to the Chancellor consistent with this policy, with any negative recommendation of the Faculty Senate with rationale be reported back to the proposer.

### B. Membership

1. Each member of the Faculty Senate shall be a member of the faculty who is eligible to vote for members of the Faculty Senate. The following members of the faculty shall be eligible to vote for the Faculty Senate Chair, Faculty Senate Vice-Chair, and members of the Faculty Senate:
  - (1) tenured or tenure-track faculty who hold a half-time or greater appointment;
  - (2) non-tenure track faculty who hold a half-time or greater appointment.
2. The voting membership of the Faculty Senate shall consist of the Chair, the Vice Chair, and representatives elected pursuant to paragraphs 4-7 below.

3. The Chancellor, the Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the dean of each undergraduate academic college or school as well as the deans of the School of Law, the Graduate School and International Education, Students, Admissions, Honors College, University Libraries, and the Senior Associate Athletic Director, shall be non-voting members of the Faculty Senate. This provision does not preclude any dean from election as a voting representative pursuant to paragraphs 4-7 below.
4. The members of each separate faculty (identified in Article III, Section A.1) who are eligible to vote, shall elect for staggered two-year terms one Faculty Senate representative for each 25 such members of that separate faculty, except that each separate faculty shall be entitled to at least one representative. Each separate faculty shall establish its own procedures for the election of these representatives.
5. During each spring semester, the Faculty Secretary shall determine and report (a) the total number of members of each separate faculty who are eligible to vote for Faculty Senate representatives, and (b) on the basis of one representative for each 25 of such faculty, the number of Faculty Senate representatives allocated to each separate faculty. For this purpose, no person shall be counted as belonging to more than one separate faculty; should any person's separate faculty be unclear, that person's majority academic appointment shall determine the separate faculty in which they should be counted.
6. Twelve campus-wide representatives shall be elected to the Faculty Senate for staggered two-year terms.
7. The Faculty Senate shall adopt rules for the election of campus-wide representatives consistent with this policy. These rules shall provide for election by faculty eligible to vote as described in Article I, Section A.5 above.

#### C. Officers and Duties

1. The officers of the Faculty Senate shall be the Faculty Senate Chair, Faculty Senate Vice Chair, immediate past/outgoing Faculty Senate Chair, Faculty Senate Chair-Elect, Faculty Senate Vice Chair-Elect, Parliamentarian, and Secretary.
2. The term of each officer shall begin July 1.
3. Pursuant to rules adopted by the Faculty Senate, each spring the faculty shall elect a Faculty Senate Chair-Elect and Faculty Senate Vice Chair-Elect who will serve a three-year term beginning the following July 1. Upon completion of the first year of the term, the Faculty Senate Chair-Elect and Faculty Senate Vice Chair-Elect shall become the Faculty Senate Chair and Faculty Senate Vice Chair. Upon completion of the second year of the term, the Faculty Senate Chair and Vice Chair shall become the immediate past/outgoing Faculty Senate Chair and Vice Chair and serve for the final year.

4. Should the Chair of the Faculty Senate be unable to complete the term of office, the Vice Chair shall become, for the unexpired term, Chair of the Faculty Senate. Should the Chair-Elect of Faculty Senate be unable to complete the term of office, the Vice Chair-Elect shall become, for the unexpired term, the Chair-Elect of the Faculty Senate. Vacancies in the Vice-Chair and Vice Chair Elect may be filled pursuant to rules adopted by the Faculty Senate.
5. The Parliamentarian and Secretary shall be appointed by the Faculty Senate Chair and will have voting privileges only if they are elected to the Faculty Senate.
6. The duties of the officers of the Faculty Senate shall be those normally associated with their respective offices. Specific duties may be established pursuant to rules adopted by the Faculty Senate.

#### D. Meetings

1. The Faculty Senate shall meet at least three times each semester, and at such additional times at the discretion of the Chair of the Faculty Senate.
2. A meeting notice and tentative agenda shall be distributed by the Secretary to all members of the faculty at least five days in advance of each regular or special meeting of the Faculty Senate.
3. Meetings of the Faculty Senate shall be open to all faculty members, though the Faculty Senate may adopt rules limiting floor privileges to speak at meetings.
4. A majority of the members of the Faculty Senate shall constitute a quorum at any meeting. An action of the Faculty Senate shall require a simple majority vote of those present and voting, a quorum being present.
5. Agenda and minutes of each regular and special meeting of the Faculty Senate shall be promptly posted to the public Faculty Senate website as the official record.

#### E. Committees

1. The Faculty Senate may establish appropriate standing and ad hoc committees and shall adopt rules for the appointment of faculty members to such committees. Student, staff, and administration representatives shall serve on such committees as the Faculty Senate deems appropriate and shall be appointed pursuant to the rules of each constituency provided that at least one student shall serve on each committee except the Committee on Appointment, Promotion, and Tenure.

2. There shall be a standing Committee on Appointment, Promotion, and Tenure, elected by the faculty, consisting of twelve members of the faculty. Pursuant to rules adopted by the Faculty Senate, four members shall be elected each year for terms of three years each, such terms to begin on July 1. Should a committee member be unable to complete the first 30 months of the three-year term, the Chair of the Faculty Senate shall supervise a special election to fill the vacancy. The Committee on Appointment, Promotion, and Tenure shall elect its own chair and vice-chair from its membership.
  - a. The Appointment, Promotion, and Tenure Committee may, on its own initiative, make recommendations regarding faculty status to appropriate officers and bodies.
  - b. Whenever any question concerning faculty status is referred to the Appointment, Promotion, and Tenure Committee, including a question concerning a specific faculty member's tenure, promotion, appointment, dismissal, retirement, and the like, the committee shall make a recommendation on such question consistent with other University policies.

#### F. Procedures for Amendment of Articles I, II and III

1. Proposed amendments of Articles I, II, and III may be presented to the Faculty Senate at any regular or special meeting. Any such proposal may be amended at that same meeting by majority vote of those present and voting, a quorum being present.
2. A recommendation to amend these Articles shall not be voted upon at the same Faculty Senate meeting at which the proposed amendment was presented. If such proposal is amended by the Faculty Senate, the amended proposal shall not be voted upon at the same meeting at which such proposal was amended.
3. A recommendation to amend these Articles, if approved by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting at a regular or special meeting of the Faculty Senate, a quorum being present, such recommendation shall be promptly forwarded to the Chancellor for review and approval. Once approved, the Chancellor shall transmit the proposed amended Articles to the President for review, approval, and transmission to the Board of Trustees. Upon review and approval by the Board of Trustees, the amended Articles shall be adopted and shall supersede the existing structure.
4. An amendment of these Articles shall be effective from the time of its adoption by the Board of Trustees, or at a future time specifically set by the Board of Trustees.

## ARTICLE III - COLLEGE, SCHOOL, AND AT-LARGE FACULTIES

### A. Separate Faculties

1. The separate faculties shall be those of the: Dale Bumpers College of Agricultural, Food, and Life Sciences; College of Engineering; School of Law; Fay Jones School of Architecture and Design; J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences; College of Education and Health Professions; Sam M. Walton College of Business; and University Libraries.
2. Each separate faculty shall be composed of those members of the faculty eligible to vote per Article II, Section B.1 above.
3. For purposes of voting on at-large faculty representatives, the faculty shall be composed of those members of the faculty eligible to vote per Article II, Section B.1 above.
4. For purposes of Section B below, the Graduate School Faculty shall consist of the voting membership of the separate faculties who are authorized to serve on a graduate thesis or dissertation committee or to teach graduate courses and who are regularly involved in such graduate level activities, and such other persons as the Graduate School Faculty may elect.

### B. Authority

1. Each separate faculty or the Graduate School Faculty may pass legislation making recommendations on its own academic affairs, such as the matters described in Article I Section A1 above. Such legislation shall be promptly referred to the Faculty Senate for review, unless other university policies apply. Any recommendation receiving concurrence from the Faculty Senate may be advanced consistent with this policy, with any recommendation not supported by the Faculty Senate reported back to the proposing faculty with rationale.
2. Each separate faculty, as well as the Graduate School Faculty, shall adopt its own rules of procedure provided that they are not in conflict with policies of the Faculty Senate or other applicable University policies.

## ARTICLE IV - THE STAFF

### A. Authority

1. The staff, acting through the Staff Senate, shall have responsibility to make recommendations relating to the quality of the work life of the staff, the efficiency of the University's operations, and the staff's service to the campus community.

2. The staff, acting through the Staff Senate, may make recommendations on any matter of staff concern. Such matters shall include, but not be limited to:
  - a. fringe benefits;
  - b. University calendars and schedules;
  - c. compensation;
  - d. work schedules and working conditions;
  - e. hiring and dismissal procedures;
  - f. staff and administration evaluation;
  - g. grievance procedures;
  - h. environment and safety;
  - i. physical facilities; and
  - j. health and wellness.

#### B. Membership

1. In these Articles, "staff" shall mean all UA, Fayetteville employees eligible for fringe benefits who do not hold a faculty appointment of at least half-time or greater.

#### C. Officers

1. The officers of the staff shall be the officers of the Staff Senate.

#### D. Meetings

1. Meetings of the Staff Senate shall be open to all members of the staff, and they shall have an opportunity to be heard as provided in by-laws adopted by the Staff Senate.

#### E. Committees

1. The Staff Senate shall establish appropriate standing committees of the staff and shall adopt rules for the appointment of members to such committees.

### ARTICLE V - THE STAFF SENATE

#### A. Authority

1. The Staff Senate shall exercise general legislative authority for the staff and shall be responsible for making recommendations relating to the quality of the work life of the staff, the efficiency of the University's operations, and the staff's service to the campus community.

2. The Staff Senate shall select, in conjunction with the Associate Vice Chancellor of Human Resources, the Staff Employee of the Quarter and the Staff Employee of the Year.
3. The Staff Senate will report to the Campus Council for informational and advisory purposes all legislation which it passes. Any legislation addressing matters of concern beyond staff shall be referred to the Campus Council for final action.
4. The Staff Senate shall elect the staff members of the Campus Council as specified in Article VI, Section B.1.c.
5. The Staff Senate shall act as the official liaison for staff with the administration, faculty, and students. The Staff Senate may review items of interest or concern brought to it by staff, administrators, faculty, and students.
6. Except for matters referred to Campus Council, recommendations adopted through the Staff Senate shall be transmitted to the Chancellor with a specific request for the Chancellor's review and favorable action. If the Chancellor declines to act favorably upon such a recommendation within two weeks of receiving it, the Staff Senate, upon a majority vote, may refer the action to the Campus Council for review. The Campus Council, upon a three-fifths vote, may request that the President consider the matter.
7. If a resolution is not achieved on the recommendation within 30 days after the referral to the President, the President may submit the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration.
8. The Staff Senate may recommend amendments to Article V by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting at a regular or special meeting, a quorum being present. Any proposed amendment shall be furnished to the Staff Senate Chair and made available for review by Staff Senate Membership at least seven days prior to the meeting. Any recommendation to amend these Articles shall not be voted upon at the same Staff Senate meeting at which the proposed amendment was presented. If such a proposal is amended by the Staff Senate, the amended proposal shall not be voted upon at the same meeting at which such proposal was amended. Once approved by Staff Senate, a recommended amendment shall be promptly forwarded to the Chancellor for review and approval. Once approved, the Chancellor shall transmit the proposed amended Articles to the President for review, approval, and transmission to the Board of Trustees. Upon review and approval by the Board of Trustees, the amended Article shall be adopted and shall supersede the existing structure provided, however, that such amendment may not alter those subject matter areas within the purview of other governance bodies nor the procedures outlined in paragraph 3 above.

## B. Membership

1. Each member of the Staff Senate shall be a member of the staff (as defined in Article IV, Section B).

2. The voting membership of the Staff Senate shall consist of the Chair, the Vice Chair, and such others as provided in by-laws adopted by the Staff Senate.
3. The Associate Vice Chancellor for Human Resources shall be a non-voting member of the Staff Senate.

#### C. Officers and Duties

1. The officers of the Staff Senate shall be the Chair, the Vice Chair, and such others as provided in the by-laws adopted by the Staff Senate. Each shall be elected as provided in by-laws adopted by the Staff Senate.
2. The duties of the officers of the Staff Senate shall be those normally associated with their respective offices. Specific duties may be established pursuant to the by-laws of Staff Senate.
3. Should the Chair of the Staff Senate be unable to complete the term of office, the Vice Chair of the Staff Senate shall become, for the unexpired term, Chair of the Staff Senate.
4. Should the office of the Vice Chair of the Staff Senate become vacant during the term of office, the Chair of the Staff Senate shall call a special meeting of the Staff Senate to elect a new Vice Chair for the unexpired term. Nominations shall be made from the floor, and all nominees shall be current members of the Staff Senate.
5. The Associate Vice Chancellor for Administration and Human Resources shall appoint an individual from their office to serve as Recording Secretary and to provide clerical assistance to the Staff Senate and its officers.

#### D. Meetings

1. Regular meetings of the Staff Senate shall be held monthly, during regular office hours, and as provided in by-laws adopted by the Staff Senate.
2. Special meetings of the Staff Senate may be called by the Chair, by a majority of the members of the Staff Senate, or otherwise as provided in by-laws adopted by the Staff Senate.
3. A majority of the members of the Staff Senate shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.
4. Agendas and minutes of each regular and special meeting of the Staff Senate shall be promptly posted to the Staff Senate website, which will be the official record.

## E. Committees

1. The Staff Senate shall utilize the standing committees of the staff as provided in the Staff Senate by-laws.
2. The Staff Senate may establish appropriate ad hoc committees.
3. The Staff Senate may recommend appointment of staff to University committees.

## ARTICLE VI - THE CAMPUS COUNCIL

### A. Authority

1. The Campus Council shall exercise general legislative authority for matters of shared interest among faculty, staff, and students, not within a subject matter area reserved for other campus governing bodies. The Campus Council may also make recommendations on any institutional matter impacting the University of Arkansas consistent with Article I, Section A.
2. All legislation initiated by other campus governing bodies shall be reported to the Campus Council for informational and advisory purposes. If the legislation is not within the sole subject matter area of those bodies, it will require final action by the Campus Council for approval.
3. The Campus Council may make recommendations to the Chancellor on any matter within the purview of the Campus Council, including legislation reporting other campus governance bodies with a specific request for the Chancellor's review and favorable action. If the Chancellor declines to act favorably upon such a recommendation within two weeks of receiving it, the Campus Council upon a three-fifths vote, may request that the President consider the matter.
4. If a resolution is not achieved on the recommendation within 30 days after referral to the President, the President may submit the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration.

### B. Membership

1. The voting membership of the Campus Council shall consist of those specified in paragraphs a-c below.
  - a. The Chair and Vice Chair of the following campus governing bodies:
    - i. Faculty Senate
    - ii. Staff Senate

- iii. Associated Student Government
  - iv. Graduate-Professional Student Congress
- b. 12 additional representatives from each governing body specified in the paragraph above shall be elected for one-year terms by their respective governing body pursuant to their rules.
  - c. The voting administration representatives shall include: dean of each undergraduate academic college or school, the deans of the Law School, the Graduate School and International Education, the dean of Admissions, dean of Students, dean of the Honors College, and the dean of the University Libraries.
  - d. The non-voting administration representatives shall include:
    - i. The Chancellor
    - ii. All Vice Chancellors
- 2. Should a faculty, student, or staff representative be unable to complete the term of office, the governing body which elected that person shall elect a replacement member to serve for the unexpired term.

#### C. Officers and Duties

- 1. The Campus Council shall elect a Chair and Vice Chair from its members each spring. The term of the new officers will begin each July 1, for a one-year term ending the following June 30.
- 2. Should the Chair of the Campus Council be unable to complete the term of office, the Vice Chair shall become, for the unexpired term, Chair of the Campus Council.
- 3. The Secretary of the Campus Council shall be appointed by the Chair of the Campus Council, but with voting privileges only if entitled thereto by virtue of election to the Campus Council.
- 4. The duties of the officers of the Campus Council shall be those normally associated with their respective offices. Specific duties may be established pursuant to rules adopted by the Campus Council.

#### D. Meetings

- 1. The Campus Council shall meet at least once each semester, and at such additional times as the Chair of the Campus Council deems appropriate or upon call of the Chancellor.
- 2. A meeting notice and tentative agenda shall be distributed to the membership of the Campus Council at least five days in advance of each regular or special meeting.

3. A majority of the voting members of the Campus Council shall constitute a quorum at any meeting. An action of the Campus Council shall require a simple majority vote of those present and voting, a quorum being present.
4. Agenda and minutes of each regular and special meeting of the Campus Council shall be promptly posted by the Secretary on the public Campus Council website, which will be the official record.

#### E. Committees

1. The standing Executive Committee shall consist of ten members. Membership includes the Chair and Vice-Chair of Campus Council. The remaining members will be elected by the Campus Council and shall consist of two from each governing body that composes the Campus Council. The term of appointment shall be for one year. Members can be re-appointed.
  - a. Any person represented by the Campus Council may propose to the Executive Committee, pursuant to the rules of the Campus Council with appropriate accompanying rationale:
    - i. Motions
    - ii. Reports
    - iii. Discussion Items
    - iv. Other business to be placed before the Council
  - b. The Executive Committee shall review each proposal submitted under the provisions of paragraph a above and may recommend that the proposal be changed or withdrawn by the initiator(s) thereof, who may accept or reject any such recommendation.
  - c. The Executive Committee shall review all legislation reported by the Faculty Senate, Staff Senate, Associated Student Government Senate, or Graduate-Professional Student Congress. If final action is required by the Campus Council, the Committee shall include such items as an agenda item for the next meeting of the Campus Council. If legislation reported by a legislative body appears to the Executive Committee to be legislation which rests within the subject matter area of a legislative body other than the one from which it was reported, it shall be promptly referred to the appropriate legislative body and shall be considered enacted only if approved by such legislative body.
  - d. The Executive Committee shall prepare, for each meeting of the Campus Council, a tentative agenda.

- e. The agenda prepared by the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Campus Council for distribution.
2. The Campus Council may utilize the standing committees of the faculty, students, staff, and administration as the Campus Council and governing body responsible for the committee(s) deem appropriate.
3. The Campus Council may establish appropriate standing and *ad hoc* committees and shall adopt rules for the appointment of members to such committees. Provision shall be made for faculty, students, staff, and administration representatives on such committees unless the Campus Council deems such provision clearly inappropriate.

#### F. Amendments to Article VI

1. The Campus Council may recommend amendments to Article VI by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting at a regular or special meeting of the Campus Council, a quorum being present, such recommendation shall be promptly forwarded to the Chancellor for review and approval. Once approved, the Chancellor shall transmit the proposed amended Article to the President for review, approval, and transmission to the Board of Trustees. Upon review and approval by the Board of Trustees, the amended Article shall be adopted and shall supersede the existing structure, provided, however, that such amendment may not alter those subject matter areas reserved to the Faculty Senate, the Staff Senate, or other campus governing bodies.
2. One or more proposed amendments to Article VI may be presented to the Campus Council at any regular or special meeting. Any such proposal may be amended at that same meeting by majority vote of those present and voting, a quorum being present.
3. A recommendation to amend Article VI shall not be voted upon at the same Campus Council meeting at which the proposed amendment was presented. If such proposal is amended by the Campus Council, the amended proposal shall not be voted upon at the same meeting at which such proposal was amended.
4. An amendment of Article VI shall be effective from the time of its adoption by the Board of Trustees, or at a future time specifically set by the Board of Trustees.

PREAMBLE

-IN ADOPTING THIS POLICY FOR ARTICLES OF LOCAL CAMPUS GOVERNMENT FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS, FAYETTEVILLE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, ON ITS OWN MOTION, MAY AT ANY TIME REVIEW, AMEND, REVISE, OVERRULE OR AFFIRM ANY MATTER, POLICY, RESOLUTION OR LEGISLATION THAT MAY BE ADOPTED BY ANY GROUP REFERRED TO HEREINAFTER. THESE ARTICLES ARE ADOPTED PURSUANT TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES POLICY 100.4.III.5.

ARTICLE I - THE FACULTY

A. Authority

1. The faculty, acting under the Board of Trustees and through the Faculty Senate, shall have responsibility be authorized to develop and recommend educational for all matters of and academic policies and programs-eneera. Such matters shall include, but not be limited to:
  - a. admission requirements; transfer of credits; withdrawals; academic honesty/integrity; scholastic academic probation, suspension, and dismissal;
  - b. curriculum and courses;
  - c. degrees and requirements for degrees;
  - d. University academic calendars and schedules; and
  - e. awarding of academic honors; and-
  - f. recommendations to the Chancellor of the names of individuals to receive honorary degrees.
  
2. The faculty, acting through the Faculty Senate, may also make recommendations on any institutional matter of faculty concern. Such matters shall include, but not be limited to:
  - a. policies regarding faculty status, including appointments, promotions, granting of tenure, annual review, retirement, non-reappointment, and dismissal of faculty;
  - b. policies affecting the general welfare, working conditions, and the services performed by and for the faculty; and
  - c. policies relating to academic and professional research and other scholarly and creative activities.
  - e-d. disciplinary policies for graduate and undergraduate students.

- ~~3. The faculty may propose legislation by majority vote of those present and voting at any meeting of the faculty. Such proposed legislation shall be referred to the Faculty Senate for action.~~
- ~~4. The faculty shall have responsibility for interpretation of its own policies.~~

~~The following members of the faculty shall be eligible to vote for the Faculty Chair, the Faculty Vice Chair, and members of the Faculty Senate: those holding a half time (or greater) faculty appointment who are tenured or on the tenure track; ; and or have been declared eligible to vote by the Faculty Senate, and those in their third (or greater) consecutive year of full time appointment who are instructors or lecturers. Such faculty shall also be eligible to propose legislation and to vote at meetings of the faculty.~~

The faculty shall have responsibility for the establishment and maintenance of may make recommendations regarding of a judicial system for graduate and undergraduate students which includes a code of conduct, and any such judicial system established prior to July 1, 1996 shall remain in effect, subject to the continuing jurisdiction of the Faculty Senate;~~
- ~~2. The faculty shall have the exclusive authority to adopt may propose amendments to Articles I, II and III under the procedures outlined in Section D of this Article.~~

BC. Officers and Duties

The officers of the faculty shall be the Faculty Chair and the Faculty Vice Chair, each to be elected for a one year term pursuant to rules adopted by the Faculty Senate, and the Faculty Secretary, to be appointed by the Faculty Chair for a one year term.

The term of office of each officer shall begin July 1.

The Faculty Chair shall:

call, and preside over, meetings of the faculty;  
be the Chair elect of the Faculty Senate;  
appoint faculty members to standing committees of the faculty;  
establish *ad hoc* committees as deemed appropriate, appoint the members of such committees,  
and appoint persons or panels advisory to the Chair as deemed appropriate;  
see that the *Faculty Handbook* is updated each year and made available on line; and  
perform such other duties as the Faculty Chair deems appropriate to the office.

The Faculty Chair shall not serve consecutive terms. Should the Faculty Chair be unable to complete the term of office, the Faculty Vice Chair shall become, for the unexpired term, Faculty Chair and Chair elect of the Faculty Senate.

The Faculty Vice Chair shall:

assist with the duties of the Faculty Chair;  
be the Vice Chair elect of the Faculty Senate; and  
act for the Faculty Chair at such times as the latter may be unable to perform his or her duties.

Should the office of Faculty Vice Chair become vacant during the term of office, a new Faculty Vice Chair shall be elected for the unexpired term pursuant to rules adopted by the Faculty Senate.

The Faculty Secretary shall:

serve as Secretary of the faculty and of the Faculty Senate;  
record and distribute the minutes of each meeting of the faculty and of the Faculty Senate;  
aid the Chair in election procedures; maintain the Campus Faculty and Faculty Senate websites  
and record agendas and minutes as the official record;  
and such other matters as the Faculty Chair may deem appropriate to the office; and  
file a copy of the minutes in the office of the Vice Chancellor for Academic  
Affairs as the office of record.

C. Meetings

The Faculty Chair shall call a regular meeting of the faculty once during the fall semester and once during the spring semester. The Faculty Chair shall also call a special meeting within 15 business days of receipt of a petition for such meeting signed by 20 or more at least of eligible members of the faculty, and such other special meetings as the Faculty Chair deems appropriate.

~~2. A meeting notice and tentative agenda shall be distributed by the Secretary to all members of the faculty at least five business days in advance of each regular or special meeting.~~

~~3. One hundred voting members of the faculty shall constitute a quorum at any regular or special session. An action of the faculty under Section A.2 & A.3 shall require a simple majority vote of those present and voting.~~

~~4. Minutes of each regular and special meeting of the faculty shall be distributed promptly to the Chancellor, all Vice Chancellors, and all members of the faculty. All minutes shall be available in the office of the Secretary for inspection by any interested person, and shall be deposited in the office of the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs as the office of record.~~

~~5. The faculty may grant floor privileges to non-members to participate in the discussion of appropriate items of business.~~

#### D. Procedures for Amendment of Articles I, II and III

One or more proposed amendments of these Articles I, II, and III may be presented to the Faculty Senate at any regular or special meeting. Any such proposal may be amended at that same meeting by majority vote of those present and voting, a quorum being present.

A recommendation to amend these Articles shall not be voted upon at the same Faculty Senate meeting at which the proposed amendment was presented. If such proposal is amended by the Faculty Senate, the amended proposal shall not be voted upon at the same meeting at which such proposal was amended.

A recommendation to amend these Articles adopted by the Faculty Senate shall be referred to the Faculty for approval or rejection. If approved by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting at a regular or special meeting of the Campus Faculty, a quorum being present, such recommendation shall be promptly forwarded to the Chancellor, for review and approval. Once approved, the Chancellor shall transmit the proposed amended Articles to the President for review, approval, and transmission to the Board of Trustees. Upon review and approval by the Board of Trustees, the amended Articles shall be adopted and shall supersede the existing structure. If the Chancellor declines to act favorably upon such a recommendation within two weeks of receipt, the faculty may request that the President consider the matter upon a three-fifths vote. If a resolution is not achieved within 30 days, the President may submit the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration, with a request that it be promptly forwarded to the Board with the Chancellor's own recommendation regarding the proposed amendment.

An amendment of these Articles shall be effective from the time of its adoption by the Board of Trustees, or at a future time specifically set by the Board of Trustees.

## ARTICLE II - THE FACULTY SENATE

### A. Authority. Authority

1. The Faculty Senate shall exercise general legislative powers authority for the faculty and shall be the sole campus representative governance body responsible for developing and recommending authorized to develop and recommend educational and academic policies and programs. The Faculty Senate may also make recommendations on any institutional matters impacting faculty as outlined inconsistent with Article I, Section A.
2. The Faculty Senate shall have sole jurisdiction over responsibility be authorized:

- a. ~~admission requirements; transfer of credits; withdrawals; academic honesty; scholastic probation, suspension, and dismissal;~~
- b. ~~curriculum and courses;~~
- c. ~~degrees and requirements for degrees;~~
- d. ~~award of academic honors; recommendations to the Board of Trustees of the names of individuals to receive honorary degrees.~~

~~3.2. The Faculty Senate will shall report to the Campus Council for informational and advisory purposes all legislation which it passes.~~

~~4.3. Recommendations adopted through the Faculty Senate shall be transmitted to the Chancellor, with a specific request for the Chancellor's review and favorable action. If the Chancellor declines to act favorably upon such a recommendation within two weeks of receiving it, may veto any action of the Faculty Senate, upon a majority vote, may refer the action to the Campus Council for review. The Campus Council, upon a three-fifths vote, may request that the President consider the matter, within 30 days after receipt of the action. He may suspend the action for 30 days and seek Campus Council advice before taking action on the legislation.~~

~~5.4. If a resolution is not achieved on the recommendation within 30 days after referral to the President, the President may submit the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration. At its next regular or special meeting after the Chancellor has vetoed Faculty Senate legislation, the Faculty Senate may, by a vote of at least three-fifths of those present and voting with a quorum present, appeal the matter to the President of the University. In this event, if the issue is not resolved within thirty days, the President shall submit the matter to the Board of Trustees.~~

~~6.5. The Faculty Senate shall have sole jurisdiction authority to pass legislation expressing its approval or disapproval of that negates or approves any action recommendation of the faculty of any college or school, of the at-large faculty, or of any other group of the faculty on educational and academic policies and programs or other recommendations on any institutional matters impacting faculty. , provided however that if such legislation of the Faculty Senate directly affects students or staff, and is not solely (among the campus governance bodies) within the sole jurisdiction of the the purview of the Faculty Senate, it shall be referred to the Campus Council for final review and action. Further, any favorable recommendation of the Faculty Senate shall be referred to the Chancellor consistent with this policy, with any negative recommendation of the Faculty Senate with rationale be reported back to the proposer.~~

The Faculty Senate may make recommendations regarding shall have sole jurisdiction to pass legislation for the establishment of a judicial system for graduate and undergraduate students which includes a code of conduct, and any such judicial system established prior to July 1, 1996 shall remain in effect, subject to the continuing jurisdiction of the Faculty Senate;~~

~~8. The Faculty Senate may refer to the faculty proposed amendments of these Articles as under the procedures outlined in Article I, Section D above.~~

#### B. Membership. Membership

1. Each member of the Faculty Senate shall be a member of the faculty who is eligible to vote for members of the Faculty Senate. The following members of the faculty shall be eligible to vote for the Faculty Senate Chair, Faculty Senate Vice-Chair, and members of the Faculty Senate:

(1) tenured or tenure-track faculty who hold a half-time or greater appointment

(2) non-tenure track faculty who hold a half-time or greater appointment

~~3.2~~ The voting membership of the Faculty Senate shall consist of the Chair, the Vice Chair, and ~~45~~ representatives elected pursuant to paragraphs ~~4-8~~ below.

~~4.3~~ The Chancellor, the Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the dean of each undergraduate academic college or school as well as the deans of the School of Law, (including the Graduate School and Continuing International Education, Students, Admissions, Honors College, University Libraries, ), the dean (or director) of University libraries, and the Senior Associate Athletic Director ~~directors of women's and men's intercollegiate athletics,~~ shall be non-voting members of the Faculty Senate. This provision does not preclude any dean ~~or director~~ from election as a voting representative pursuant to paragraphs ~~4-8~~ below.

3. Meetings of the Faculty Senate shall be open to all faculty members, though the Faculty Senate may adopt rules limiting floor privileges to speak at meetings.

William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences; College of Education and Health Professions; Sam M. Walton College of Business ~~Administration~~; and University Libraries.

For purposes of Section B below, the Graduate School Faculty shall consist of the voting membership of the separate faculties who are authorized to serve on a graduate thesis or dissertation committee or to teach graduate courses and who are regularly involved in such graduate level activities, and such other persons as the Graduate School Faculty may elect.

Each separate faculty or the Graduate School Faculty may pass legislation ~~concerning making recommendations on~~ its own academic affairs, ~~such as the matters described in Article I Section A1 above.~~ Such legislation shall be promptly referred to the Faculty Senate for review, ~~unless other university policies apply.~~ ~~The Faculty Senate may negate or approve such legislation, but is not required to do either.~~ ~~Any recommendation receiving concurrence from the Faculty Senate may be advanced consistent with this policy, with any recommendation not supported by the Faculty Senate with rationale be reported back to the proposing faculty with rationale.~~

2. Each separate faculty, as well as the Graduate School Faculty, shall adopt its own rules of procedure ~~provided that~~ they are not in conflict with policies of the Faculty Senate or other applicable University policies.

## ARTICLE IV - THE STAFF

1. The staff, acting through the Staff Senate, shall have responsibility to make recommendations relating to the quality of the work life of the staff, the efficiency of the University's operations, and the staff's service to the campus community.
2. The staff, acting through the Staff Senate, may make recommendations on any matter of staff concern. Such matters shall include, but not be limited to:
  - a. fringe benefits;
  - b. University calendars and schedules;
  - c. compensation;
  - d. work schedules and working conditions;
  - e. hiring and dismissal procedures;
  - f. staff and administration evaluation;
  - g. grievance procedures;
  - h. environment and safety;
  - i. physical facilities; and
  - j. health and wellness.

1. ~~In these Articles, "staff" shall mean all UA, Fayetteville employees eligible for fringe benefits who do not hold a faculty appointment of at least half-time or greater. are not represented by either the Faculty Senate or the Student Senate.~~

1. ~~The officers of the staff shall be the officers of the Staff Senate.~~

## ARTICLE V - THE STAFF SENATE

  3. The Staff Senate will report to the Campus Council for informational and advisory purposes all legislation which it passes. Any legislation addressing matters of concern beyond staff not within the sole jurisdiction of the Staff Senate shall be referred to the Campus Council for final action.
  4. The Staff Senate shall elect the staff members of the Campus Council as specified in Article VI, Section B. 1.c.
  5. The Staff Senate shall act as the official liaison for staff with the administration, faculty, and students. ~~The Staff Senate may review items of interest or concern brought to it by staff, administrators, faculty, and students.~~
  6. ~~The~~ Except for matters referred to Campus Council, rRecommendations adopted through the Staff Senate shall be transmitted to the Chancellor with a specific request for the Chancellor's review and favorable action. If the Chancellor declines to act favorably upon such a recommendation within two weeks of receiving it, the Staff Senate upon a majority vote, may refer the action to the Campus Council for review. The Campus Council, upon a three-fifths vote, may request that the President consider the matter. Chancellor may veto any action of the Staff Senate within 30 days of receipt of the action. He may suspend the action for 30 days and seek Campus Council advice before taking action on the legislation.
  7. ~~7.~~ If a resolution is not achieved on the recommendation within 30 days after the referral to the President, the President may submit the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration. At its next regular or special meeting after the Chancellor has vetoed legislation of the Staff Senate, the Staff Senate may, by a vote of at least three fifths of those present and voting with a quorum present, appeal the matter to the President of the University. In this event, if the issue is not resolved within 30 days, the President shall submit the matter to the Board of Trustees.

The Executive Committee shall prepare, for each meeting of the Campus Council, a tentative agenda, ~~consisting of a priority ordered list of items.~~ ~~The agenda shall include all items submitted under the provisions of paragraph a above and not subsequently withdrawn; any item(s) referred to the Campus Council for final action by the Faculty Senate, Student Senate, or Staff Senate; and such items should be carried over from the agenda adopted at the preceding meeting of the Campus Council.~~

e. The agenda prepared by the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Campus Council for distribution.

2. The Campus Council ~~shall~~ may utilize the standing committees of the faculty, students, staff, and administration as the Campus Council and governing body responsible for the committee(s) deems appropriate.

3. The Campus Council may establish appropriate standing and ad hoc committees and shall adopt rules for the appointment of members to such committees. – Provision shall be made for faculty, student, staff, and administration representatives on such committees unless the Campus Council deems such provision clearly inappropriate.

#### F. Amendments. Amendments to Article VI

1. The Campus Council may adopt-recommend amendments to Article VI by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting at a regular or special meeting of the Campus Council, a quorum being present, such recommendation shall be promptly forwarded to the Chancellor for review and approval. Once approved, the Chancellor shall transmit the proposed amended Article to the President for review, approval, and transmission to the Board of Trustees. Upon review and approval by the Board of Trustees, the amended Article shall be adopted and shall supersede the existing structure, subject to approval of the Board of Trustees, provided, however, that such amendment may not alter those subject matter areas of sole jurisdiction reserved to the Faculty Senate, the Student Senate, or the Staff Senate, or other campus governing bodies.
2. One or more proposed amendments to Article VI may be presented to the Campus Council at any regular or special meeting. Any such proposal may be amended at that same meeting by majority vote of those present and voting, a quorum being present.
3. A recommendation to amend Article VI shall not be voted upon at the same Campus Council meeting at which the proposed amendment was presented. If such proposal is amended by the Campus Council, the amended proposal shall not be voted upon at the same meeting at which such proposal was amended.



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Enclosed are drafts of one new and two revised Board Policies that will be presented to the Board for consideration at the September 26, 2025, regular Board of Trustees meeting. The enclosed policy drafts are red lined to show the proposed changes. These drafts are being presented to you in accordance with UA System Policy 220.1, which requires proposed Board Policy amendments to be shared with the Board and the Chancellors and chief executives of the campus, divisions, and units at least 30 days before the Board meeting at which the policies will be considered. Questions regarding these proposed policy amendments can be directed to the appropriate system staff via the President's Office or Ben Beaumont ([bbeaumont@uasys.edu](mailto:bbeaumont@uasys.edu)).

The proposed policy amendments include:

**New Board Policy 220.1 *Interactions with Foreign Adversaries and Instrumentalities*** – This policy implements requirements under Act 473 of 2025, also known as the Research Education Protection Act, which governs gifts, contracts, cultural exchange agreements, and more with foreign adversaries and foreign instrumentalities. The Act requires institutions to make certain disclosures to their boards of trustees regarding gifts or contracts offered or proposed from foreign adversaries or instrumentalities and requires board approval for such gifts or contracts only if they address an overwhelming state or national interest. The Act also requires certain disclosures and reporting to the Department of Inspector General, Governor and legislative leadership regarding cultural exchange agreements, partnerships or agreements, and research partnerships with foreign adversaries or instrumentalities. Finally, the Act prohibits institutions from using or contracting for software or software programs controlled or owned by companies or entities in foreign adversary countries and institutes screening requirements for hiring and research and foreign travel to foreign adversary countries. The policy also includes draft forms for disclosure of gifts, contracts, agreements and partnerships, and research partnerships as defined in the Act.

**Revised Board Policy 1215.2 *Admissions Policy – University of Arkansas College of Medicine*** – The revised policy addresses changes to the UAMS College of Medicine admissions process mandated by Act 806 of 2025, which amends existing law regarding geographical requirements for admitting students to the college. The Act provides that preferences be given to Arkansas residents and that 25 positions in the freshman class be allocated to residents of each of four federal congressional districts. The Act and revised policy stipulate that if there are not 25 applicants from a congressional district who meet the admissions standards and accept admission, the remaining

positions shall be filled by qualified Arkansas residents, and then by applicants who are most likely to complete the program and reside in Arkansas after graduation. The Act also requires that an additional 25 positions be allocated to Arkansas residents without respect to congressional district of residency and remaining positions may be filled by applicants at large.

**Revised Board Policy 285.1 *Cybersecurity*** – The revised policy cleans up existing language to allow for notifications of a security breach involving sensitive information may be made either electronically or through other means, if necessary.

INTERACTIONS WITH FOREIGN ADVERSARIES AND INSTRUMENTALITIES

I. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to establish guidelines and procedures to be followed when a campus is offered any gift; offered or proposes to enter any contract; participates in a cultural exchange agreement; enters or renews an agreement or partnership with educational institutions or other institutions based in a foreign adversary; or enters or renews a research partnership involving a foreign adversary, intermediary or affiliate of a foreign adversary, or foreign instrumentality. This policy also addresses hiring, travel, and software agreements.

II. Definitions

The following definitions apply to the requirements of this policy.

- A. “Affiliate organization” means an entity under the control of or established for the benefit of an organization addressed herein including a foreign adversary.
- B. “Agreement” means a written or spoken statement of mutual interest in a cultural exchange agreement or an academic or a research collaboration with a foreign adversary or an affiliate organization of a foreign adversary.
- C. “Contract” means an agreement for the acquisition by purchase, lease, or barter of property or services for the direct benefit or use of either of the contracting parties.
- D. “Cultural Exchange Agreement” means an agreement between a foreign adversary and an institution of higher education that aims to promote cultural or intellectual relations.
- E. “Foreign Adversary” means the People’s Republic of China, the Russian Federation, the Islamic Republic of Iran, the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea, the Republic of Cuba, the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, the Syrian Arab Republic, and a foreign terrorist organization as designated by the United States Secretary of State.
- F. “Foreign instrumentality” means an agency, bureau, ministry, component, institution, association, or any other legal, commercial, or business organization, corporation, firm, or entity that is substantially owned, controlled, sponsored, commanded, managed, or dominated by a foreign government as defined in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-60-1602.
- G. “Gift” means a gift, an endowment, an award, a donation of money or property of any kind, a combination of any of the listed items, or a conditional or unconditional pledge of any the listed items.

- H. “Partnerships” means a faculty or student exchange program, study abroad program, matriculation program, recruiting program, or dual degree program.
- I. “Research” means a scientific investigation or development that involves technologies, designs, or technical data considered sensitive enough to potentially impact national security, and therefore requires strict controls on export or transfer to foreign entities.

### III. Processes

#### A. Gift Agreements

If an institution is offered a direct or indirect gift that is equal to or greater than \$250,000 from a foreign adversary or an intermediary or affiliate organization of a foreign adversary, the institution shall disclose the proposed gift to the Board prior to entering the gift by using a standard form approved by the General Counsel of the University. The disclosure shall be made prior to the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

The Board will issue a final decision on whether and what conditions the institution may receive the gift within 30 days of receiving the disclosure. The Board will reject a gift from a foreign adversary unless the gift addresses an overwhelming state or national interest beyond simply acquiring additional funds. No institution shall finalize a gift agreement until the Board has issued its decision.

#### B. Contracts

If an institution has been offered or has proposed a direct or indirect contract that is equal to or greater than \$250,000 from a foreign adversary or an intermediary or affiliate organization of a foreign adversary, the institution shall disclose the proposed contract to the Board prior to entering the contract by using a standard form approved by the General Counsel of the University. The disclosure shall be made prior to the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

The Board shall issue a final decision on whether and what conditions the institution may enter the contract within 30 days of receiving the disclosure. The Board shall reject the contract unless there is an overwhelming state or national interest in accepting or entering the contract. No institution shall enter in a contract until the Board has issued its decision.

#### C. Cultural Exchange Agreements

An institution shall not participate in a cultural exchange agreement with a foreign adversary or entity controlled by a foreign adversary unless the agreement (a) addresses an overwhelmingly under addressed state or national need and (b) avoids constraining the freedom of contract of the public entity; avoids allowing the curricula or values of the program in the state to be directed, controlled, or influenced by the foreign

adversary; and avoids promoting an agenda detrimental to the safety or security of the state, residents of the state, and the United States.

Prior to entering into any cultural exchange agreement, each institution must share the proposed agreement with the Department of Inspector General to determine if the agreement is detrimental to safety or security. An institution may not enter into the agreement if the Department of Inspector General determines the agreement is detrimental to safety or security.

#### J. Partnerships or Agreements

By no later than July 1 of each year, each institution must submit to the Board the following information relating to partnerships and agreements with educational and other institutions based in foreign adversaries: data reflecting any program, agreement, partnership, or contract between an institution and any college, university, or entity that is based in or controlled by a foreign adversary; data reflecting any office, campus, or physical location used or maintained by an institution of higher education in a foreign adversary; and the termination date of any program, agreement, partnership, or contract.

The Board will submit a report, by December 1<sup>st</sup> of each year to the Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives containing the identified information.

#### D. Research Partnerships

Prior to entering or renewing a research partnership with a foreign instrumentality, the institution should (a) ensure that it maintains sufficient structural safeguards to protect the intellectual property of the institution and (b) disclose the research partnership to the Board by using a standard form approved by the General Counsel of the University. The disclosure shall be made prior to every regularly scheduled Board meeting.

The Board will determine and notify the institution if sufficient structure safeguards exist to protect the intellectual property of the institution.

Any proposed research partnership agreement should reflect that the Board has full discretion to reject or terminate a research partnership agreement, at any time or for any purpose, with an academic or research institute located in a foreign adversary.

#### E. Software

Institutions are prohibited from using or contracting with entities domiciled, controlled, or owned by companies or other entities domiciled in foreign adversary countries that host, operate, or own software or software programs.

G. Screening Requirements for Hiring and Research and Foreign Travel to a Foreign Adversary Country

For institutions with federal research expenditures exceeding \$10,000,000, each institution shall implement the requirements of Ark. Code Ann. § 6-60-1610 for screening requirements and Ark. Code Ann. § 6-60-1611 for foreign adversary travel. Each institution shall provide an annual report to the Board by July 1<sup>st</sup> identifying official university travel to a foreign adversary country, in the prior fiscal year, that identifies each traveler, location visited, and institution visited.

ADMISSIONS POLICY - UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

I. Introduction

A thriving medical school is critical for Arkansas's continuing development and success in medical education, biomedical research, and healthcare. The College of Medicine is dedicated to being a leader and advancing the limits in each of these areas. To accomplish these goals, the primary duty of the College of Medicine is to train individuals to become superbly competent physicians, as judged by their knowledge, skills and attitudes.

Certain characteristics are desirable in all individuals entering the profession of medicine. A student must have the intellectual capacity to absorb, integrate, and use a voluminous body of knowledge at a rate rarely required in his or her previous experience. Compassion, integrity, stamina, good judgment under pressure, and dedication to the service of mankind should be fundamental personal attributes; curiosity and a sustained ability to learn are uniformly desirable. Finally, the student body should be drawn from all groups of society, rather than favoring one over the other.

II. The Admissions Committee

In accordance with Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-64-406, the composition and responsibilities of the College of Medicine Admissions Committee are as follows:

[The Admissions Committee] shall be composed of fifteen (15) members to be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas. Six of the members shall be members of the faculty of the University of Arkansas College of Medicine. Eight of the members shall be appointed from each of the four congressional districts. One member shall be appointed from the state at large. The Board shall promulgate reasonable rules and regulations as necessary to the fair and competitive selection of freshmen medical students with due consideration being given scholastic standings, recommendations of the premedical advisory committees of the various schools where the applicants pursue their premedical studies, their performance on the Medical College Admissions Test, and any other procedures that can be developed that would deal fairly with the applicant group as a whole.

Additionally, as modified through Act 313 of 2013, in order to comply with the accreditation standards of the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME), the composition of the Admissions Committee shall be composed of the following:

Eight of the members, at least four of whom shall have faculty appointments in the University of Arkansas College of Medicine, shall be appointed from each of the four congressional districts and shall be apportioned on the basis of two members from each congressional district.

The minimum number of Admissions Committee members necessary to constitute a quorum is eight (8) of the total (15) fifteen members. Faculty members must constitute the majority of voting members in all meetings in compliance with LCME standards.

The final authority for selecting the entering freshmen class rests with the College of Medicine Admissions Committee.

### III. Requirements for the Applicant

The College of Medicine participates in the American Medical College Application Service (AMCAS) which is a centralized application service sponsored by the Association of American Medical Colleges. Only applications submitted through AMCAS and received between July 1 and November 1 each year will be considered.

Each applicant must sit for the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) not later than September preceding the anticipated enrollment date. Test scores taken more than three years prior to application cannot be accepted.

At least 90 semester hours of acceptable academic work are required for admission, and a baccalaureate degree is required.

Accepted applicants must successfully complete the following courses prior to matriculation in the College of Medicine:

- 3 semesters of Biology (to include 1 semester of Genetics)
- 3 semesters of Chemistry (to include Organic Chemistry and Biochemistry)
- 2 semesters of Physics
- 2 semesters of English
- 1 semester of Statistics
- 2 semesters of Social Sciences\*

\*Psychology and Sociology are strongly recommended. Courses listed in the American Medical College Application Service (AMCAS) Course Classification Guide for Behavioral Sciences (Anthropology, Economics, and Family Studies) and Philosophy and Religion (Ethics, Logic, Philosophy, Religion, and Theology) are acceptable.

Applicants who have not been enrolled in an academic program for some time prior to application may be advised to enroll for refresher work prior to applying.

### IV. Admission for Residents and Non-Residents

Arkansas law mandates that preference be given to Arkansas residents. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-64-406 requires that 25 positions in the freshman class must be allocated for residents from each of the four federal congressional districts. If there are not 25 applicants from a congressional district who meet published admissions standards and accept an offer of

acceptance, the remaining positions for that particular congressional district shall be filled by qualified applicants who are Arkansas residents, and then by applicants that are most likely to complete the program and reside in Arkansas after graduation.

An additional 25 positions shall be allocated to applicants who are Arkansas residents without respect to congressional district of residency. If there are not 25 applicants who are Arkansas residents who meet published admissions standards and accept an offer of acceptance, the remaining positions shall first be filled by qualified applicants who have ties to Arkansas, and then by applicants who are most likely to complete the program and reside in Arkansas.

Positions in excess of the first and second groups of applicants (125 positions) may be filled by applicants at large.

Applicants who identify their legal state of residence as Arkansas on the AMCAS application will be sent an Arkansas Resident Status Initial Classification form. The Office of Admissions will use the information submitted by the applicant on this form to verify Arkansas residency and verify one's congressional district.

Applicants who designate a state other than Arkansas on their AMCAS application as of December 1 of the admissions cycle will be classified as non-Arkansas residents for the entire admissions cycle. No exceptions will be made.

Non-Arkansas residents who have met the requirements and criteria provided by Ark. Code Ann. 6-64-406(b)(2)(B) demonstrating "ties" to Arkansas are instructed to submit a letter advocating their ties to the state. Those determined to have established "ties" will be given preference over non-Arkansas residents who have no ties to Arkansas. Typically, "strong ties" means the applicant has lived in Arkansas, attends school in the state, has close relatives living in Arkansas, or other information clearly demonstrating the applicant has roots in the state. The ultimate goal of determining if a non-Arkansas resident has ties in the state is to assess the likelihood, although there are no guarantees, the applicant may someday practice medicine in Arkansas.

Applicants who falsify information submitted in their application with regard to establishing Arkansas residency and/or congressional district, or applications with conflicting information, will be brought to the attention of the Admissions Committee.

#### V. The Selection Factors

Selection is based on the consensus of the Admissions Committee's evaluation of the following items:

**Medical College Admissions Test (MCAT):**

The MCAT, a nationally standardized exam, has been a tool used by admissions committees since 1928 to help assess an applicant's preparation for medical school and predict an applicant's success in handling the rigors of the medical school curriculum.

**Grade Point Averages (GPA)**

1. Undergraduate cumulative and science GPA, and if applicable
2. Graduate School GPA, and if applicable
3. Post-baccalaureate courses GPA
4. Breakdown of GPA for BCPM: Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Math

**Applicant's Personal Comments**

The applicant's personal comments describing his/her motivation to become a physician is a critical component of the applicant's admissions application. This is an opportunity for the applicant to clearly convey his/her passion for medicine and compassion for people.

**Biographical / Academic Profile**

This is an overview of the applicant's credentials listing a breakdown of the applicant's GPA, MCAT scores, results of the premedical advisory committee's composite evaluation letter and College of Medicine faculty interviews.

**Socio-Economic Status (SES) Index**

AAMC Goal: To establish summary measures of an applicant's socio-economic status that will enable medical schools to clearly understand the nature and extent of SES diversity among our medical student applicants and meet the necessary challenge of expanding the definition of diversity to socio-economic status to meet the needs of holistic review.

**Premedical Advisory Committee Composite Evaluation Letter**

If it has been two years or less since an applicant last attended or graduated from a college, he/she must request a letter from the school's Premedical Advisory Committee. However, if it has been more than two years, or if the college does not have a Premedical Advisory Committee, the applicant must request three faculty members to submit letters of recommendation. In addition (optional), the applicant may include three "personal" letters of recommendation in his/her file, letters that attest to the student's performance outside the classroom, i.e., integrity, empathy, work ethic, leadership abilities, team player, distance traveled, etc. from individuals who know the applicant well.

VI. The Selection Process

When the material from the above factors has been completed for each candidate, the members of the Admissions Committee rate each applicant on a scale of 1 through 7, where 1 is poor, 4 is average, and 7 is superior. The Board members complete all ratings independently and each member's rating shall be weighted equally. The individual scores are recorded, and the mean scores are used to rank-order the applicants. The scores will determine which applicants are to be granted admission, in accordance with Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-64-406 concerning allocation of admissions among Arkansas Congressional

Districts. The Admission Committee has the final responsibility for accepting students into the College of Medicine. The list of admitted applicants is sent to the Dean of the College of Medicine (or his/her designee), and the Assistant Dean of Admissions, who notifies the admitted applicants.

VII. Notification of Applicants

The College of Medicine notifies applicants of their acceptance once the admissions committee makes the decision. This takes the form of a letter stating that the application has been approved and requesting that acceptance of the proffered position be submitted in writing to the Dean within two weeks.

After the Admissions Committee determines which applicants will be accepted, the Committee places the next highest-ranking applicants on the "Alternate List." Pursuant to Act 1058 of 2007, alternates who sign Rural Practice Student Loan/Scholarship Program contracts are able to advance to the top of the Alternate List. Each alternate must be interviewed and approved by the Arkansas Rural Medical Practice Board before they can be advanced on the Alternate List.

CYBERSECURITYI. Purpose

Information is among the University's most valuable assets. The University often relies on sensitive information to operate effectively and support its central missions of teaching, research, and service. The University consists of research-focused institutions that regularly obtain and store confidential, proprietary data. In addition, the University is frequently required to maintain personally identifiable information that is protected by state and federal law, including education records, health data, and financial information. The security of the University's information, and the technologies and systems that support it, is the responsibility of all employees, vendors, and other stakeholders.

There are numerous persons and organizations who desire to exploit computer systems and acquire intellectual property, personnel information, financial records, and other sensitive information. Cybersecurity threats and information system vulnerabilities are constantly increasing and evolving. The nature of the cybersecurity threats—along with efforts to manage the associated risks—will inevitably grow in complexity.

II. Systemwide Information Security Framework

To efficiently and effectively minimize risks to the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of information, the Board requires a systemwide information security governance and information security program that employs prudent security policies, technological standards, and safeguards. Each institution may augment the systemwide information security program with appropriate institution specific supplemental policy and procedure information. Sensitive or confidential information that has been created, collected, or distributed by the University should be classified and protected from unauthorized disclosure, access, modification, and destruction. In furtherance of these objectives, the Board assigns responsibilities as follows:

- A. The System Chief Information Officer (System CIO) will have the authority to require measures to keep pace with developing cybersecurity threats across the System. The System CIO will oversee the development and maintenance of the systemwide information security program and information security governance practices, subject to approval of the President. The System CIO will ensure that any third-party applications, integrations, and other systems interacting with the system-wide financial, human capital management, student information system, and other technology platforms adhere to the information technology governance standards defined by the UA System, including a review process before purchase or deployment.
- B. The Systemwide Information Security Governance Committee, chaired by the System CIO and consisting of one representative designated by the chancellor or chief

executive of each institution, will provide guidance to the System CIO on system information security policies. Each institution's representative will be responsible for ensuring institutional compliance with system information security policies and for coordinating and implementing necessary institutional policies unique to their respective campus, unit or division.

- C. In the event of a material security breach involving the unauthorized acquisition of or access to sensitive information, the information technology personnel for the affected campus or unit shall promptly notify the appropriate campus administrators, the System CIO, the Internal Audit Department, and the Office of the General Counsel. The notification shall include the following:
- i. a description of the incident;
  - ii. the number of individuals affected;
  - iii. the nature of the information affected; and
  - iv. actions taken to prevent further breaches of security.

The Office of the General Counsel shall assist campus or unit officials in ascertaining the nature and scope of any notifications necessitated by state or federal law to affected individuals or government entities. Notifications to affected individuals may be made through electronic means unless a law requires a different method. The General Counsel and System CIO will facilitate any law enforcement investigations that may be initiated.
